Departure of Island Team.

Island Marksmen Carrying Off Excellent Prizes.

The Best Equipped Team on the Ground.

THE SELKIRK ELECTION.

OTTAWA, Sept. 13.

The Island Rifle Team left for Montreal on Saturday night.

In the Extra Series on Saturday, Private James Dover took second prize on a score of thirty-three points.

In the Dominion Match, Sapper Benj. Hooper and Sergeant W. Davison secured prizes.

In the McDougall match, Corporal Crawford and Color-Sergeant V. Longworth, Sergeant Allan and Ewen McDougall got good prizes.

Lieut Horn took a prize in the Affiliation Match.

In the Provincial Match—eight men from each Province—Ontario took first prize, New Brunswick second—beating the Island men by one point, only.

At the presentation of prizes the Island team was pronounced by far the best equipped team on the grounds—their handsome uniform being much admired.

The whole team took individual prizes.

WINNIPEG, Sept. 11.

Capt. Scott (L. C.), as far as heard from, has a majority of 125 over D. A. Smith. Remaining polls may probably reduce this, but will not materially affect the result.

There is great rejoicing here.

LATER.

In the Selkirk election, Capt. Scott, (Conservative) was elected by over 131 majority.

OTTAWA, Sept. 10.

At the Dominion Rifle Association meeting to-day, in the Provincial Match Ontario won the first prize with 417, and New Brunswick second with 378; Prince Edward Island came third with 377; Quebec fourth, 374, and Nova Scotia fifth with 369. The New Brunswick individual scores were:—

Sergeant Weyman, of the 8th Cavalry, with 58 points, carried off third individual prize in the same match, and Major Arnold of the 74th, with 51, carried off the 41st or last prize.

In the Grand Aggregate Match, Lieut. Hunter, of New Brunswick Engineers, carried off 19th prize with a score of 249; and Captain Arnold, of the 74th, took 49th prize with 236 points. No New Brunswick has won a prize in the Governor General's Match.

The Governor General distributed the prizes this afternoon.

The following is a list of those making the highest aggregate scores, the first twenty of whom in the event of all accepting, form the Wimbledon team next year, from which it will be seen that Sergeant Weyman of the 8th Cavalry, upholds the honor of New Brunswick among the immortal twenty; while Lieut. Hunter, of the Engineers, stands a chance of filling a vacancy.

EUROPEAN.

PARIS, Sept. 10.

A telegram from Dulcigno to-day says, "Troops sent by Riza Pasha are encamped near this town last night. The town is in a very excited state. It is said that the league held a meeting at Sentari and decided to oppose the surrender. The Montenegrins are eschelon along the frontier close to Dulcigno."

A fire in Saint Beat, a town of 1,000 inhabitants in Upper Garonne, has destroyed thirty-two houses, and rendered over 100 people homeless. One person was killed. It is denied that the French Admiral has

received instructions differing from these given the other commanders. It has been agreed that the fleet will not go beyond a mere demonstration, except by the unanimous agreement of the Powers, none of whom shall act separately. If the accord among the Powers should cease, none, except at their own risk and peril, can undertake to prolong the demonstration or alter its purely demonstrative character.

MESHED, Sept. 10.

A Turcoman from Groke Tepe brings news that a large body of horsemen attacked the Russians at Houdja, Kalessi and Bouthussan, capturing a quantity of arms and stores.

PARIS, Sept. 10.

The weekly statement of the Bank of France shows a decrease in gold of 14,795,000 francs and an increase in silver of £3,216,000.

MOSCOW, Sept. 10.

The Gazette says the report of General Skobeloff's recall is unfounded. On the contrary it is declared that important events are pending in the trans-Caspian region.

MADRID, Sept. 10.

The Minister of Foreign Affairs has sent a memorandum to the Spanish Minister at Washington, setting forth the basis for a future treaty of commerce or a simple convention with the United States, applicable to the most important articles of commerce between Cuba and the United States.

UNITED STATES.

NEW YORK, Sept. 10.

