## W. Germany Will Build Missile Bases

BONN (AP) — Chancellor Konrad Adenauer declared Thursday that West Germany's soldiers will be armed with atomic weapons and missile bases will be built on German soil if the Atlantic allies think that necessary.

Adenauer and his lieutenants put on a spirited defence of their policies in the Bundestag—lower house—after receiving from Soviet Ambassador Andrei Smirnov a new memorandum raising again the question of an East German-West German federation.

The note accused the Bonn government of being more interested in getting U.S. nuclear and missile weapons than in German unification.

## Violence Has Stopped Six Months After

By DONALD BOLLES LEVITTOWN, Pa. (AP) — A rock was lobbed from the crowd standing around the pink ranch-style home. Glass shattered.

More stones followed. The crowd of 500 jeered and shouted.

For nine days and night the ruckus continued — all over what white residents thought was the first Negro family in Levittown.

This was six months ago. What is the community like today?

Violence has stopped. Harassment is banned by a court order.

A 24-hour police guard was removed in early November.

But there is still a strong undercurrent of feeling about the incident.

William Myers, 34, Negro war veteran who moved in with his wife Daisy and their three young children, says:

"I don't think it's worth what we had to go through, but I'm satisfied. Some people have changed their ideas. Many are sorry they were among the troublemakers. A few people ride by the house now and point, but it doesn't bother me."

AMAZED AT HOSTILITY

Myers said one of the reasons he was amazed at the extent of the hostility was that Levittown was an integrated community before he moved in.

He insists there were Negroes passing for whites before he came. In addition, there are dark-skinned Cubans, Puerto Ricans and Indians in the 60,000 population.

But Levittown homeowners worried that property values would drop, and that the Myers were backed by outside groups as an entering wedge for a flood of Negroes.

A local real estate man says property values have not dropped and there was no panic selling. He says it's relatively easy to sell or rent a house in Dogwood section where Myers lives.

After the August incidents, the Philadelphia Tribune, a Negro paper, ran a list of 800 homes in Levittown into which a Negro could move without red tape. It got only two responses, but no sales.

Myers says his reason for moving in was economic. "There are a lot of things we've gained here. We have a good property, a garage that we didn't have, and we have both white and Negro friends."

## Major Tragedy Hanging Over Some 500 Eskimos

By DAVE McINTOSH OTTAWA (CP)—A major tragedy is hanging over some 500 Eskimos in the barren lands west of Hudson Bay.

Officials said Thursday these Eskimos may be doomed to lives of accepting the white man's relief unless they can be persuaded — not strong-armed — to accept new forms of livelihood.

A case in point is the Henik Lake band of Eskimos whose social and economic depression has led to killing and evacuation.

The band at Henik Lake, 250 miles northwest of Eskimo Point on the western shore of Hudson Bay, was without leadership and depressed. Then the caribou, their source of food, clothing and fuel, failed to turn up.

Violence ERUPTED

Violence suddenly erupted. The Eskimo recognized as the conjurer—or witch doctor—was murdered and the slayer himself was stabbed to death. An Eskimo woman will face trial April 14 at Rankin Inlet on a charge of murder.

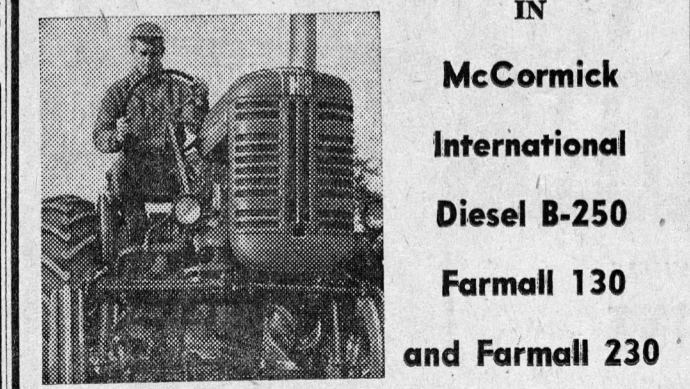

Northern affairs authorities have visited the band. Members

of the band cannot grasp the meaning of working for wages. They had hunted only the caribou and had never seen seal or walrus. The woman charged with murder cannot comprehend the meaning of a trial.

Arctic experts say they have been unable to uncover any motive for the double killing or abandonment by the Eskimo woman of her five children. One of them died of exposure. They hope the trial will bring out the underlying cause of the violence.

Authorities say the disappearance of the caribou herds may similarly afflict other Eskimo bands in the windswept barren lands lying between the Hudson Bay and Arctic shores.

Officers of the northern affairs department are planning co-operative projects for the area—that is, moving the Antigonish, N.S., co-op movement to the Arctic.
