Illustration Station Field Day At Alliston

A very instructive illustration station field day was held yesterday afternoon on the farm of Mr. Albert Hicken at Alliston. Mr. Norman Black, supervisor of Illustration Stations for the Federal Department of Agriculture, opened the program and welcomed the large number of visitors. He also introduced each special speaker the first of whom was Mr. G. C. Warren, horticulturist. Mr. Warren took the group to the orchard where he graphically explained the method of grafting to obtain double working orchard trees which would result in a hardy type of tree. He also explained the proper methods of pruning and the types of spray used and the methods for applying.

Efforts To Free Stranded Freighter Being Continued

The powerful tug, Foundation Vera, arrived in Georgetown yesterday from Halifax and this morning will put a towline aboard the German freighter Hendrik Fisser in an effort to pull the latter off the reef at Burnt Point at the entrance to Georgetown Harbour.

The German ship arrived at the harbour mouth Sunday night and anchored while waiting more favourable weather before putting into port to complete loading a cargo of pit props. However, a sudden squall Monday morning arose just after the vessel had weighed anchor and blew her onto the reef where she was apparently hung amidships.

Yesterday the tug Brigadon from Pietou Landing and the Public Works Department tug Glenlivet II made a combined effort to release the freighter, but without success. Should the powerful Halifax tug also fail today her parent company, Foundation Maritime Limited, will send another tug at once to aid in the task. The two tugs on the scene yesterday tried for over an hour during high tide but could not slide the ship into deep water.

The I.W. Winck, under command of Capt. A. Johannesson and is one of the most modern constructed ships ever to enter Georgetown Harbour. Only seven months old her crew quarters are reported to be the equal of those supplied many first class passengers on the Atlantic run.
