THE GATHERING OF THE CLANS

In the film, "Bonnie Prince Charlie," directed by Anthony Kimmins, the exciting story of the Rising of 1746 is told. David Niven plays the part of the Prince, with Margaret Leighton co-starring as Flora Macdonald. The Prince arrived on the coast of Scotland with one ship and only his seven trusty followers to support him, to regain the throne for the House of Stuart, deposed fifty years before. The sequences in which the Prince summons the Highland Clans are the most enthralling in the film. They were actually photographed in Technicolor on the very sites where the historic events took place.

At the time Prince Charlie landed the Highlands were still thickly populated, every glen being the home of a particular Clan which owed service to its Chief alone. The Prince sent a message by the shepherd Donald to the
