### LEFT ON TRAINS.

All Sorts of Articles Are Forgotten by Absentminded Passengers.

Recently a Chicago railroad displayed in its unclaimed parcel room five barrels of rubber overshoes and a box full of false teeth. All this property and more during a period of six months had been left on the suburban and through trains by absent minded passengers. The general baggage agent, upon being asked what was the oddest occurrence of this kind, said that a woman once left on a train a 6-months-old baby, and she did not miss it until a trainman overtook her with the little bundle of humanity before she got outside of the train shed. It was not a case of abandonment. She had forgotten to take up her own offspring.

Only one-half of the articles left on trains are claimed and returned to owners. At all the railroad offices in Chicago there are to be found motley collections of about all the articles which man or woman ever owned. It would be impossible to list them in a whole page of a newspaper.

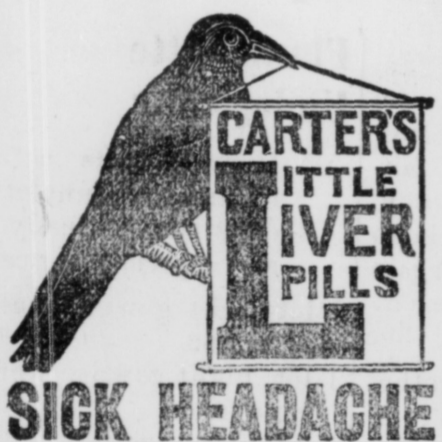
The article which figures most extensively among the lost and found of the big railroads is the umbrella. An official of the Illinois Central says he received in the baggage department 1,500 umbrellas a year. General Agent Sadd of the Burlington says his records show about 600 a year, and the other lines report large collections of this serviceable article, which are left on trains in all kinds of weather. On a recent fine, sunny day the Burlington railroad showed on its record a whole page of abandoned umbrellas.

Next come the overshoes, which are daily found, singly and in pairs and oftentimes odd in size and kind. At all the offices they are accumulated to the extent of barrels and barrels. It is a common occurrence to find upper, lower and partial sets of false teeth. Some give evidence of long service, others have been too new and have been "laid out" to give relief. But they come in all shapes and sizes.

Wearing apparel in large quantities is to be found in the lost parcel rooms. The clerks in the Alton's quarters at the Union station fitted out a dummy figure with every single article that a man is likely to wear from head to foot. The articles were all left piece by piece on the train and gathered up by the employees until the figure was tugged out in newest fashion.

The young woman stenographer in Baggage Agent Sadd's office has a pet kitten which was found in an envelope box on a train, and, there being no claimant, young Tom is being taught to earn his board by mousing in the baggage room.

Cripples frequently leave their crutches on trains. There is a collection of them at all the offices. Hanging up in the parcel room of the Illinois Central is a big anchor made of moss gathered from trees in the far south. The maker had taken care of it until Chicago was reached, only to abandon it to the care of the parcel man.—Chicago Tribune.

### OLD THEATRICAL TRICKS.

The Statistical Method and the Announcement Chronological For Filling a House.

A method of theatrical advertising which is now almost obsolete, but flourished amazingly at one time in New York, was the publication of statements of the number of persons at performances. Theatrical managers at all times have been prompt in their acceptance of the truth of the old saying that "that which pleases long and pleases many must possess some merit." Accordingly the announcement of past or continuing success has generally been looked upon as proof of the excellence of the entertainment offered, and such announcements as these 20 years ago were by no means rare: "Success supreme, unprecedented, unexampled; 11,241 persons have witnessed 'Uncle Tom's Cabin at the — theater;' '9,671 persons have witnessed 'Humpty Dumpty' at the — theater;' '16,713 persons have witnessed the 'Black Crook' at the — theater. Come early to secure seats."

No one has ever been able to tell how far these statements of managers of a quarter of a century ago were accurate or upon what they were founded. Box office accounts show not the number of persons in theaters, but the receipts in dollars and cents from each performance, and it has always been impracticable to tell exactly how many persons are in a theater at one time. Thus seats in boxes are not usually sold separately. Boxes are sold for a lump sum, and there may be one person in a box or there may be half a dozen without evidence of the fact in the box office statement. Again, some tickets bought are not used, and again, a considerable number of persons change their tickets.

In every theater, except in very rare cases of record breaking business, there are some persons who are passed in without any record of their number, and it is therefore impossible, or nearly so, for any manager to state, except approximately, the number of persons who visit a theater at a given performance. This consideration, however, did not deter the managers of other days, and they scorned the proposition to state the total of their patrons in round numbers. To announce, for instance, that 7,000 persons had during a week seen the play of "Julius Caesar" at the — theater would not be convincing. It was thought necessary to make the announcement as follows: "Seven thousand one hundred and nineteen persons witnessed 'Julius Caesar' at the — theater last week," and "hundreds were turned away."

It is supposed by some that these mathematical announcements had their origin in wry times, when an internal revenue tax was imposed upon theater receipts, and the managers, having got in the way of publishing such receipts for the government, hit upon the plan of publishing the number of persons in attendance for the benefit of the general public. Whatever the origin of the plan was, it worked so well that it was long followed. Another method of theatrical announcement some years ago was what might be called "the announcement chronological." In theatrical advertisements, following this plan, it was customary to state not only the nature of the attraction, but also its elemental merits considered from the point of view of time and somewhat as follows:

"OLIVER TWIST" TONIGHT.  
7:30—Doors open.  
7:45—Overture begins.  
7:45—Curtain raised.  
8:00—Entrance of Fagin.  
8:15—Fagin and Bill Sikes converse.  
8:30—Entrance of Nancy.  
8:35—The great housebreaking scene. Flash Toby shot at 9:04.  
9:40—Fagin in Eow street. Don't miss the court scene.  
10—Bill Sikes and Nancy quarrel.  
10:30—Fagin in jail.  
10:55—Great London bridge scene. Noah tracks Nancy.  
11:00—Bill Sikes kills Nancy.  
Be sure and wait for the death of Bill Sikes, which occurs at 11:22.

This method of theatrical announcement is now nearly obsolete, though occasionally it is revived in the case of some performance of more than usually varied character. It flourished most during the original run of "The Black Crook" at Niblo's, a novelty to old New York theater goers so bewildering that it was thought necessary to have, as it were, guideposts of its merits as a part of the announcement.—New York Sun.

Live Quail in London Market.

The only foreign game birds which arrive here alive are the quails. They reach us in the early spring, just when every other kind of game is out of season and young ducks and chickens either still in the shell or extravagantly dear. So are the quails, but, as the old farmer said of the curacao at 5 shillings a glass, they are "wuth it too." The Egyptian quails come first. A month later the Italian quails arrive. Their numbers seem never to diminish, though 17,000 were brought to Rome in one day. Dealers collect them from Sicily, the Naples coast and that strip of sand hills between the Pontine marshes and the sea stretching from Nettuno to Astura. The Italian birds all come by rail via Paris, in the small, low cages which prevent them hurting themselves by trying to fly. As soon as they arrive they are sent to London to be fattened unless it is intended to use them for winter fattening, when they are kept in Paris.—Cornhill Magazine.

### SAVE YOUR FEATHERS.
