

Intermediate Abbies Eliminate M.C.A. In 10-1 Win In Semi-Finals

The Intermediate Abbies eliminated the Maritime Central Airways baseball team from the semi-final series of the Island Baseball League yesterday afternoon by defeating the M.C.A. nine 10-1 behind the five hit pitching of Charlie Ryan.

As a result of their win the Intermediate Abbies are tied with the Junior Abbies in the City baseball series with four points each. The two teams meet Wednesday evening at Memorial Field in the deciding game.

M.C.A. gave the Abbies a three run cushion in the third inning and that was all Charlie Ryan needed to pick up yesterday's win for Freddy MacCabe's hustling Intermediate Abbies.

From then on Ryan was practically untouchable. He surrendered only two singles in the last five innings, one of them a drive into right field by hard hitting Elmer MacNeill and the other a scratch single between first and second by Art Hughes.

The only run which M.C.A. picked that was unearned. It was scored by the Airways pitcher Fred Keillor. Keillor reached first on an error in the top of the third, advanced on an infield out and came home on Art Hughes' single into centerfield.

Keillor was touched for 13 hits in seven and one third innings but the hard working right hander deserved a better fate than to have ten runs scored against him. Only two of the winners runs were earned, the others coming as the result of team-mates misplays.

For the first two innings the game had all the earmarks of developing into a closely contested affair. Ryan and Keillor both struck out four men in these two frames and appeared to be in top form.

M.C.A. went into a one run lead in the top of the third but the Abbies came back with three unearned tallies in the last of the frame to go into a lead which they never relinquished.

In the fourth inning the Abbies came up with three more unearned runs. They added another run in the sixth and three more in the eighth.

The lone Abbies tally in the sixth inning was the first earned run of the game. With two men out Willis Hennessey singled into centerfield and Charlie Ryan doubled him home with a long double into left.

Willis Hennessey led all batters with three hits in five trips to the plate. Wally Shephard, Merlin MacKenzie, and Reg Hughes of the Abbies, Art Hughes and Elmer MacNeill of M.C.A. each had two safeties.

M.C.A. rightfielder Elmer MacNeill got the longest hit of the game when he tripled into leftfield in the first inning. MacNeill also made one of the best fielding plays as he raced far back to catch "Buck" Whitlock's drive in the sixth.

Another outstanding play was Joey LeClair's pick of Art Hughes' bouncer in the fifth inning. Des Trainor turned in a strong game at first base for M.C.A.

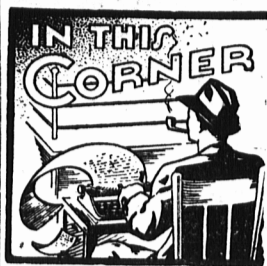
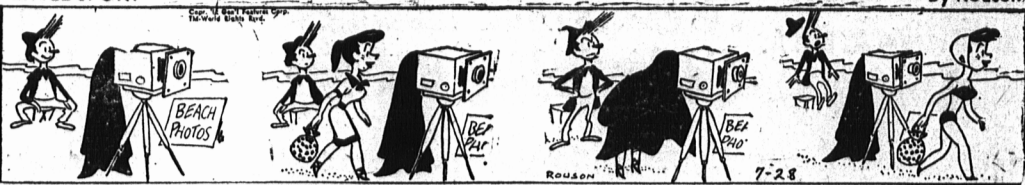

Coach Freddy MacCabe, who struck a winner in Billy McVey Saturday night, came up with another winner yesterday afternoon when his Intermediate Abbies defeated M.C.A. 10-1. MacCabe will now lead his Intermediate Abbies against Ev. MacNeill's Juniors Wednesday evening in what will be the final game of the series for the City title. This game, which we expect will be the best of the season, should attract a bumper crowd. At stake will be the right to meet the winner of the Curran and Briggs-R.C.A.F. series for the Island championship.

While MacCabe had his anxious moments Saturday night watching Billy McVey being chased to the wire he had few such worries yesterday afternoon as the score of the game indicated. A hefty five run (unearned) lead at the end of the fourth inning put the game on ice for the MacCabeans. From then on the Intermediate Abbies could do nothing wrong. They played every ball perfectly, batted every inning in every inning and tossed in some careless base running.

One of the Junior Abbies told us early in the season that Charlie Ryan would be good for four or five innings any time. That, in view of yesterday's development would seem to be an understatement. Charlie was making his first appearance in the Island League in more than a month and he looked better in the late innings than he did at the beginning. He pitched the last eight men in a row, two of them by strikeouts and none of the eight hit the ball out of the infield.

Costly errors and a weakness at the plate combined to eliminate M.C.A. from the series. Four of the five errors they committed yesterday allowed six runs to score and three errors Friday night permitted four of the Junior Abbies to score and win the game 7-5. In addition to that M.C.A. players had few breaks come their way. Hard hit balls took bad bounces and went through for base hits in some cases where they should have been infield outs.

