A CONVICT named Nelson was shot in the shoulder while trying to make his escape from Dorchester penitentiary on the 11th inst.

THE Anchor Line steamer "Anglia" collided with the bark "Irongate" on the 6th inst., off the Newfoundland coast. The steamer sank immediately.

MICHAEL PURCELL, sentenced for assault on Saturday, was arraigned for contempt of court this forenoon, and sentenced to one month's imprisonment with hard labor.

THE steamer Falmouth, which sailed for Boston yesterday afternoon, had a cargo valued at \$5,633, of which there was a quantity of old junk valued at \$3,343, and P. E. Island mackerel worth \$2,200.—Telegraph.

BESIDES his wife, Thibault, who is under arrest for the murder of Charlotte Hill, has a family of six children—four boys and two girls. The eldest of the family is a son a young man of 24 years of age, who with his two other brothers, were working in the woods a short distance from the house, when their father was arrested.

THE Telegraph says a number of farmers in Salisbury and Havelock, N. B., who have had their wheat threshed, have been much disappointed with the result of the yield, which is much less than was expected from the excellent appearance of the crop in the field.

ON Tuesday afternoon last Lindsay Hood, a farmer living on the eastern side of the river at Prince Williams Landing, York Co., N. B., attempted to cross the river with his wife and six children. Mr. Hood unfortunately got off at the landing place, and into deep water. The wagon floated, but struck a rock, upsetting the occupants into the river. Two of the children, a girl of three, and a boy of five were drowned. The rest escaped to shore.

OBITUARY.—The Summerside Progress says:—"One of the oldest natives of this Island died at Townsend's Corner, in this County, on the 5th inst. When quite a young man, Mr. Townsend settled on a farm at the Corner. Shortly after he chose for himself a partner in the person of Ann Montgomery of Bedeque. He carried on a mercantile business for over 50 years, and during his lifetime filled some important offices. He was Road Commissioner for a number of years; he also occupied the position of high Sheriff for the County; he was appointed Postmaster of the first Post Office established in this County—a position from which he was never removed until the hour of his death. When Mr. Townsend was first made Postmaster, the mails were carried on horseback, and sometimes on the carrier's back. He always enjoyed the best of health, which blessing was continued to him up to his last days. On the Tuesday before his death he could read the smallest print without glasses. During his business career in life he did a large credit business, but was never known to oppress the poor. On Sunday, the 5th instant, John Townsend, Esq., departed this life, surrounded by his family and respected by the whole country, at the good old age of 90 years."

A DISPATCH gives the following additional particulars of the sad death of J. B. Morrow: Mr. J. B. Morrow arrived here from Halifax with the Minister of Finance and other gentlemen. This morning he seemed to be in his usual health and spirits. After breakfast the party visited the buildings and while there Mr. Morrow complained of feeling unwell, and with Mr. Kenny went to the office of the Company when Mr. Morrow seemed in great pain, and Dr. McDonald was called in. Mr. Morrow attributed the pain to indigestion, and thought the walk had disagreed with him. After a few moments he appeared much relieved, bidding Messrs. Tilley and Campbell good-bye, when they started to catch the morning train. Soon after their departure Mr. Morrow put on his collar and necktie. While doing so the doctor walked towards the window and had hardly reached it when he heard Mr. Morrow exclaim, "I am fainting." Mr. M. was seized with a slight convulsion and died in a second.
