

300 Golfers To Compete In Bing Crosby Tourney

PEBBLE BEACH, Calif. (AP)—When Bing Crosby invited a few golfing pals for a little clubhouse in 1937, neither he nor his guests realized what a whale of a show they were starting.

But when Bing's 18th national pro-amateur tournament starts on Thursday, the field playing over three picturesque courses will include 150 professionals vying for shares of a \$50,000 purse and 150 amateurs.

For the second straight year, the format has been changed. The entire field of 150 two-man teams—one professional and one amateur—will play the first three rounds. Then the field will be cut to the low 60 and ties in the pro division and 45 to 50 pro-am from business, entertainment and

sports. The purse is divided \$35,000 for individual pro winners and \$15,000 for pros in the leading pro-amateur teams.

Last year's winner, partly Billy Casper, comes back to defend his title. Jay Hebert, who won in 1957, copped the pro-amateur last year with Los Angeles attorney Roger Kelly.

Entertainment stars slated to play include Desi Arnaz, Ray Bolger, Dick Arlen, Bob Crosby, James Garner, Phil Harris, Bob Hope, Gordon Macrae, Guy Madison, Dean Martin, Randolph Scott, Fred Waring and John Weismuller.

From other sports come Frankie Albert, Leo Durocher, Otto Graham, Ralph Kiner and Bill Rigney.

The final 18 holes will be played at the Pebble Beach course but under the new format, 25 foursomes will play each of three courses—Pebble Beach, Monterey Peninsula and Cypress Point—each of the first three days.

BING PUTS UP CASH

Crosby again backs his tournament with \$15,000 in prizes. Television rights sold to ABC for \$35,000 complete the \$50,000 jackpot.

Bing, who used to play in the tourney, will do the TV commentary Sunday, scooting from hotel to hotel to describe the play. Proceeds from the gate, programs and incidentals go to charity as usual.

Denver University Fights Russians To 4-4 Draw

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. (CP)—An inspired Denver University team, made up entirely of Canadians, battled Russia's touring hockey team to a 4-4 tie Saturday night.

The university squad, held up by goalie Rod Schneck of Wetaskiwin, Alta., led the undefeated Russian team three times. Russia scored the tying goal at 18:48 of the third period.

Schneck stopped 41 shots as the Russians poured on the pressure to try to defeat the defending champions of the National Collegiate Athletic Association Hockey Championships.

Defenceman Marty Howe of Regina suffered a possible fractured ankle in the second period, as the game was featured by much stiffer body checking than in any of the previous five exhibitions played by the Russians in the U. S.

Denver jumped into a 2-0 lead on goals by Bruce Walker and Paul Josephson. But Russia bounced back with two goals in the next two minutes to tie the score on goals by Benjamin Aleksandrov and Constantine Loktsov.

RUSSIANS TIE GAME

Howe gave Denver a 3-2 lead before the period ended, but Russia again tied it up early in the second period on a goal by Viktor Iakushev.

Denver took the lead for the third time at 7:51 of the final period, with Bill Masterson slapping the puck into the net from 10 feet out. The University tied

to keep the pressure on the Russians, hoping to prevent their setting up a play for the tying goal.

Calumet Farm's Bardstow Wins Top Race Of Season

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—Calumet Farm's Bardstown won his second straight big race of the year in the \$67,600 Tropical Park Handicap before 14,823 fans Saturday, taking the richest feature of the season by 1½ lengths.

The dark bay gelding ran the 1½ miles in 1:49 and whipped Ricci Tavi, a 114-to-1 shot in a field of 14.

Jockey Steve Brooks rode the seven-year-old 3-to-2 favorite.

Bardstown paid \$5, \$3.50 and \$2.50. Ricci Tavi paid \$56.20 and \$19.80. The show price on third-place Nadir, second choice at 5 to 2, was \$3.10.

Bardstown also had this feature in 1957.

Bardstown, who won the Orange Bowl Handicap last Saturday at 1-16 miles, added \$39,460 to the bank roll of his owner, Mrs. Gene Markey of Lexington, Ky., with his win.

