## Blood Donor Clinic Planned For Borden Legion Nov. 16

Under the chairmanship of J.J. MacIsaac of Borden, the Borden branch of the Royal Canadian Legion, the Borden Club, and the Carleton Siding Women's Institute, have joined forces to sponsor a Red Cross blood donor clinic at the Legion Home in Borden on Monday, Nov. 16.

This clinic will be unique in that it will be held in the morning from 10 until 12 noon, with an objective of at least 120 donors during the two hour period.

The Borden Clinic will be the first to be held there since 1953. The Lions' Club is anxious to provide the citizens of the area with the opportunity to share in providing the blood so urgently needed to maintain the Red Cross blood transfusion service in this province. They have solicited the assistance of various other organizations which are active in this section of the province, and report keen interest being displayed by local residents.

The objective for the St. Peter's Bay clinic, which will be held at the Holy Name Hall from 7 until 9 p.m. Monday, Nov. 16th, is at least 150 donors.

## Accused Fined On Three Counts

**SUMMERSIDE** — Joseph Rodriguez Metcalfe of St. Eleanor's was sentenced to 15 days in Prince County Jail for reckless driving, when he appeared yesterday in Prince County Court before Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald.

Cpl. Victor Cameron of Summerside RCMP detachment said Metcalfe had been found driving in a dangerous manner, passing a solid white line along with other infractions.

Metcalfe had never had a license and had never taken a driver's test. He was also fined \$10 and costs for driving without a license.

He was fined \$20 and costs on a third charge of illegal possession of liquor.

**IMPAIRED DRIVING**

Allison Beer Mann of Kensington was fined \$75 and costs or 15 days for impaired driving.

A 16-year-old Kinkora youth, Austin Joseph Mulligan was given a 6-month deferred sentence when he appeared for sentencing on an impaired driving charge.

The accused was also ordered to comply with the following conditions: — keep the peace and be of good behavior; refrain from all alcoholic beverages; appear and receive sentence when called upon to do so.

Sheldon James O'Halloran of Cape Traverse was fined \$30 and costs for driving while his license was suspended. Sentencing on two other charges, impaired driving and leaving the scene of an accident, was adjourned to November 26.

## GETS THREE MONTHS

A former Alberton youth, Gary Sheldis, now residing in Moncton, was sentenced to three months in Prince County Jail when he pleaded guilty to a charge of willful damage to a motor vehicle to the amount of less than \$50.

In sentencing the youth, Magistrate MacDonald made reference to his lengthy record and warned him that the next time he appeared before him he would be given a penitentiary term.

Wilfred Joseph Laviolette of Bedouke pleaded guilty to a charge of driving while his license was suspended, and was fined \$50 and costs or 30 days.

The following persons were each fined \$10 and costs for speeding: — Roy Mountford, William Hines, John Glegg and Harold Campbell, all from RCAF Summerside.

George Brian Wainwright of Irishtown was fined \$10 and costs for operating a vehicle not properly equipped.

## No Sign Yet Of Additional Student Loans

No word has been received on the provincial government's request to federal authorities for more loans under the Canada Student Loan program, Dr. George Dewar, minister of education, said yesterday.

The province received \$200,000 for loans for college students. Dr. Dewar said an additional \$200,000 to \$100,000 could be used here.

He suggested that some of the extra funds from provinces who may not have used the full amount received from Ottawa could be diverted to this province.

(Mr. Reddin's father Ivan Reddin, died in Calgary some years ago.)

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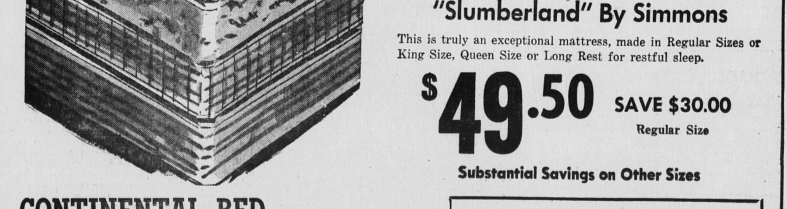
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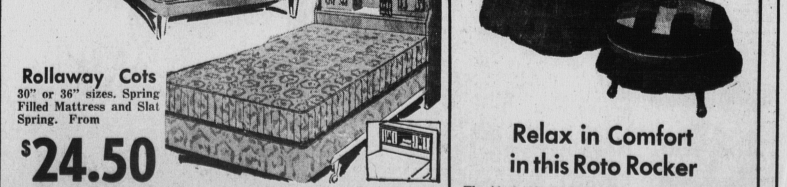
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
