They All Suggest "Do-It-Now"

With the strong support of municipal and provincial authorities and business people in general, indications are that the "Do It Now" campaign started several weeks ago by the Charlottetown National Employment Office, is gaining headway.

The local office has not yet compiled any figures on the results, but it is known that a number of jobs have developed from the vigorous advertising campaign, which is being carried out and which will continue into March.

MAJOR PROJECTS

Aside from a number of small jobs which have been undertaken in response to the appeal "Do It Now," the two outstanding projects in the city are the new Royal Bank building and the new naval barracks on the waterfront.

These were planned to commence at the time of year when seasonal unemployment would be mounting towards its annual peak.

Noteworthy also is the fact that Premier A. W. Matheson announced a short time ago, that considerable work was being undertaken by the provincial government as an offset to the traditional custom of delaying work until spring.

The city of Charlottetown also authorized some work, which former days would not go ahead until the advent of mild weather.

Out at the Charlottetown airport an extension is being made to the waiting-room and office accommodations, which serve the travelling public.

At the Experimental Farm a considerable amount of money is being spent to improve facilities and this job is a direct outcome of the national campaign to combat the seasonal decline in employment.

AND OTHERS

The local office later will be in a position to release figures as to the total number of men given employment on all of the above mentioned construction jobs, and others undertaken by business firms and private citizens.

Unlike most of the rest of Canada, Charlottetown's total of unemployed remains about the same as it was one year ago. This is some extent due to the mild weather, but also to the winter employment campaign which has attracted the attention and sup-

Ch'town And District Labor Council Backs Do-It-Now

The following statement in support of the current "Do It Now" campaign has been received for publication from J.M. McAlduff, president of the Charlottetown and District Labor Council:

Unemployment is again reaching its peak for, what we hope will be, the year; and once again all avenues are being explored in a valiant effort to offset this condition with its demoralizing results.

This campaign has been an annual event for a number of years, and is now beginning to show results. Construction projects which a few years ago, would be considered as impossible are now being carried out with remarkable success. The public are becoming educated to the facts of winter or off-season construction or renovation. Householders are also being encouraged to have their small repair jobs done rather than leave them to the summer months when tradesmen are at a premium and materials may not be immediately available. Businesses are urged to do their renovating and redecorating at this time of year. Each year finds more and more people acceding to this advice and discovering that it is sound.

NOT LIP SERVICE

The Charlottetown and District Labour Council is pleased to co-operate with other community minded organizations in this program of attacking the problem of unemployment and of educating the public. We consider it only proper that all should show real co-operation and not simply pay lip service to this important problem.

The Labour Council's concern does not stop with its own primary interest, which is the welfare of trade union members,

but, being community minded, is deeply aware of the economic and social ills which are the direct result of unemployment.

A reduction of purchasing power in the hands of wage earners causes a chain reaction which reflects down the line to the primary producers and basic industries. Supply and demand must be kept within a reasonable balance in order to have a stable economy. Money must be kept in circulation so business will prosper and expand, thereby creating more employment. And the wage earners are the people who will keep that money in circulation.

In brief, unemployment is a condition against which a united front composed of government at all levels, capital, management and labour must be maintained.

Working as one, we can do much to improve employment opportunities and, consequently, benefit all.
