Suydam told newspaper men he hoped this "flat, unequivocal statement" would disabuse U Nu of any idea to the contrary.

The Burmese prime minister said at a press conference in New York Wednesday he had got the impression in Washington "that most of the responsible people are not against the admission of Peiping into the United Nations."

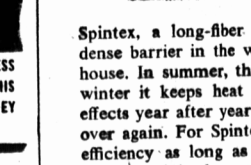
Estimate Now 480 Million Catholics

VATICAN CITY. (Reuters) — There now are 480,000,000 Roman Catholics, says an estimate by Canadian Abbe Adrien Bouffard published by a missionary organ here. It shows that Brazil has the most Catholics, 48,000,000, followed by Italy with 47,500,000 and France with 35,000,000. The estimate gave Europe 280,000,000 Catholics North and South America 199,000,000, Asia 31,000,000, Africa 17,000,000 and Oceania 2,500,000. Italy has 60,000,000 priests, more than any other country. France has 51,000, the United States 44,000, Spain 31,000, Germany 25,000 and Canada 13,000.
