Detroit Strikes Hard In Third Period To Defeat Canadiens 3-1 In Opener

DETROIT, (CP) — Detroit Red Wings struck hard for two goals in the third period to defeat Montreal Canadiens 3-1 Sunday night in the opening game of the Stanley Cup final. It was a rugged and often rough battle before a full house of 13,959.

Rookie Earl Dutch Reibel broke a one-all deadlock early in the final period and defenceman Red Kelly, who played a standout game for the Wings, wrapped up the game less than six minutes later.

Ted Lindsay's goal in the first period and Boom Boom Geoffrion's in the second set the stage for a bitter third period struggle. Once the Red Wings moved into a two-goal lead it was evident Canadiens' first bid to keep the Stanley Cup title they won a year ago was almost a hopeless cause.

The Red Wings made no mistakes from there on and checked Canadiens steadily.

Penalties paid a big part in the scoring, the first three goals coming when the opposition was short-handed. Kelly topped it off with a flip of the puck past goalie Jacques Plante while the Red Wings themselves were a man short.

Referee Bill Chadwick called them close and handed out 13 minor penalties and two misconduct penalties. Ted Lindsay and Maurice Rocket Richard drew the misconduct penalties for vigorous protests, and when the Rocket had his slapped on to a minor, he almost blew his top but Ken Mosdell and Tom Johnson, his team-mate, threw their arms around him and ushered him toward the penalty box.

The Red Wings had the better of the play most of the way and outshot the Montrealers 25-18.

Detroit drew six of the 13 penalties. Detroit's high-scoring production line, with Alex Delvecchio at centre and Gordie Howe and Lindsay on the flanks, functioned smoothly. It figured in two of the goals and was the best trio on the ice, bolstered by fine work on the part of Kelly and Marcel Pronovost.

The Red Wings' near-perfect checking also shackled many Montreal attempts and except on the close-range goal by Geoffrion, goalie Terry Sawchuk worked in faultless style and had fewer tough chances to handle than Plante.

Oxford Wins Unexpected Victory In Boat Race

LONDON, (AP) — Oxford rowed best when the Thames was roughest Saturday to hand the Cambridge crew an unexpected setback in the 100th renewal of the boat race between the two universities, England's biggest free spectacle of the year.

A crowd of 150,000 lined the Thames along the 4 1/4 mile course from Putney to Mortlake to see Oxford win by 4 1/2 lengths. The time was a slow 20:23 and the going was rough most of the way.

But for the tradition-loving Britons, "the boat race" is something far more than a couple of shells skimming up the Thames to see who first gets to an imaginary line at Mortlake.

Some Londoners don't acknowledge that spring is here until Oxford and Cambridge cross oars. For others the occasion is their only chance to see one of the world's biggest sports events free of charge.

The rain and murky weather kept the crowd below expectations but the race, as usual, was a spectacle for those who turned out to watch.

Oxford and Cambridge raced for the first time 125 years ago and since then Cambridge has won 54, Oxford 45 and one was a tie.

St. Catharines Teepees Enter League Finals

TORONTO, (CP) — St. Catharines Teepees completed the greatest comeback of the Ontario Hockey Association's Junior A season when they defeated Toronto St. Michael's College Majors 5-4 Sunday to enter the league finals. The largest crowd of the season — 14,601 — watched the eighth and final game.

The victory gave Teepees the best-of-seven series 4-3 with one game tied.

The Teepees, down 3-1 in games at one stage of the series, won three consecutive games to go past the colossians into the best-of-seven final against Toronto Marlboros.

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Teeder Kennedy Says He's Considering Retiring

TORONTO, (CP) — Toronto Maple Leafs have "real trouble." Sparkplug Teeder Kennedy, who has led them to five Stanley Cup triumphs in his 12 years with the club, is thinking of retiring from hockey.

Conn Smythe, managing director of the Leafs, told a press conference Sunday that he has asked the veteran centre and captain to think it over for six weeks before making a final decision.

The Maple Leafs are a young club and "We're in real trouble if we lose such a great player," Smythe said.

The Leaf boss said Kennedy told him last fall that the 1953-54 season would likely be his last and he repeated that stand in talks with Smythe during the week-end.

12 Seasons In N.H.L.
 Kennedy, who has played in the National Hockey League for 12 of his 28 years, said he is finding the going tougher each year.

"I haven't been producing," Smythe quoted Kennedy as saying. Smythe didn't agree. He terms Teeder the team's best centre.

Kennedy is the team's work-horse. He centres the Leafs' top line with Sid Smith and Ron Stewart on the wings, kills off penalties and is shot into the breach when Toronto needs the break in a vital face-off. He counted 15 goals and 23 assists during the recently-concluded 70-game schedule.

Smythe said money doesn't enter into Kennedy's decision. He is the highest paid player in Maple Leaf history. Smythe added he had offered him a two-year contract during the week-end "at the highest rate ever paid in hockey anywhere."

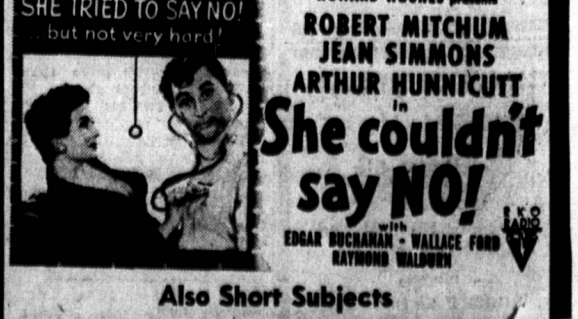
