EXCITEMENT AT HONG KONG

Over a Despatch From Sir Robert Hart

REGARDING THE BURNING OF THE BRITISH LEGATION.

Russia Agrees To Give Japan a Free Hand.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

LONDON, July 7.—The Russian government announces that it will give Japan a free hand to apply military forces in China.

The terms of this consent are summarized in a subjoined despatch from St. Petersburg, under date of July 6, in reply to an enquiry from the Japanese cabinet regarding the despatch of Japanese troops to China to render aid to foreigners in Peking.

The Russian government declared May 27, that it left the Japanese government full liberty of action in this connection, and the Tokio cabinet expressed its readiness to act in full agreement with the other Powers.

It is in consequence of this, no doubt, that Japan is preparing to embark 20,000 more troops.

Political considerations that were thought to have been numbing the action of the Powers are thus laid aside, for the moment at least, by the government supposed to have clearest purpose respecting China's future.

Japan's sending of troops now, can have little bearing on the fate of the foreigners in Peking.

The ruthless thirst for blood is spreading in all the northern provinces, and wherever there are native Christians scenes enacted in the capital are reproduced in miniature.

From these stories nothing further comes regarding the legation forces except a repetition of the report that they are all dead.

CANTON, via Hong Kong, July 7.—Intense excitement has been caused here by a despatch from Sir Robert Hart to the effect that the British legation in Peking was in flames.

Fears are entertained here that the foreign ministers have been massacred.

The entire French colony has fled from Tung Cheu.

The mission station there has been converted into a little fort.

FOUGHT FOR BRITAIN.

A Story From Cleveland Which, If True, Shows the Sympathetic Nature of Roberts.

The British government has just recognized the valor of an American hero, who died in the Transvaal from wounds, received in battle, by presenting to his widow a house and lot in Toronto, Canada, and a pension of \$25 per month to her and four children.

Alfonso De Rochejacquin was a soldier of fortune. Born of French and English parents, he came to this country when a boy, but at the outbreak of one of England's colonial wars he went back to England and enlisted under Lord Roberts. He was with Roberts in many campaigns, and distinguished himself so many times by bravery that the personal attention of Lord Roberts was called to him.

When the Boer war broke out, the Cleveland man wrote to Lord Roberts, offering his services. Roberts replied by sending him transportation to South Africa. Declaring he was a single man, he was permitted to join the Queen's forces, and a few weeks later he was in South Africa fighting under his old commander.

He fell mortally wounded about two months ago, pierced by a Boer bullet, and a few days after died. Lord Roberts visited him in the hospital, and it is said he cried when his brave old soldier died.

Shortly before the Cleveland man's death he told Lord Roberts that he had a wife and four children living in Cleveland, Ohio. Lord Roberts took a personal interest in the family of the hero, and yesterday the widow received notification of the gift of the house and pension.

Robert's Legal Adviser.

CAPE TOWN, July 7.—Advocate Wessels, a leading barrister at Pretoria, left on Friday for this city, to act as the legal adviser of General Roberts. His appointment gives universal satisfaction.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—The Montreal Gazette reports that a new reason for demanding the abolition of the Senate has been given. The institution has refused a charter for a speculative railway, promoted by Messrs McMullen, Campbell and Wood,—three Laurier M. P.

—Here is one of the planks in the Democratic platform at the Kansas Convention: "We view with indignation the war in South Africa and extend our sympathies to the burghers in their unequal struggle." It is now in order for one of the parties in Canada or Great Britain to express its indignation on account of the war in the Philippines, "the unequal struggle," etc.

—At a meeting of the Chamber of Commerce of the Empire held in London, the Montreal resolution in favor of a conference on Imperial defence and suggesting a small uniform ad valorem import duty over and above local tariffs where such exist as the best method for all portions of the Empire to contribute was carried, there being only one dissentient. The question is to be further considered by a commission to be appointed by the Imperial Government.

—By their recent vote, the Ministers at Ottawa have declared that the country is not ripe for prohibition and that all that is needed now is Scott Act amendment and application. This being their opinion, why did they offer the plebiscite and promise to be governed by the result of the vote? They wanted to humbug the prohibitionists; and they succeeded in doing so. Yet the Guardian supports them and the equally impudent humbugs of the Province.

—According to the report of the Public Accounts Committee, of Manitoba, a thousand dollars voted for public charities was, last year, placed in the hands of J. W. Sifton, father of Hon. Clifford Sifton. Of this large sum not one cent reached the legitimate object for which it had been voted, but was accounted for by Mr. Sifton in various false vouchers, the inference being that the money was used as "campaign expense" in the last election. If the Hon. Clifford is the unscrupulous and corrupt politician he is reported to be, it is a case of "as the old cock crows the young one learns."

—Reports from Ottawa show that in the recent Parliamentary discussion of Prohibition Sir Louis Davies maintained that, according to the decision rendered by the Privy Council the Parliament of Canada had no power to pass a prohibitory law which would not apply to Quebec in common with the other provinces. He also said that Prohibition worked serious injury to the cause of temperance in New Brunswick, and the act had to be repealed. What does Sir Louis Davies think about prohibition for P. E. Island? Does he think that prohibition will do serious injury to the cause of temperance here?

Gold From the Klondike

NEW YORK, July 6.—The Canadian Bank of Commerce of this city has received a shipment of \$600,000 in gold from the Klondike. It is rumored that this institution has on the way from Dawson City about \$2,500,000 in gold.
