

Johnnie Kalmuck, Babe Britton Split Honors In Last Night's Fast Class

Johnnie Kalmuck and Babe Britton split the honors in the fast class of the Classified Pace at the Charlotte Driving Park last night with Johnnie winning the first dash by a length and Babe taking the second race in a photo finish.

Gahagan, owned by Dr. George Bishop and driven by Elwood Shaw, was the only double heat winner on the card as the big black son of Brown Prince paced his way to easy victories in the second and sixth dashes.

Jennie Kalmuck and Tartan each won a dash of the Classified Trot while Jerry Lee Volo and Judy Sudlong came home winners in the third and seventh dashes.

The meet was witnessed by a fair sized crowd of racing fans. The most betting was done on the last dash as the patrons tossed \$388.00 into the win pool and \$30 into the place pool.

The last dash also provided the biggest thrill of the meet as Johnnie Kalmuck came up from fourth position to pace a fast last quarter and move to within a nose of Babe Britton at the finish wire.

Len O'Meara took the Babe away in first position and kept there for the mile with A. C. Scott, June Bee and Johnnie Kalmuck following in that order. Johnnie moved up at the three-quarter pole but couldn't quite overcome Babe Britton's lead.

In their first race June Bee went away on top only to see A. G. Scott move to front at the quarter pole with Johnnie Kalmuck in third position and Babe Britton in fourth. Johnnie and Babe came on from the quarter pole with Johnnie winning by a length. Gahagan went away on the outside in the second dash and moved into the lead at the quarter mark ahead of Esso and Prince Budlong. He came under a length and a half in front of Tartan Brewer and Prince Budlong.

In the sixth dash Dick Erla set the pace for the first five-eighths of the mile before Gahagan moved up from fourth place to take over the lead. Prince Budlong came on to finish second in a close battle with Dick Erla. The quinella of Gahagan and Prince Budlong paid \$6.90.

Jerry Lee Volo led from wire to wire in winning the first dash of the Classified Pace. Judy Budlong moved up from second place in the stretch to pass Mighty Deb and win the second dash of this event. Judy, driven by owner Cyril Smith, made her best showing of the season as she also placed second on Jerry Lee Volo in the first dash.

The Moreside kept Tartan flat as he won the second dash of the Classified Trot with Chet Lyn Clever placing second. Jennie Kalmuck won the first dash of the trot.

The Summerville junior baseball team defeated the Newport baseball club 15-5 on Sunday afternoon for their fifth straight win out of six starts.

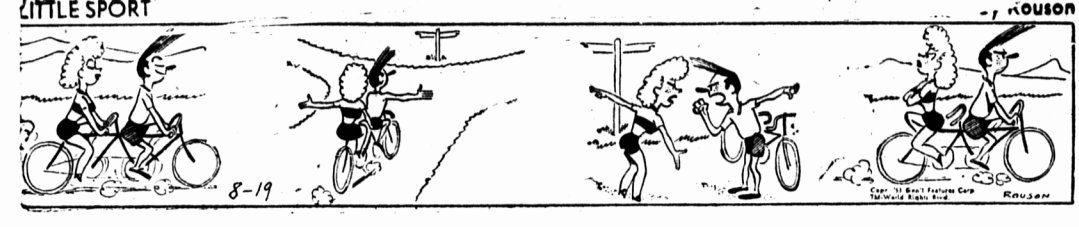
