Rev. D.L. Howlett Is Guest Speaker

SUMMERSIDE — Guest speaker at the last meeting of the Summerside Y's Men's Club after Christmas, at the Y center here last night, was Rev. D. L. Howlett. Introduced by Charles Ballam, Mr. Howlett spoke on the topic, "Christmas — what it really means today."

REAL MEANING — "To find the real meaning of Christmas," said Mr. Howlett, "we must go right back to the beginning when God set the pattern for Christmas by giving of himself; by giving his only begotten son in order to help others." This, the speaker said, should be the pattern for modern Christmas men to follow at this time of year.

Mr. Howlett said he could find no basic fault with the modernization of Christmas but that we should take society as we find it and inject into it the ideals and principles of Christ. He urged

all those present to take the positive approach in 1967 by discovering the Christ already in Christmas and making that spirit last throughout the whole year.

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Liberal Hold Annual Meeting

Waldo Taylor from Wood Islands, re-elected president of the Fourth District of Queens Liberal Association, presided over the district's annual meeting held at Eldon hall last night.

Guest speaker at the meeting was Premier Alex Campbell. Other speakers included W.R. Jenkins, president of the P.E.I. Liberal Association; Mrs. Ruth MacLeod, Orwell, president of the Women's Liberal Association; Stewart Ross, M.L.A. Flat River; Harold Smith, M.L.A. Pownal, and John Mullally, director of provincial federal programs.

Ronald MacInnis, Earnselfie, was re-elected vice-president, while Lockland Gillis, Pt. Prim, was re-elected secretary. Re-elected representatives for the Queens County Liberal Association were, Lloyd Furness, Vernon, and John McCabe, Iona. Premier Campbell told the meeting there is need for farm management assistance — where more modern aspects of farming are being employed. He spoke on the increasing number of vacant farms in the province and said that a survey indicated that in five years there would only be about 2,500 in the province unless more emphasis is placed on progressive methods of farming.

Two Trawlers Are Seized

GEORGETOWN — Two trawlers, the Howe Bay and the Gulf Gull, tied up at the Railway Wharf beside the Gulf Garden Foods Ltd. plant here, were seized Thursday by the Sheriff of Kings County. A watchman brought by the sheriff was put aboard each ship.

There was no official announcement concerning the incident, but the seizure was said to be made under claims by the North Sydney Marine Railway. Amount of the bills involved was not disclosed.

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The Premier announced that the proposed ferry rates increase will be referred to a commission for further study to be announced at a later date. Premier Campbell said that the new ferry being constructed at Sorrel, Quebec, at a cost of approximately \$14,000,000 would be completed by this spring.

"Given a few more months, I am sure that there will be a brighter picture with regards to the Georgetown plants and a brighter picture in Kings County as a whole," said the premier. He said that a greater push should be given the Rural Beautification Society which has agreed as the stimulus to the various beautification programs which have been developed.

Programs of rural beautification undertaken by the various districts would be looked upon by the government for varied financial assistance.
