

# Halifax Tied With Glace Bay For 3rd Place After 5-0 Win Over Miners

GLACE BAY, N. S., Jan. 21 — (CP)—Halifax St. Mary's regained a third-place Maritime Major Hockey League tie with Glace Bay Miners tonight, blanking the Coalmen 5-0 in a quiet game. They each have 54 points, only a game behind second-place Charlottetown Islanders.

Centre Dewar Thompson paced the visitors with three points; a goal and two assists. Defenceman Danny Nixon started the landslide with a blistering shot that fooled goalie Bob Arneil of Miners at 12:39 of the first period. Miners played good hockey in the opener but failed to beat Halifax goalie Strachan, though outshooting Saints 10-8.

Bill Ford put Saints ahead 2-0 at 3:47 of the middle frame on a three-way combination with Thompson and big Bob Drainville. Glace Bay held Saints off again until early in the third period when Johnny Morrow flipped the puck into the corner of the net.

Thompson's turn came next. Ken MacKenzie fed him a cross-ice pass outside the blue line and the Winnipeg native scored at 9:00. Two minutes later Pete Leswick finished a play started by Nixon.

Only five penalties were handed out.

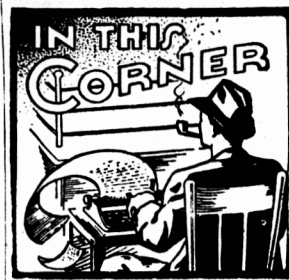

# Millionaires Come From Behind To Tie Saint John Beavers 2-2

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Jan. 21 — (CP)—Sydney Millionaires earned a 2-2 draw with Saint John Beavers by rallying for a third period brace in a Maritime Major Hockey League fixture before a small crowd tonight.

Goals by Carl Smelle and Ken Watson gave Beavers a 2-0 lead in the first session. The sandwich frame was scoreless. Frank Bathgate and Fred Hildebrand counted in the last period.

In gaining the single point Saint John finished with a 13-point lead over the idle, second place Charlottetown Islanders. Sydney, in the cellar, is only one point below Moncton Hawks.

The contest produced only four minor penalties.
