THE SOUTHERN RAILWAY A FOOTBALL FOR GRITS

SIR.—The Belfast and Murray Harbor Railway appears to be used only as a football for the Government. Is it not time for the people to rise up in their might and hurl the miserable cabal that misrules this country from power? Pretending purity and economy in public affairs, both Dominion and Local, they have shown the cloven foot and betrayed the country. The Government of this Province and of every Province under Grit misrule as well as that of Canada are alike. The Provincial Government in 1896 prostituted the resources in the several Provinces to obtain control of the public purse at Ottawa. Having succeeded in so doing the Government at Ottawa debauched the electorate as shown in the bye elections, and are now preparing to corrupt the country by every means known to a weak, servile, unprincipled and unscrupulous administration.

It appears to be impossible for the Liberal party to take hold of any public question in a straightforward manner. It is one thing in office and the reverse out of it. It is free trade on the stump and protection in power. It is reciprocity with the United States when talking to the people; but they say "Canada does not need it" as soon as they turn their back on them. Indeed one could go on from one subject to another till every branch of the public service is exhausted—and the story would be the same.

Take the action of the Liberal party thirty years ago on the Belfast and Murray Harbor Railway—the Liberals cheated Belfast on the railway then. In 1895 when the people of Belfast and Murray Harbor started the railway agitation anew—which by the way made the railway a certainty. The Liberals howled, hooped and ridiculed the agitation. In 1896 Sir Louis H. Davies in the House of Commons vowed that the supplementary estimates which Sir Richard Cartwright admitted not long ago contained an item of 127 miles of railway, the Belfast, Murray Harbor and Elmira and other branches, should never pass. He said in Charlottetown afterwards that they had the Government by the throat and would not let them pass those estimates. Sir Louis afterwards went to Belfast during the campaign of 1896 and pledged himself. But how has that pledge been redeemed? The first session of the Liberal Administration passed without anything being done,—not even the preliminary survey. A provincial election was held in 1897, and a so-called survey took place, with loop-lines to catch votes. The railway was to go anywhere or everywhere to trap votes. The engineers were under the control of Messrs George Forbes, H. C. McDonald (now judge) D. A. McKinnon, etc., candidates running in Belfast and Murray Harbor. The elections in 1897 were over. The railway survey served its purpose. The grit candidates won.

There were no elections during 1898 and the railway and survey were practically dead. The present year, 1899 is ushered in and finds the Liberals again in the toils. They have to face the people once more. They know well the people have no confidence in them. A sum of money is voted by Parliament; and, though no preparation is made to spend one dollar of it, Grit heeled, Grit candidates and members of the Legislature, go shouting through the country as if the railway were actually built and in operation.

Meantime Sir L. H. Davies looks down from his high position and awaits the result of his scheme for a survey with alternate routes or double lines, or as he calls them "loop lines." With those he is to play off with the assistance of some of his wily followers—one part of the country against the other. By this method he is trying to win a seat for one of his henchmen in Belfast or Murray Harbor or Fort Augustus. But will such inequitable means prevail? Does he mean to defeat the railway project by setting one section against another? Should not a good serviceable route be left to the hands of competent engineers—who should make themselves acquainted with the wants of the country and not be left with grit politicians to serve their own purposes as a football.