It should be pointed out that M.C.A. were not in their peak condition to play yesterday. Arnold MacCallum was still feeling the effects of Friday night's accident while Glen Matheson was suffering from lumbago. Had these two players been in tip-top condition there probably would have been some difference in the score but hardly in the outcome of the game.

M.C.A. were not without their stars in the series. Rightfielder Elmer MacNeill was a standout all through. In the last two games he got four hits, including a homer, triple and two singles. In addition he hit the ball hard several other times only to see it land in the outfielders' mitt and his work in the field was good with the exception of that low throw he made to Des Trainor on first yesterday.

A person probably does not fully appreciate the work of a player unless he happens to be near that player throughout the game. Yesterday we sat along the first base line and had a great opportunity to watch Des Trainor in action around that initial sack. We thought Trainor's work was tops and we did not realize until yesterday just how much energy and spirit Des puts into the game and

Billy McVey Splits Fast Class Honors With Jo Jo Spencer In Saturday Meet

The veteran little bay gelding Billy McVey added another win to his long string of victories Saturday night as he moved up from fourth place to win the last dash of the racing meet held at the Charlottetown Driving Park.

In winning the final dash Billy McVey split the fast class honors with Jo Jo Spencer. The Spencer horse won the fifth dash after a thrilling stretch duel with Josedale Clipper.

Ann's Dream, owned and driven by George Callbeck, and Babe Britton owned by George Thompson and driven by Len O'Meara were the only double-dash winners of the meet. The racing card was viewed by a large crowd of spectators and it provided plenty of stirring battles.

Josedale Clipper and Jo Jo Spencer raced neck and neck to the wire in the fifth dash with the Spencer horse winning by a nose. Jo Jo, driven by W. Burt, went into the lead at the first turn and remained in front. The Clipper went around in third position following Dale B and started his drive at the three quarter pole.

As the horses moved into the stretch it was a two horse race with the Clipper, on the outside. The McGregor driven horse came on strong but not quite strong enough to take the first place honors.

In the last race Mannister Direct went away on top with Dale B. in second position and Jo Jo Spencer on the outside. The Spencer horse, unable to get to top, had to drop back to last position.

Billy McVey moved up into the lead at the half followed by Josedale Clipper. They remained that way until the stretch when Claude O'Brien drove Dale B. through the middle to finish a close second to Billy McVey.

Ann's Dream led most of the way in winning the first and sixth races. Cahagan took the pole in the first dash but jumped it off and Ann's Dream went ahead to stay.

In the second race it was Ann's Dream from the starting wire. Kitty McKay stayed in second place for more than five eighths of the mile. Frankie Budlong, driven by Alfred Lowery came up strong in the stretch to finish second.

Babe Britton went away on the pole and was never headed as she won the fourth race. The big bay mare, driven by Len O'Meara, was an easy winner in 2:12 2/5 with Ann's Boy placing second and Chocolate Dip third.

Calumet Onward, driven by Harold Stead set the pace in the eighth race for five-eighths of the mile followed by Babe Britton. The Babe raced into the lead at the turn onto the back stretch and again came home ahead of Ann's Boy.

"Ike" Moreside reined Neil Budlong to his first win of the year in the second dash. Neil went away in second position behind Lilly Marlene but he moved up to the lead before the half was reached. Bessie Budlong moved up from fourth place on the back stretch to challenge on the upper his team with his chatter, encouragement and good plays.

Had "Buck" Whitlock been slightly exasperated yesterday afternoon no one could blame him. Whitlock hit a long, hard drive that went all the way to the track only to see Elmer MacNeill race back and pull it down for an out. The ball was hit far enough for a home run but the lack of a fence or some sort of stand robbed "Buck". To roll out a snow fence and erect it as a home run wall before the game and then roll it up afterwards would take a few men only a short time and it would certainly add a lot of color to the game.

In a game that lasted 3 hours and 45 minutes, the Curran & Briggs Juniors outlasted the R. C. A. F. They didn't—by a couple of innings, a torrid scuffle at third base, and some of the wildest rhabrubs seen in baseball around these parts for a long time.

The Airforce scored five runs on five hits which sent Carson to the showers in their half of the ninth inning, and the ball game was knotted up at 9-all. C. & B. struck for three additional runs in the tenth, and again it seemed a matter of minutes from the end of the game. But the R. C. A. The 24 riflemen with the highest aggregates at the end of the four day meet will be eligible to make the trip to Ottawa to compete in the Dominion Meet.

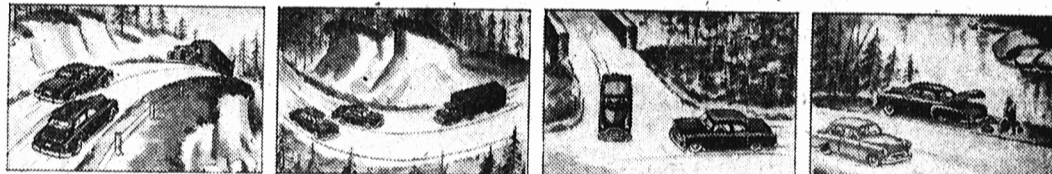