EARNED \$82,200

Bardstown won two of his seven starts last year and earned \$79,017. He earned \$14,500 in the Orange Bowl and now has earned \$82,200 in 1959 alone.

Second money was \$14,982

while the third finisher earned \$8,172.

At Arcadia, Calif., Hillsdale won the \$25,000-added San Fernando Stakes at Santa Anita, beating Jewel's Reward after collaring him at the head of the stretch.

Hillsdale's victory was an unprecedented third in a row on successive Saturdays at Santa Anita. The Indiana-bred speedster's time for the 1 1/8 miles was 1:42 2/5.

Hillsdale paid \$4.10, \$2.40 and \$2.20 and Jewel's Reward \$2.50 and \$2.20.

ALSO WON MALIBU

Two weeks ago, Hillsdale won the \$30,350 Malibu and last week outpooled the celebrated Round Table in the stretch and won the \$56,400 San Carlos.

Saturday's victory established Hillsdale as a top contender in the \$200,000 Santa Anita Maternity Jan. 31.

The \$16,700 winner's share for the San Fernando gave Hillsdale a total of \$68,900 for the three stakes.

Hillsdale is owned by C. W. Smith, former Chicago Bear football player.

Jet Colonel, gunned into high gear at the head of the stretch, overhauled Longshot Tinkalero in the final steps to win the \$10,000 Gulf Coast Handicap at the Fair Grounds in New Orleans.

The five-year-old, owned by Reverie Knoll Farm and B. W. Landy, came from third entering the stretch to edge Tinkalero by a nose.

Jet Colonel was the even money choice of the 13,659 fans and returned \$4.20, \$3.40 and \$2.60.

Breaks World 880-Yard Record

SYDNEY (AP)—Australian swimmer Jon Konrads broke the world's 880-yard record by 13.9 seconds Saturday night.

Swimming in the North Sydney pool, he clocked 8:58.6 to win the New South Wales 880-yard, freestyle championship, breaking the previous world mark by 9:13.5 set by fellow Australian Murray Rose.

Bruins, Wings Grab Ties; Rangers Edge Hawks 4-3

BOSTON (AP)—Third period goals by Don Marshall and Claude Provost gave Montreal a 3-3 National Hockey League tie with Boston Sunday night. The comeback enabled Canadiens to extend their unbeaten National Hockey League string to six games.

The Montreal powerhouse which is running away from the field in the NHL spotted the Bruins a 2-0 lead in the first 3½ minutes of play but edged its way closer on a pair of tallies while the home force was short-handed.

Provost put the finishing touches on the effort when he lipped in Marcel Bonin's wide shot from the left boards at 8:32 of the finale.

Jean Beliveau got a first period goal for Montreal.

SNAPS SCORELESS STREAK

Johnny Bucyk snapped a string of scoreless minutes for Canadiens' goalie Jacques Plante at 132 minutes, 33 seconds when he tallied for Boston (two minutes and 40 seconds) after the game started.

At 3:28 of the first period, Jerry Toppazzini's lift of a Larry Leach rebound made it 2-0 for the Bruins.

Bronco Horvath put the Bruins ahead 3-1 at 15:18 of the middle session but Boston could not stem the late Montreal rush.

DETROIT (AP)—Toronto Maple Leafs and Detroit Red Wings struggled to a wild 6-6 deadlock Sunday night in a loosely played National Hockey League game at Olympia Stadium.

Gordie Howe's goal in the final three minutes while the Leafs were short handed pulled the Wings from behind for the tie, but the outcome still left the Detroiters with only one victory in their last 12 games.

The last-place Leafs, who blew 3-0 and 6-4 leads, were outmaneuvered when Bob Baun went off

for charging with 3½ minutes to play.

He protested referee Matt Pavlich's call so strongly that he drew a 10-minute misconduct penalty in addition.

Toronto soared to a 3-0 lead before the 13-minute mark of the opening period, but Detroit battled back on goals by Red Kelly, Charlie Burns, Norm Ullman and Johnny Wilson and took a 4-3 lead midway through the second period.
