

OPENING COMMUNITY HOSPITAL, O'LEARY WEDNESDAY

Minister Of Health To Lay Cornerstone Of New Hospital

The official opening of a modern up-to-date 27 bed community hospital in O'Leary will take place on July 3rd with the opening ceremony and other community observations to mark the occasion.

The cornerstone will be laid at 4 p.m. by Dr. M.L. Bonnell, Minister of Health and Welfare followed by the official opening by a representative of the Federal Dept of Health and Welfare. Premier A.W. Matheson, Dr. O.H. Phillips, and a number of other prominent officials will be present.

At 4 o'clock the Ladies Aid of the new hospital will serve a turkey dinner. The building will be open for inspection by the public during the afternoon and evening.

The building is two and a half stories, 166 x 40 with a pitch roof. Besides the main entrance there is an ambulance entrance on the right of the front and a service entrance in the rear. Stairways lead to the main and lower floors from all three entrances.

Construction of the new hospital, which is located on the outskirts of the village on a road leading to Mount Royal not far from the United Church, was started last fall and it is expected to be ready for occupancy shortly after the official opening.

The main floor contains a nurses station with adjoining drug room and bath room, admittance room, office, diet kitchen, linen storage, dumb waiter from kitchen on lower floor to diet kitchen, nursery, children's four bed ward, two maternity rooms, sterilizer and storage for sterilized linen, two full bathrooms, two rooms with toilet and basin, doctor's rest room, X-ray room, isolation ward, operating room and space for twenty-four beds.

On the lower floor are three patients rooms, nurses rest room, Matron's Room, lab, oil furnace room, and staff locker room each with toilet and basin, large general storage room, kitchen equipped with cupboards, refrigerator, range, steam tables, adjoining the kitchen is the grocery storage and walk in refrigerator, dining room cafeteria room style. Sharks Disrupt Mackerel Fishing Out Of Alberton

A heavy concentration of sharks is making mackerel fishing unprofitable for fishermen engaged in this branch of the industry out of Alberton Harbour. A veteran fisherman, George McBeth, estimates he has caught over sixty this year and just two days ago he found a ten foot shark in almost every one of his fifteen mackerel nets with consequent damage to the gear.

Most of the sharks, which average between four and five hundred pounds, are dead when the nets are overhauled but still present a formidable task for the men who have to remove them from the ruined net. A live one is an even greater problem and means even heavier damage to the net by the time it has been disposed of.

The sharks are also after the mackerel which explains their presence on the fishing grounds but local fishermen cannot recall catching them in such numbers before.

Usually only one or two are caught in a season. Mackerel nets are set about ten miles off shore.

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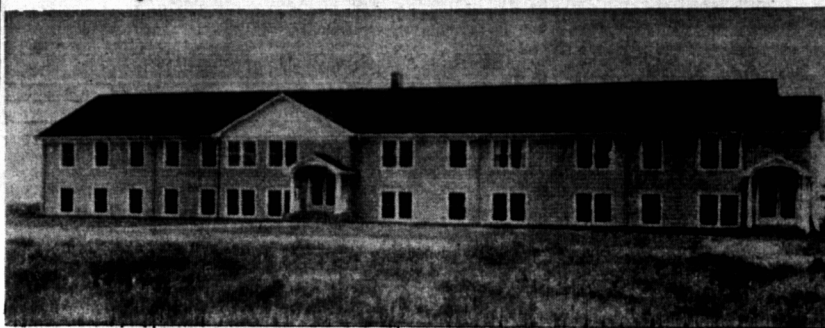
