GUILTY HATE RAMPANT HER

DEAR R. G.: It seems John uses himself as a result of the way he has treated you; and to dissociate himself from this uncomfortable feeling, he tries to dispose of that hate by hating you instead. This complicated transaction is unusual in persons who've coldly wronged an intimate, in unscrupulous pursuit of private aims.

Evidently John's human qualities have been brutally debased by his usage of great wealth. His treatment of you and his children is monstrously selfish, I gather — assuming your story is factual.

His barefaced campaign to make your younger children addicts of luxury, without access to indulgence except through him, as a means of luring them away from you, is as wicked a drama in the field of fatherhood as the world has ever known. It is a heartless assault on the children's character and emotional health, in formative years when such strain may lay the foundation of mental illness, as they feel torn between two allegiances and two ways-of-life.

ATTEMPT TO REACH MAN'S CONSCIENCE

If John finds his son and daughter emotionally corrupted, without integrity, for sale to the highest bidder, the slave of pleasure-peddlers in later years — psychiatric invalids, unable to help themselves — I wonder if he will congratulate himself on his achievement.

In your long letter, here condensed, you say he is in this country at present, maybe reading his newspaper — and the implication is that you hope I'll say something to modify his savage attitude. Believe me, I should like to oblige — and the foregoing is an attempt to give him a saving slant on his awful policy, before too late. My advice to you is to beware self-pity, and learn to stand on your own feet cheerfully, with the help of God.

F.B.I. Probe Death In U. S. Prison

LEWISBURG, Pa. (AP) — William Remington, serving a three-year prison term for falsely denying he gave government secrets to the Communists, died Wednesday of a skull fracture in the federal penitentiary here and the Federal Bureau of Investigation accused two other prisoners of killing him. Remington's head was bashed in and his face badly cut when he was set upon Monday morning as he slept in a prison dormitory.

Emergency surgery was performed Tuesday on the unconscious 37-year-old Remington but he died 16 hours later.

After an exhaustive FBI inquiry which started soon after disclosure of the beating, two convicts — George Junior McCoy, 34, of George, Va., and Robert Carl Parker, 21, of Washington — were charged with murder.

The complaint charged that the killing was done "with premeditation and by means of striking (Remington) on the head" with bricks enclosed in a sock.

Motive for the attack was not disclosed by prison officials or the FBI and questions whether the attack might have been part of an anti-Communist demonstration met with cryptic "no comments."
