Local Reinsman Is In The Chips

James (Roach) MacGregor of Charlottetown has been carving quite a reputation for himself on harness racing circles around the Florida racing circuit over the past winter. MacGregor has had a long and illustrious track career which has covered many racing surfaces, but Prince Edward Island harness racing fans saw him in what we believe would have to rate with his top performances in last year's Evening Patriot Gold Cup and Saucer Invitational pace at the Charlottetown Driving Park.

Roach was up behind June Byrd by Popular Byrd dam Bertha June for the event and in the first half of the main attraction the MacGregor teamed mare was edged out in the homestretch when Edgewood Scott came from the tail of the pack and displayed an unbelievable burst of speed to edge out the MacGregor teamed entry which is owned by the Greenbrier Farms, Charlottetown.

The second half of the main event saw Killarney Boy with Don MacNeill up on the bike go to the top and then Dudley H. took over the lead while "Roach" tucked the Byrd in the three hole for the first half of the race. As they went down the backstretch the whole field started to move and as they reached the three-quarter mark there wasn't any more than a length between any of the eight entries.

MacGregor took the little mare out on the final turn and took over the lead by a length, but the field was closing in fast. As they came down to the wire Tammany Hall was coming fast on the inside and Hucker was moving on the outside. The Byrd beat Tammany Hall by a neck and copped all the marbles with the best summary. This was the finest drive we ever saw a horse get and we don't wonder at MacGregor making it big on the southern circuit.

SETS NEW RECORD

The local reinsman was up behind Jerry Hal at Pompano Park Raceway recently and established a new 3-year-old pacing mark of 2:00.2 to win the night's feature race at the Florida oval by an easy 1 1/4 lengths. It was the 3-year-old chestnut colt's 11th successive victory, seven of those registered last year as a 2-year-old.

Owned by Mr. and Mrs. John Langford of Chatham, Ont., the son of Honest Jerry-Miss Beverly Hal by Alpha Hal went to the front under the urging of MacGregor and hit the quarter in 30.3, the half in 1:01.4 and came the last half mile of his record breaking victory in 58.3 seconds.

His time was one-fifth of a second off Pompano's fastest paced mile, 2:00.1 set at Pompano a couple of weeks back by the aged American-bred, Chocolate Soda.

Headline making isn't exactly new to the Langford owning racing star. With MacGregor holding the reins in December, while still a 2-year-old, Jerry Hal was a Pompano race winner in 2:03.1 which is, so far as Canadian Trotting Association figures show, the fastest race mile ever by a Canadian-foaled 2-year-old pacer. MacGregor signed on just last autumn as head trainer-driver of the Chatham owners' racing stable.

Habs Whip Boston Bruins; Leafs Bomb Rangers 10-1

BOSTON (CP)—Ralph Backstrom snapped in three goals for Montreal Sunday night in a 5-2 victory over Boston Bruins which left Canadiens hard on the heels of Detroit Red Wings for the National Hockey League leadership.

With three games each remaining, Montreal stayed two points back of the Red Wings—winners over Chicago—in the battle for a first-place finish.

Centre Jean Beliveau got the other two goals for Canadiens. Boston rookie Billy Knibbs broke up goalie Charlie Hodge's shutout bid at 13:08 of the finale after Montreal had built a 5-0 lead, and Johnny Bucyk closed out the scoring at 19:12.

The victory was the fifth straight for Canadiens in their big drive.

Backstrom completed "hat trick" when he picked up a

loose puck in the Boston zone and rifled a 35-footer into the far corner. The score came at 11:42 of the third period.

Montreal demonstrated superior speed, passing and teamwork while applying constant pressure.

Detroit Wings Top Black Hawks

DETROIT (AP)—Durable Gordie Howe, who marks his 37th birthday 10 days from now, scored three goals Sunday night in helping to move Detroit Red Wings closer to their first National Hockey League championship in eight years with a 5-1 victory over the fading Chicago Black Hawks.

The victory kept the first-place Red Wings two points in front of Montreal Canadiens and disposed of Chicago's slim hope of finishing first.

Playing before the largest home crowd in four years, 15,196, the Wings matched a National League record with the triumph.

It was their 13th straight victory at Olympia. This equalled the home winning string established by Canadiens in the 1943-44 season.

It was the 14th three-goal display of Howe's 19-year NHL career and his first since Dec. 31, 1961, against Toronto Maple Leafs.
