The water in the City pumps is very low. When the Chief Engineer ordered the tanks to be filled from Dawson's and Quir's pumps it was found that the engines could not draw water from them. We are informed that water has not been so low in these pumps for many years. The dry weather of the present season is the cause.

The mission which Father Osborne is preaching in St. Peter's Church is attended by large congregations every evening. It will continue for some three or four days longer. To-night instead of the usual service there will be a special address to men only, at 8. On Sunday there will be a children's service at 2.30 p. m. and another address to men only at 4 p. m. and Father Osborne will preach at the usual 11 o'clock and 7 o'clock services.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND ONE HUNDRED YEARS AGO is the subject of Judge Alley's lecture for next Monday night at the Y. M. C. A. Hall. This is a subject of more than ordinary interest to all of us, but especially to the descendants of those hardy sons of toil who, some eighty and one hundred years ago, left their native homes on the green hills of Scotland and other portions of Great Britain, and faced the then wilderness of America. They left all that was dear to them in the Mother Country, and as brave men resolved to make for themselves, and their children after them, homes in the British Provinces of America, which were then in a primeval state. The hardships and privations which those early emigrants endured, and their indomitable pluck and perseverance under difficulties of the most trying character, will, doubtless, be touched upon by Judge Alley, than whom no man is better qualified to entertain an audience with reminiscences of the history of this Island.

At a quarter to one o'clock this morning Mr. Thomas Murphy, truckman, who resides in a double tenement house, on Grafton Street was awakened by a noise of fire in the ceiling above his bed. He and his wife arose as quickly as possible, and found that the fire had broken out from a defective flue. It spread so rapidly that they were obliged to put some of the children out in their night clothes. The furniture though three parts or more was saved, was badly damaged. "Sibley" engine under Captain Hickey, "Rolls" engine under Captain Wonaocott, and the Hook and Ladder Co., under Captain White, were quickly on the scene and did good work. The fire having originated in the centre of the building, was hard to get at but nevertheless they battled the flames successfully and extinguished the fire after it had destroyed the part of the roof and part of the interior of the building. The house was owned by Mr. Murphy. One part was occupied by Mrs. Doran.

On the 14th inst., the Steamer "Parisian," which arrived at Halifax on Wednesday last, encountered a heavy gale increasing to a hurricane about noon and continuing till 8 p.m., the sea being thrown up in immense waves. For the next four days she had strong gales from W.N.W. to N.W. with very high seas. On the morning of the 19th she experienced a heavy gale which increased to a hurricane towards night and continued until the next day. After that she had strong gales from N.N.W. and W.S.W. with occasional snow storms and extremely cold weather. During one of the hurricanes a sea washed over the ship and damaged boats Nos. 4 and 6. Notwithstanding the severity of the weather this was the only mishap that occurred on the passage. Capt. Wylie states that he has never experienced such rough weather on the Atlantic before, and he has crossed the ocean a great many times. His ship, although being 13 days on the passage, stood the storm exceedingly well. The "Parisian" brought out over 2,000 tons of freight to land at the Deep Water Terminal wharf, most of which is to be forwarded over the I. C. Railway. This is the largest quantity of freight landed at this port this season by any one of the Allan steamers. She also brought out 173 passengers, 40 of whom are bound for Port Jervis. The majority which will land here are for the Upper Provinces.

Crossing at the Capes.

CAPE TRAVERSE, Jan. 27. Senator Howlan and Mrs. Howlan, Dr. Bennett, Messrs Albert Stone, Paulin, Bent, Wort, and a Dutchman, crossed from Cape Traverse to-day. All expressed themselves very much pleased except the Hollander who got his ankle badly sprained. The Senator left for Amherst. On leaving he was greeted with three rousing cheers.

Forster on Home Rule.

LONDON, Jan. 27. At Leeds, last night, Mr. Forster, late Chief Secretary for Ireland, denounced Home Rule for Ireland, and said it was a step towards the dissolution of the United Kingdom. He said the way to pacify Ireland would be to make it one kingdom with England and Scotland.

A Terrific Hurricane.

LIVERPOOL, Jan. 27. A terrific hurricane raged on the coast of England, Ireland and Scotland. A number of houses were destroyed in Liverpool, and Limerick. A large number of ships were driven ashore and wrecked.

Imperial Federation.

LONDON, Jan. 27. Sir Alexander T. Galt, speaking at Edinburgh, yesterday, suggested an Imperial Federation of the Colonies.

French Politics.

LONDON, Jan. 27. The Times thinks that the French Ministry will be defeated on Monday. The bill against the pretender will probably be withdrawn.

Peruvian Congress.

NEW YORK, Jan. 27. The Peruvian Congress has passed peace resolutions.

The Manitoba Elections.

AN OVERWHELMING LIBERAL CONSERVATIVE SUCCESS.

A Winnipeg special says: "The latest election returns indicate that the Government is sustained. Several constituencies are yet to hear from, but allowing six out of seven for the Opposition the final result will stand eighteen for the Government and twelve for the Opposition," which means that the returns received show seventeen for the Government and six for the Opposition. A few months ago the Crit press unanimously shouted that there was great and universal indignation against Sir John Macdonald's Government over the disallowance by him of certain Railway charters. The elections are another evidence of the total unreliability of nearly everything from Crit sources.

Another despatch, containing details, apparently from an Opposition standpoint, is as follows: "The elections in Winnipeg, both divisions, resulted in the return of ex-Mayor Conklin (Opposition) in the North, by 81 majority over Ald. Workman (Government), and Killam (Opposition) in Winnipeg South by 63 majority over Tuttle (Government.) Intense excitement prevailed, but the vote polled was not large. Attorney General Sutherland is elected in Kildonan by 24 majority. Burham (Opposition) is elected for Emerson by 14 over Chalmers (Government.) Martin (Opposition) is elected in Portage la Prairie by 11 majority over Black (Government.) Provincial Secretary Lariviere is elected for St. Boniface. Sifton (Opposition) is supposed to be elected for Brandon over Woodworth. Government had five members elected by acclamation on the day of nomination.

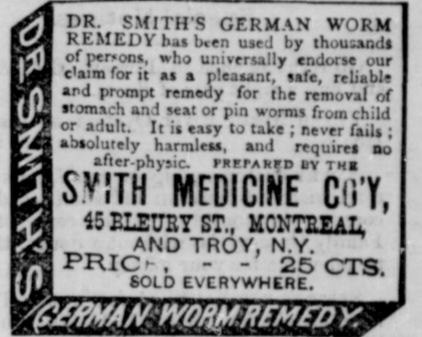

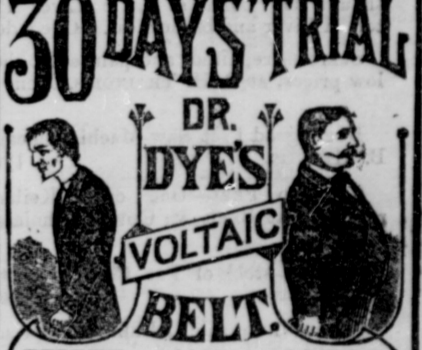

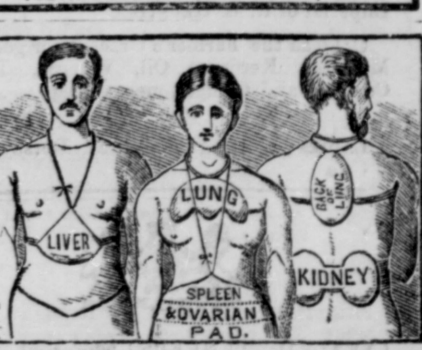
