## HISTORIC AIRMAIL FLIGHT

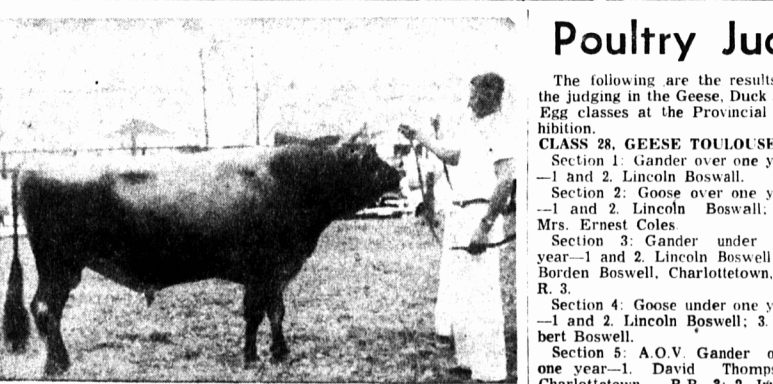

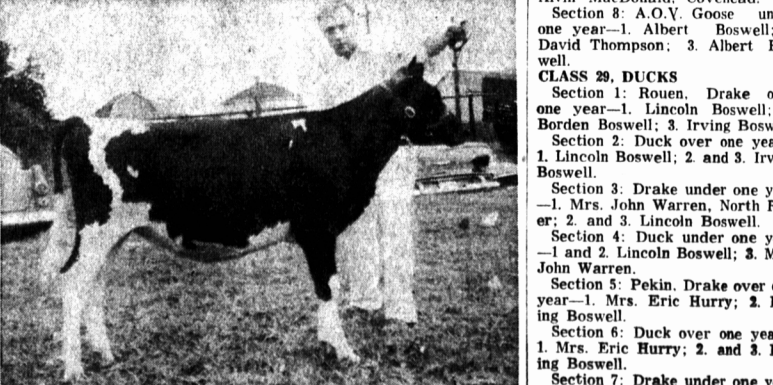

## Reunion Here Yesterday Of 2nd Siege Battery

Don D. White of Saint John, N. B. was elected honorary president of the 2nd Canadian Siege Battery Association at the sixth reunion of the organization since 1919 held

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at the Queen Hotel here last evening. The election took place prior to the usual banquet which was attended by more than 50 veterans who served with the Battery in World War I.

Guest speaker was Brigadier G. K. Peake, D.S.O., E.D., Commander of No. 2 Military Group whose father, the late Lieut. Col. Arthur G. Peake organized the battery and accompanied it overseas in June, 1915. He relinquished command to Capt. W. B. Prowse in order to return to Canada where he organized the 8th Siege Battery.

The business meeting and banquet was presided over by the retiring president, R. T. Potter of Springhill, N. S., who addressed the members briefly as did also Roy MacKay, Worcester, Mass., and Frank Sterns of Souris, P. E. Island.

Other officers elected were President, Allison Tait, vice president, E. M. MacNevin, secretary, treasurer, Rex Kielly, all of Charlottetown. Members of the executive are Austin Kaskin, Moncton, N. Other "facts" about Canada in the Russian publication: 1. Radio broadcasting in Canada is "entirely in the service of the Anglo-American imperialists."

2. The curricula and methods of teaching in Canadian schools are ruled by American pedagogy. 3. Canadian courts carry out a policy of repression against the working classes.

4. Canadian agriculture is dominated by banks which "seize farms under the guise of assistance via one-sided loans and then they expropriate the land and all the property of the farmers."

5. Official Canadian statistics are deliberately falsified.

## Will Probe Complaints By RAF Personnel

LONDON (Reuters) — The air ministry has promised to investigate a complaint that RAF men were ordered to dress in stockings and buckled shoes serve as flunkies at an officers' ball.

An air ministry spokesman said Thursday the ministry will also look into allegations that the airman have been used to do household chores for officers' wives.

Denis Howell, Labor member of Parliament, announced Wednesday night that he was pressing the air ministry for an immediate investigation into why the airman were ordered to "dress up looking like silly fools."

## Says Wreck Fits Data On La Salle's Ship

TOBERMORY ON (CP) — C. H. J. Snider said Thursday a wreck discovered on a Georgian bay island "matches every known description of the Griffon perfectly."

Mr. Snider, member of the Society for Nautical Research of Great Britain and considered an authority on Great Lakes shipping came here Wednesday to examine the wreckage which its discoverer, Tobermory fisherman Orrie Vail, thinks may be that of explorer La Salle's ship, the Griffon.

"The length of the keel is exactly what you would expect for a vessel of 45, or at most 60' tons and the dimensions of the keel, its width and depth are appropriate for the Griffon," Mr. Snider said.

Just back from Europe where he studied early French ships of the 17th century, he said there are many positive indications of French construction in the Tobermory find.

The Griffon, built at Niagara in 1679, was the first ship to sail Lakes Erie, Huron and Michigan.

**Two Diesel Engines, Four Cars Derailed**

RUSSELL, Mass. (AP) — Two diesel engines and four cars of the Lake Shore Ltd., Chicago to Boston train of the New York Central Railroad, were derailed by a wash-out Thursday. State police reported about 30 persons were hurt, none seriously.

The derailment, in a heavy rain storm, pitched the cars down a 60-foot embankment to the westfield river. One car went into the swollen stream.

Nine ambulances were sent to the scene — a long downgrade as the tracks descend from the Berkshire plateau into the narrow Westfield river valley.

The accident occurred shortly after 30 persons were forced to evacuate their homes because of the river's high waters.

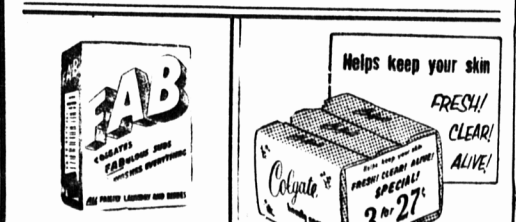

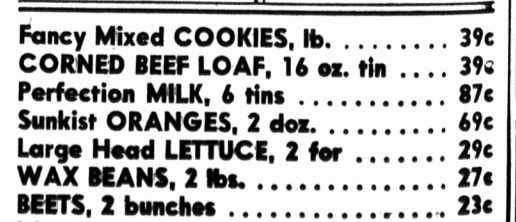
