

CURRENT NOTES.

The Czar has pardoned 42 Nihilists sentenced to Siberia. Peru has just had a novelty in her first unsuccessful insurrection. European steel rail manufacturers have been holding a conference. The French Minister at Shanghai is said to be intriguing for a revolution in China. Among the victims of cholera at Naples was the Hawaiian prince who had been ill some days past. The Nova Scotia coal company's railway bridge recently partially destroyed by fire near Westville, cost \$30,000. The province of Mianyang, China, has been visited by a flood by which it is believed 70,000 persons perished. General Woods and Stephenson are urging a reconsideration of the plans of the proposed Nile expedition. The Halifax Herald's obituary column contains the announcement of the death of the venerable John McKay, Stipendiary Magistrate of New Glasgow. He was 92 years of age, and probably the oldest magistrate in the county. He performed his duties continuously up to within a few weeks ago. Jay Gould says that the Southern States are increasing beyond all precedent. Cotton manufacturing are being established in all directions, and in Florida manufacturers of furniture, etc., are numerous; things that they used to have to depend on the North for exclusively, they now make for themselves. The Winnipeg Sun of September 6th has the following as to the financial position of that city: "The assessed value of property in Winnipeg, and it is high assessment, is in round numbers \$30,000,000, and the debt \$2,500,000, a considerable proportion of which has gone in jobbery and waste. The city is getting beyond its debt. The new assessment of Minneapolis reaches \$85,000,000 and the debt \$2,450,000. St. Paul is assessed at \$65,000,000, and the debt is \$3,000,000. Indianapolis, with a population of 75,000, three times that of Winnipeg, and an assessment of \$60,000,000, twice that of Winnipeg has a debt of less than \$2,000,000." New Zealand, according to the report of Mr. Griffin, the United-States Consul, has advanced wonderfully in civilization. Some twenty years ago the natives ceased to feed on missionaries, and the latter, through their efforts have brought them out of a state of degradation and cannibalism to their creditable state of civilization. Sweet potatoes and pork have superseded their former articles of diet. The island, he says, is undoubtedly the most prosperous part of Australasia. It now has over 500,000 population, embracing 50,000 Maoris, and half a dozen daily newspapers. Besides, there are 1,462 miles of railway in operation, and 171 miles more in course of construction, and about 4,111 miles of telegraphic lines and 12,000 miles of wire. The Grand Dukes Vladimir and Nicholas of Russia, the Prince of Saxe-Altenberg, and the ambassadors of Austria and Germany at St. Petersburg, with their attaches attended the emperors on the 16th inst., on their hunting excursion. A grand banquet was given at the palace on their return in special honor of Emperor William, the one on Monday having been in special honor of the Austrian Emperor. A hundred guests participated. The Czar honored the principal guest by appearing in German uniform. At the parade on the day previous Emperor William appeared remarkably well. His step was quick and vigorous and he entered into all the proceedings of the day with a lively interest. Prince Bismarck paid his respects to the Czar and to Emperor Francis Joseph. Count Kalinsky to the Czar and Emperor William, and M. DeGiers to Emperor William and Emperor Francis Joseph. Considering the smallness of the entire area of England and Scotland combined as compared with the State of Texas, for instance, it is astonishing what a vast amount of waste, wild land is reserved as well as preserved for more shooting purposes. Apart from the immense estates owned by noblemen, and kept for their own and their hunting friends' pleasure, there are vast moors and forests which every year are rented, or are leased for long periods. Thus the Duke of Westminster, one of the largest real estate owners in England, and especially in London rents the forest of Ross, covering 60,000 acres, with 50,000 acres adjoining. Sir A. Bass, the rich brewer, rents 55,000 acres; Sir Henry Allsopp, another of the big game men, rents 100,000 acres, and Mr. Ross Wmans, the Baltimore millionaire, in addition to a large estate he has bought in Scotland rents a Scotch farm and eleven adjoining forests, extending over some 230,000 acres, and costing in rent alone \$15,000 a year. With all other expenses it is estimated that every stag shot through the season costs at least \$400.