A St. Augustine letter says that Mr. Owen states that several thousand dollars, besides very valuable papers in his trunk, which was among the number that reached the shore was plundered. Steps will be taken to recover the money. Trunks that contained money and valuable jewelry were destroyed by fire after being plundered. The custom house officers are trying to bring the plunderers of baggage and cargo to an account.

FREDERICKSBURG, Sept. 10.

Tom Warren, a freighter, on Wednesday was found murdered twelve miles north of here. The deed was committed with an axe.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 10.

Last evening, the streets around the Palace Hotel and Great Court and galleries which were beautifully decorated and illuminated with gas and electric lights, were thronged with people awaiting the appearance of President Hayes. About half-past nine the President appeared and was received with great enthusiasm. In a few words he thanked the audience for their kind reception, excusing himself from making a speech on account of fatigue. General Sherman then entertained the crowd for a few moments with some of his dry humor and introduced to the people Mrs. Hayes who bowed her acknowledgments and the crowd dispersed.

BOSTON, Sept. 10.

Private despatches from St. Johns, Nfld., states that the Anchor Line steamer Anglia which sailed from here on Sept. 2nd collided with the British bark Irongate from Antwerp for New York, on the 6th and sank. The crew were saved. The Anglia had a miscellaneous cargo and 338 live cattle. The whole cargo was valued at \$112,816. The cattle were valued at \$40,000. Insured in the Western American office of Canada. The rest of the property was chiefly insured in Europe.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sep. 10.

A Seattle despatch says:—Capt. Smith of steamer Josephine, just arrived from Skagil reports that while ascending that river on Tuesday last, when opposite Mount Baker he observed mountain in state of violent eruption, flames streaming up from summit and large volumes of smoke ascending.

Provincial Synod.

A despatch to the Halifax Chronicle of the 10th inst., says:—

"The report on Foreign Missions was presented by Rev. W. L. Osler, Chairman of Committee. It strongly recommended missions to the heathen.

The Rev Dr. Bell, a delegate from the Irish Church, was invited to the platform and asked to speak. He addressed the Synod at some length, recounting the history of that church, past and present, affirming that from first to last he opposed the revision of the Prayer Book. A vote of thanks was tendered the Doctor for his address.

The notice of motion with reference to voting by diocese was withdrawn.

The motion of Mr. Silver, with reference to the rights and duties of Bishops, Rectors and Churchwardens was also withdrawn.

The interesting event of this session was now witnessed. The presentation of the crossier, a gift from the Churchmen of the ecclesiastical Province, a beautiful piece of workmanship, costing three hundred dollars, was an unusual event.

The Prolocutor, in the name of the Synod, read an address, to which His Lordship made a most feeling reply, stating among things that he was now seventy-six years of age.

The missionary meeting held last night in Mechanics' Hall was attended by about seven hundred persons. The first address was delivered by Bishop Alford, who was himself a missionary Bishop in China. He spoke earnestly on the subject of missions to that country. The other speakers were the Ven. Archdeacon Whitaker, Canon Partridge, Hon. Vice-Chancellor Blake, Dr. Hill, of Halifax, and Rev. Dr. Bell, of Ireland.

The resolution of Dr. Hill with reference to meetings of the Provincial Synod being held alternately in the Upper and Lower Provinces, called for an animated discussion, partaken in by Hon. Mr. Vail, Rev. Mr. Hodgson and Canon Dart. The resolution, although rejected by a large ma-

majority, will be sure to come up at future meetings.

The House of Bishops sent a message asking for the appointment of a committee to concur with a committee of their body to draft an address to the Governor General who is expected to open the Provincial Exhibition next week.

A Canon, on the prohibited degrees on marriage, and a petition to the Legislature against the proposed change in the marriage law, passed the Provincial Synod by a large majority. Rev. Geo. W. Hodgson, Diocese of Nova Scotia made an able speech.

Dr. Hill's proposition, that the Synod meet in Halifax once in six years instead of in Montreal was not agreed to.
