Fight For Child Ends In Death

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OLEAN, N. Y., April 6—A fight for possession of a two year old child ended in a double slaying and suicide here today. The victims were Kent Crosswath, 26; his wife, Kathryn, 25, and Leland King, 27. Chief of Police John Dempsey and Crosswath killed the woman and King, a friend, and then turned the pistol on himself. The shooting occurred in the home of Mrs. William Stowell, Crosswath's sister-in-law, while his son, Billy, and three small Stowell children looked on. Dempsey said he learned that Crosswath, estranged from his wife, went to the Stowell home and asked Mrs. Stowell to help him retain his son. The child had been living with his mother, Mrs. Stowell's twin sister, in her parents' home. Mrs. Stowell brought the boy to his father and shortly afterward Mrs. Crosswath, accompanied by King, arrived and demanded that the child be returned. The shooting followed.

Italian troops in the northwestern sector occupied the Ethiopian customs post of Gadabi, north of Lake Tana between the Angareb and Annapou Rivers on the Ethiopian-Sudan border, he said. In the north central region, the chiefs and nobles of the Semien district, west of the Tumbien mountains, surrendered to Italian authorities at Dearek.

Sasa Baneh Bombed WITH THE SOUTHERN ITALIAN ARMY IN ETHIOPIA. (BY COURIER TO MOGADISCIO, ITALIAN SOMALILAND), April 3—(A. P.)—Italian air squadrons broke up strong entrenchments and destroyed an anti-aircraft battery at Sasa Baneh today. The planes took off from Gornal in spite of bad weather and found Sasa Baneh, boasting of a double trench system and an anti-aircraft battery, heavily manned. The Italians swept low scoring a direct hit on the battery and afterwards sent the defenders fleeing under heavy machine gun fire.

Ontario Court Allows Appeal In Damage Suit

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) TORONTO, April 6—Appeal of Mrs. Alice M. Larkin of Ottawa, from a judgment of Mr. Justice C. M. Mackin dismissing her suit for \$38,000 damages under the fatal accidents act from P. M. Fleming, contractor, for the death of her son, John Raymond Larkin, was allowed today by Ontario Court of Appeal, which ordered the case should go to trial.
The son died of injuries suffered Aug. 28, 1935, while carrying out certain work in connection with the insulation of electrical equipment at Stadacona Rouyn Mine, near Noranda, Que. The youth, according to the statement of claim, came into contact with a charged wire, hung suspended from the wire until the current was cut off and then fell to a pile of rock below.
Mr. Justice Mackin dismissed the suit upon a plea of the defendant that it was of a class barred by the Ontario Workmen's Compensation Act.
The appeal was heard by Mr. Justice R. G. Fisher, Mr. Justice N. S. Macdonnell and Mr. Justice W. T. Henderson.

Had Made No Recommendations Re Former Spy

OTTAWA, April 6—The archives of the external affairs department contain no recommendations made to the British Government by Premier Bennett relating to Trebitch Lincoln.
J. F. Pouliot (Lib. Temiscouata) found that out today when he moved for production of the papers, Premier King telling him.
Trebitch Lincoln is a former British M. P. and a self-confessed spy during the war. For years he has been a student of various religions and when last in Ottawa was a monk from China, dressed in long brown robes.
Lincoln left Ottawa for England, but with his group of monks, Mr. Pouliot wanted to know if the Canadian Government had anything to do with his application.

Await Political Aftermath Of Lindbergh Case

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) TRENTON, N. J., April 6—Trenton awaited the political aftermath of the Lindbergh kidnap-murder case tonight, uncertain whether Bruno Hauptmann's death would touch off a legislative inquiry or kill the demand for one.
Announcement of Democratic assembly leaders that they would have no part of it, coupled with divided opinion among the Republican majority, left the prospect of an investigation in doubt.
The Governor, centre of a new controversy because of his activity in the case and his last minute efforts to save the condemned man, said he wanted the investigation, but even his supporters were doubtful enough votes could be aligned for it.

Conspiracy Case About Completed

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) DALHOUSIE, N. B., April 6—The evidence of A. D. Holyoke, a member of the New Brunswick public utilities board, today completed the Crown's case against Edward A. Malone, of Toronto, former Campbellton manager and secretary-treasurer of the brokerage firm of E. A. Willis and Co., Ltd., charged with conspiracy to defraud and 15 counts of theft of stocks and bonds.
The accused, who is conducting his own defence, announced he would call no witnesses, and the case will go to the jury tomorrow.
Holyoke, who audited the company's books, testified largely about stock certificates delivered to the company by clients and their disposition.

