# Deeper, Longer Dives Are In Prospect For Frogmen

GROTON, Conn. (AP) — New research findings promise to allow frogmen to swim deeper and longer without danger of the "bends," a U.S. Navy doctor reported Wednesday. Capt. J. Duffner, senior medical officer of the navy's experimental diving unit in Washington, D.C., said the promise results from experiments in which divers breathe a mixture of helium and oxygen instead of the usual compressed air which contains nitrogen and oxygen. He told the first international symposium on submarine and space medicine that it now is proposed to furnish all navy frogmen with such a mixture. It would be carried, as compressed air now is, in a so-called "SCUBA" apparatus. "SCUBA" means "Self-Contained Underwater Breathing Apparatus."

The condition known as the "bends" technically is called "decompression sickness." When a diver is deep in the water, the increased pressure from the water causes any inert gas in his breathing mixture—such as nitrogen or helium—to be compressed into his tissues. That is all right when he remains at the depth. But when he ascends, the gas in his tissues is under lower and lower pressure. If he comes up too fast, the compressed gas will be released in the form of bubbles. They can get into his tissues, his joints, and even his brain and lungs, if in sufficient quantities. A careful diver ascends slowly and makes stops along the way to allow the gas to be released gradually enough so it can be exhaled before it forms bubbles. Duffner, in his report, said it

now has been found that there is no greater danger of a swimmer contracting the bends while diving with a helium-oxygen mixture than when breathing compressed air. Previously it had been thought otherwise. IN USE 20 YEARS He said the navy has used helium-oxygen in deep diving for more than 20 years. But the mixture has not been considered previously for use by frogmen. The new research has disclosed that much faster rates of ascent can be tolerated when helium-oxygen is breathed underwater than previously believed possible. The captain stressed in his report that the helium-oxygen apparatus is something to be used only by professional divers. The compressed air apparatus (aqua lung) is still recommended for amateurs.

## Canada To Consider Hike In Sale Of Goods To Ethiopia

OTTAWA (CP) — The possibilities of selling more goods to Ethiopia are going to be circulated among Canadian businessmen.  
Other areas out of the main stream of Canadian trade are due for the same treatment.  
The medium is a series of market information booklets prepared by the trade department. Booklets on Venezuela, Rhodesia and the Irish Republic have already been completed. One on Ethiopia is under way and others are pending on Haiti, the West Indies Federation, Peru and the Dominican Republic.  
The series as described by a department spokesman is part of the current campaign to boost Commonwealth trade and fits into the broader program of boosting Canadian trade generally.  
**STUDY MANY ANGLES**  
The booklets are prepared on the basis of information from Canadian trade officials on the spot and break down into a general summary, description of land and peoples, production, and the trade picture there both generally and as it relates to Canada. They give detailed trade regulations.  
It is a two-day advertisement in the view of the trade department, opening up avenues both of buying and selling more in the countries concerned.  
Ethiopia hardly ranks as a prepossessing trade prospect from a glance at the latest statistics although it is regarded as having "quite a potential."  
In 1956 she bought \$121,000 worth of goods from Canada and increased that to \$140,000 last year, an amount still well below among the 120 or more geographically entities listed in department trade statistics. Bulgaria at \$119,000 and Albania at \$272 were among the few places buying less than Ethiopia last year.  
SHE SUES EVEN LESS  
Meanwhile, Canada bought a mere \$63,000 worth of Ethiopian goods.  
Main exports in 1957 were \$57,000 worth of tires and \$20,000 worth of whisky. Some items listed for 1956: \$16 worth of sauce and ketchup, \$12 worth of knitted wool outer garments and \$57 worth of earthenware.  
The West Indies rate as a more obvious target. Barbados and Jamaica, for example, both set more to Canada than they buy.

## U.S. To Test Atom-Powered Space Rockets

GENEVA (AP) — The United States this fall will conduct tests aimed at developing atom-powered space rockets and airplanes, an American scientist reported Friday.  
The tests will be made with small atomic reactors which hold promise of being fitted into rockets and planes, said Dr. H. L. Reynolds of the University of California.  
Small reactors have been developed with uranium cores less than a foot in diameter, he told the atoms-for-peace conference.  
The next step is to generate more power from them, which could, for example, heat gases to supply the thrust for a rocket.  
Tests of this nature are scheduled in Nevada this fall on a reactor developed at Los Alamos scientific laboratory. Other tests will be made "some time soon" on a reactor developed at the University of California's radiation laboratory, he said.  
Reynolds indicated that a practical power plant is some time off. The present reactors "are not prototypes."

## RAID CHINATOWN

NEW YORK (AP)—Police arrested 94 men Sunday in a Chinatown gambling raid that attracted a crowd of 1,500 tourists, strollers, and residents. Police said there had been an 18-hour session of fan-tan, dice and dominoes. The men, charged with disturbing the peace, were freed because of lack of evidence.
