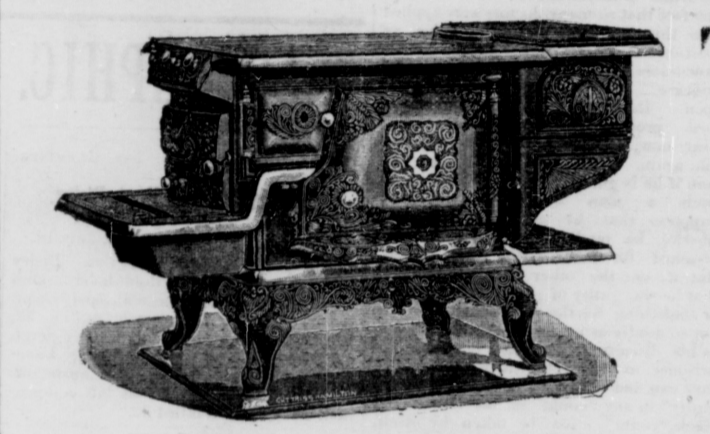

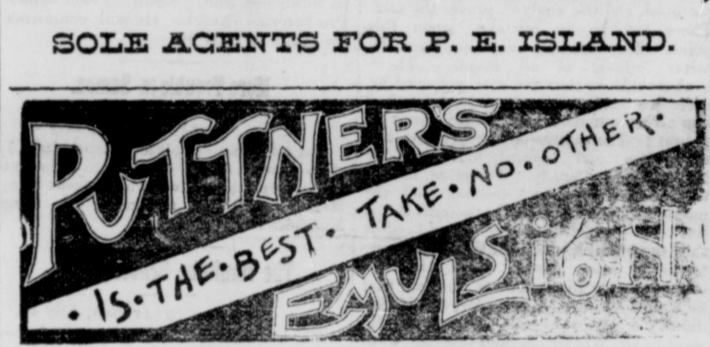

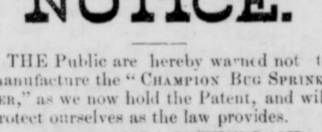

LIGHT UPON THE LAKE.

ELECTRIC BUOYS SET BETWEEN CHICAGO AND THE FAIR.

Addition to the Navy Department Exhibit Completed—New System for Lighting the Harbors of Large Cities—Chain of Thirteen Floating Lamps Anchored by 2200-Pound Sinkers—Connected by an Inch Cable Which Lies Thirty Feet Deep.

"It is the greatest thing of the kind in the world. It is seven miles long, has thirteen lights that can be seen for ten miles, weighs 83,000 pounds, cost \$25,000, and Uncle Sam pays the bill." So says Capt. W. Wolcott Marks, about the Navy Department exhibit at the World's Fair.

The exhibit consists of a system of electric light buoys from Chicago Harbor to the steamboat pier at Jackson Park, purchased by the government for Staten Island, where it will be located after the Fair, is intended to demonstrate the feasibility of lighting the harbors of large cities.

The route is from the Exposition pier to a point east of Hyde Park shoals, then northwest to the breakwater off the lake front. The connections are by thirteen half-mile lengths of cable and one returning length of seven miles.

The buoys are painted red and are two feet out of water they will be plainly seen in daytime. They are located in what is termed Fair Way and vessels will be required to keep on the starboard side and at a distance of 100 yards so as to prevent fouling them.

ONE HUNDRED VOLTS TO A LAMP. Fifteen hundred volts of electricity furnished by the Exposition will be conducted to the lamps through the cable.

This cable enters the buoy at the bottom and ends in a converter near the top. There the amount of 100 volts is switched into the incandescent lamp above and the remainder is turned into the end of the next half-mile cable and carried

The cable at the deepest place is thirty feet under water and at no point will it be near enough for vessels to become entangled in it. None of the buoys are over a mile and a quarter from shore, below the surface of the water.

In order to be flexible it was made with seven wires for the core instead of one large one. One wire forms the center with the others around it.

These wires are placed in three layers of gutta serena. The two layers of gutta serena in different directions cover the gutta serena, and the whole is wound with wire.

The wire guards against sharp rocks and takes up the wear from the motion of the water. The lamps are somewhat different from the ordinary incandescent lamp.

The globes are round and are six inches in diameter. The filament as it passes through is given three twists instead of the plain loop.

Each is placed directly on top of the buoy, and is protected by a metal cage. Surrounding the globe is a thick glass globe or box twelve inches in diameter.

The cable was laid in three and one mile coils. When the work began these coils were placed on a scow and towed to the desired place, the light-house tender, Dalila, being in attendance.

Placed on the reel the cable was slowly paid out. All connections with the buoys was made on board the scow and as each one dropped into the water it was ready for lighting when the circuit was completed.

The system, known as the Henry system, is the first application of a high tension current to submarine cable work. By the use of high tension currents in connection with converters at each of the buoys it is possible to use a smaller cable and greatly lessen the cost.

The cables in use in New York harbor, which have the same work, cost over three times as much per foot as the exhibit here. Should this exhibit meet with the success anticipated it will undoubtedly be used in many of the larger seaports.—Chicago Tribune.

CARE OF FOOD IN SUMMER.

How to Keep Poultry and Fish Sweet—Charcoal to be Freely Used.

The food question is often a serious one to the country housekeeper. It is usually within her power to get a good supply of fresh vegetables, and fruit, and eggs, but one cannot be sure of even these things unless they are produced on one's own farm. If the housekeeper must depend upon the market, she must be careful to select the best quality.

Charcoal is of great value in keeping ice-chests, storerooms and food sweet. Place a shallow dish of fine charcoal in the ice-chest. In milk-rooms and other rooms where fresh milk, cream, butter, and cheese are kept, a few pieces of charcoal will be found to be of great service.

For keeping large pieces of meat and poultry here is a simple device: Have a large barrel or tub of fine charcoal. Now wrap the birds in paper and hang up. If the outside of the poultry is covered with black pepper, before being covered with the paper, it will keep the birds protected from flies. Small birds, livers, kidneys, sweetbreads, etc., may be wrapped in paper and charcoal and then buried in a barrel of charcoal.

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If there is any question as to the purity of the water used it should be used for drinking or for cooking purposes unless it is first boiled. There are several other methods of purifying water, but boiling is the safest of all. When water is purified by boiling, the vegetable matter several methods are used to purify it. It may be boiled, or fresh fish may be cooked in it, or a little alum may be added. The addition of the alum causes the impurities in the water to coagulate and fall to the bottom, and the purified water can be poured off.

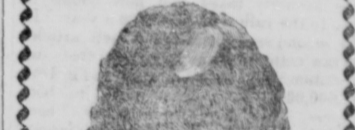