United Church Moderator Speaks At Halifax

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) HALIFAX, April 6—The church was not designed for "Saints, philosophers, the well-to-do, but for ordinary sinful men and women," Rt. Rev. Richard Roberts, moderator of the United Church in Canada, said in addressing 250 lay workers of the United Church here today.
The Toronto minister who is conducting a preaching mission in the Maritime Provinces said the church was the only human institution that could have endured the strain of its own members' frailties, perversities and eccentricities down through the ages.
Five hundred years from now, he predicted, the present period would be regarded as one of "great exuberance and heroism." The Christian religion has enjoyed the "great missionary expansion since the apostolic age" in the 150 years following the industrial revolution.

third or one-half finished.
Finance Minister Dunning became aroused by a Social Creditor who asked the government what it would do if it found business could not be revived, which, in his opinion, was inevitable.
"What Canada needed above all else, was confidence, the Finance Minister said. Confidence was needed by those who could spend money if they weren't afraid. Every time a member said distress conditions in Canada were insoluble, he was sowing fear in the minds of people.
Then came Gerry McGeer (Lib. Vancouver-Burrard), and Mayor of the Pacific coast city. In his judgment, municipalities and provinces were being driven to the financial wall, slowly but surely. The revenues open to them were reaching vanishing point.
Conditions in Canada were more serious than many people believed, continued the Vancouver mayor. There must be some measure advanced to rehabilitate the financial structures of provinces and municipalities. As a lawyer he often wondered how far the constitutional right of the provinces to deny debt collection could be directed toward a federal tax collector.
"Until we come to the point where we vest in the government the power to create issue and regulate currency and credit in terms of public need there will be no solution of taxation, debt or the unemployment problem," Mr. McGeer declared.
Clashes With Dunning
At one point Mr. McGeer clashed with the Finance Minister. In the midst of his speech, he said the Finance Minister was laughing.
Mr. Dunning interjected he was laughing at a letter he was reading.
This prompted Mr. McGeer to ask if letter-reading was the attitude of the government when serious problems were under discussion, but the Prime Minister hastened to deny it.

OTTAWA, April 5—Great natural beauty of setting combined with the application of modern developments in golf course architecture place the links in Canada's National Parks among the finest in the world. The Jasper Park golf course in Jasper National Park, is a story in itself. It is a real championship course of eighteen holes with excellent fairways, all of which are keenly trapped. Yawning bunkers surround each of the beautifully contoured greens. The whole course is replete with artificial and natural hazards, lending opportunities for exciting shots with the mashie, cleek, and niblick. The long, short, and medium tee shots will test the skill of the most ardent golfer, and even though the exhilarating air and inspiring setting stimulate players to the very top of their form, par is seldom broken. One of the golf events of the year in Western Canada is the Totem Pole Tournament played on the Jasper course.
What has been said of the Jasper Park course is equally true of the course at Banff National Park, which is situated along the beautiful Bow river, at the foot of Mount Rundle. It is one of the finest, most perfectly balanced and most scenically beautiful courses in the world. One special feature of the course is the use of three sets of tees for ladies', regular, and championship play. Greens and fairways are kept in excellent condition. The first tee lies about one hundred yards from the well-known Banff Springs hotel, and it is also conveniently reached from the town of Banff, being only about one mile distant. The comparatively recent remodelling has made the course one of the sportiest on the continent.
At Waterton Lakes National Park in southern Alberta, there is an interesting eighteen-hole golf course, with a scenic setting which is among the finest on the continent. It is situated on the high rolling slopes at the base of Mount Cran-dell. Golfers find full satisfaction in the excellent layout, good putting greens of sand and oil, and other attractive features of the course. A clubhouse and several shelters are available for the convenience of players.
The regulation eighteen-hole golf course in Prince Albert National Park, Saskatchewan, offers exceptional opportunities for interesting play. For the past few years the game has been limited to the first nine holes, but during the coming summer the full course with total length of 6,185 yards, will be open for play. The topographical features of the country in which the course is laid out have made possible the construction of holes that will test the skill and perseverance of the best professional and amateur golfers.

Death Toll In La Tuque Fire Grows

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) LA TUQUE, Que., April 6—Anxiety developed tonight over condition of Solange Maltais, one of the injured in Saturday's fire that caused deaths of her mother and three sisters.
