TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.
Ottawa News.
OTTAWA, May 22.
The House of Commons met this morning at 10 o'clock, and sat in secret session for some time discussing the question of outsiders frequenting the Commons restaurant after the city saloons were closed. The Speaker promised to enquire into the matter.

The balance of further supplementary estimates were passed, the gratuity to the family of the late Mr. White, Minister of the Interior, being reduced from \$8,000 to \$4,000. Concurrence in the resolutions was then proceeded with.

There was an unusually large attendance at the prorogation of Parliament this afternoon. A joint address from the Senate and House of Commons was read to the Governor-General in the Senate Chamber, to which His Excellency made an appropriate reply.

A four o'clock His Excellency formally closed parliament with the Speech which has already appeared in THE EXAMINER.

The Fisheries Treaty.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 22.
The Senate has decided, by a vote of 28 to 27, not to consider the Fisheries Treaty in open session. The Republican Senators have considered the Fishery Treaty in caucus, and the understanding is that they agreed to sustain the majority of the committee on foreign relations, and that no objections will be interposed to a final vote for rejection either by way of amendment or by propositions for postponement till next winter. It is to be concluded, therefore, that the Fishery Treaty will be rejected. This will not be done without considerable debate. It is understood that a number of set speeches have been prepared, to be delivered on both sides, and the debate may continue for some days.

The Insurance Combine.

MONTREAL, May 22.
The Executive Committee of the Dominion Live Stock Association have taken eminent legal opinion regarding the proposed insurance combine, and they have been advised that they have a good action for criminal conspiracy against the Allan, Beaver and Dominion shipping companies, the Marine Underwriters' Association and Lloyd's. The majority were in favor of entering action at once, but finally the President was instructed to again consult counsel before taking action.

Irish Affairs.

LONDON, May 22.
The Mayor of Cork has convoked a public meeting for Sunday to endorse the Parnellite manifesto.
The Town Commission of Ballinasloe has unanimously adopted a resolution declining to accept the Pope's ruling in political matters.
The proposed eviction on the Marquis of Conyngham's glen estate, which was on the eve of being carried out has been abandoned, the Marquis having agreed to terms favorable to the tenants.

The Methodist Conference.

NEW YORK, May 22.
The Methodist Conference to-night elected two out of five bishops to be chosen. They are Rev. John Heyl Vincent, D. D., LL. D., of Rock River, Ill., and Rev. J. N. Fitzgerald, of Newark, N. J.
