

# CLC Asks Immediate Move To End Picketing By SIU

OTTAWA (CP)—The Canadian Labor Congress asked Prime Minister Pearson Tuesday to intervene immediately with President Kennedy to stop trade union harassment of Canadian ships in United States waters.

If the marine boycotts do not cease the CLC warned, then retaliatory action would be considered against American vessels in Canadian ports and in St. Lawrence Seaway.

CLC President Claude Jodoin made the request and served the warning in a telegram sent to Mr. Pearson to protest against boycotts of ships of Upper Lakes Shipping Limited by the Seafarers' International Union (I.U.) and its allies.

The threat of a retaliatory action against U.S. ships raised the possibility of a seaway boycott similar to the one that tied up shipping in the Welland Canal last July and led to a searching investigation of shipping charges.

The shipping boycotts stem from a battle between the SIU and the CLC supported Canadian Maritime Union for supremacy among the lake sailors.

## SHIPS PICKETED

Mr. Jodoin said two Canadian ships were picketed last week, one in Toledo and the other at Milwaukee. Now another Canadian ship—the Howard L. Shaw, manned by a CMIU crew—was blocked in Chicago and unable to load grain "because of the SIU inspired boycott."

The CLC had up the seaway last year for 30 hours ending the boycott only after the government promised to investigate the SIU and a series of violent incidents that erupted on the lakes. Mr. Justice T. G. Norris of Vancouver made a searching inquiry into the marine troubles and now is preparing his report and recommendations for early submission to the government.

The Congress claims the SIU in Canada is a "hoodlum empire" that runs its 15,000 mem-

## PAPER BLASTS ROYAL ROMP

LONDON (Reuters)—The Daily Mirror stinging attack "royal deadbeats," attending the wedding here Wednesday of Princess Alexandra and wealthy businessman Angus Ogilvy.

Hitting out at members of Europe's former royal families, the 4,600,000-circulation newspaper asks in a two-column editorial: "What's going on?"

## Defected Physicist Wins Prize

MOSCOW (AP)—Bruno Pontecorvo, famed Italian-born physicist who defected to the Soviet Union from Britain, has won a Lenin prize, Russia's highest honor, the Soviet news agency Tass has announced.

The 50-year-old Pontecorvo, credited with helping the Russians build their atomic bomb, was a leading member of the British Harwell Nuclear Research Institute before he secretly fled to the Soviet Union in 1950.

He was recommended for the prize in February for his pioneering research with neutrinos, a microscopic particle of unusual properties.

A graduate of Pisa and Rome universities, Pontecorvo worked in French scientific institutions until the German invasion of France.

He fled to Canada and the United States where he worked closely with Enrico Fermi on research projects that led to the development of neutron physics.
