FURTHER IMPROVEMENT NOTED IN LOCAL EMPLOYMENT SITUATION

Throughout the first half of October employment remained at a reasonably comfortable level in Charlottetown and throughout Kings and Queens Counties. The National Employment Office in Charlottetown, which provides service to the two counties, reports some unemployment but a slightly smaller number of people drawing Unemployment Insurance Benefits than at this same time last year.

The considerable amount of construction work underway in Charlottetown has kept many workers busy, and aside from a few carpenters, few tradesmen are idle. Many of the carpenters who are employed locally are country residents whose services are needed in one way or another.

Buildings under construction are the new cement centre at Falkenberg, the T. E. Gibson store, Rogers Dress Shop, the new High School, and many private homes around and about Charlottetown and its suburbs.

FEDERAL BUILDING — The preparatory work of demolition prior to commencing the new Federal Building has also taken a number of people from the ranks of the idle. About twenty men, not taking into account many truck drivers, have made quick work of clearing the site of the big structure.

At present one gas shovel is digging the cellar of the building, and a second shovel will be in action almost immediately. A representative of the contractors, The Anglin-Norcross Company, estimates that at least sixty men will be employed on the big job for two years, and this figure may amount to two hundred at certain stages of the work.

It is the intention to push ahead with the job throughout the winter with the purpose of taking up as much of the slack in winter unemployment as possible.

ACTIVITIES AT SOURIS — At Souris where the introduction of draggers has revolutionized the fishing industry and created new employment for many people, there will be steady work until the weather forces the sturdy little fishing craft to tie up for the winter.

Souris also has had a very good year in construction activity, and the new Griffin Fisheries plant, large and modern, is not yet completed. The eastern town can expect also to be the export loading point for part of the Island's potato crop. That crop is being rapidly gathered into barns and warehouses and the Charlottetown area.

Plan New before it is killed and the organs inspected after slaughter has taken place.

He stated that a \$5,000 yearly health grant from the Provincial Government will be forthcoming and a standing request is now before the City Council asking for a \$1,000 grant for which the Company will agree to give meat inspection to the City of Charlottetown.

The meeting announced that the edible by-products of the slaughtered animals will be the property of the owner, but he may sell them to the plant, if he so chooses. The inedible by-products will be processed by the plant by the latest dry rendering methods.

Besides slaughtering animals it was stated that meat will be chilled, wrapped and weighed. The building to be used for the purpose outlined has two cold storage rooms with a floor space sufficient in size to hang 300 carcasses of beef or 500 carcasses of pork. It will

national Employment Office reports the placing of many workers in growers, mainly in Kings County. The pickers include forty brought from Nova Scotia points. ANNUAL LIBRARIES CONVENTION AT PRINCE OF WALES COLLEGE

Librarians from twelve branch libraries, along with the Headquarters staff of the Prince Edward Island Libraries, gathered for their annual convention at Prince of Wales College on October 13 and 14. While at Library Headquarters, many librarians took advantage of the opportunity to choose books needed in their own libraries.

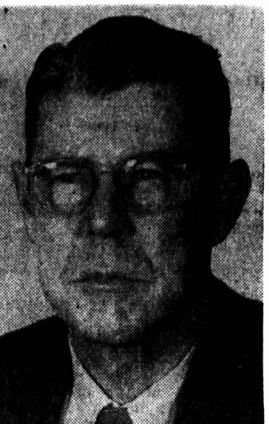
Season's Little Theatre Activities Get Under Way
