THE NEWS IN SHORT METRE.

Items of Interest Billed Down For More
 Easy Reading.
 Mr. Swinburne, the poet, laughs at the
 idea of establishing an English Academy
 of Immortals.
 The Northern Illinois coal strike has
 ended, and twelve thousand men have
 returned to work.
 The smelt fishing at Tracadie, N. B., is
 very good and quite a number of men and
 women are engaged in that business.

Mr. George Askwith, the lawyer who
 accompanied Lord Dufferin to the United
 States, has been appointed junior counsel
 for Great Britain on the Venezuela Arbitra-
 tion.
 The Queen gave a birthday party at
 Windsor last week in honor of Prince
 Alexander of Battenberg, aged 11. Pic-
 tures were given of scenes in the Jubilee
 celebration.
 Justice Burbidge has granted an
 injunction against Messrs. Lee and Butler
 of London, from selling and using
 "Apollo" light, as being an infringement of
 the Auer patents.

For three days large numbers of the
 Queen's photographs with her autograph
 thereon were sold at the Windsor bazaar
 in aid of the Royal Albert institution. The
 Queen signed fresh photographs as the
 stock ran short.
 W. E. Roscoe, Q. C. will defend the
 Windsor incendiary suspects, McIntyre
 and Fletcher. They will ask to be tried
 next week before Judge Chipman at Kent-
 ville. There is doubt whether or not
 the trial can be heard outside of Hants
 county.

Sir Richard Cartwright has received a
 very voluminous report from Mr. E. E.
 Sheppard, Canadian Commissioner to
 Uruguay and Brazil. The report is well
 written and highly descriptive, showing
 that the ground has been gone over thor-
 oughly and that Mr. Sheppard is familiar
 with the countries. It implies that in Mr.
 Sheppard's opinion these are good fields
 for Canadian enterprise in many lines.
 The trouble in the Austro-Hungarian
 empire seems to be that in Austria there
 are 8,461,580 Germans, 5,472,871 Czechs,
 3,719,232 Poles, 3,105,221 Rumanians,
 1,176,672 Slovenians, 975,305 Italians,
 644,926 Croats and Serbs, 209,110
 Rumanian and 430,496 others, while in
 Hungary there is a similar diversity of
 races. And each declines to mix with the
 other.

Hon. Messrs. Blair and Tarte have
 returned from their trip over the Parry
 Sound railway. Mr. Tarte states that there
 are great possibilities for the Intercolonial
 in the opening of this road. One elevator
 of a million bushels capacity is already
 built at Depot harbor and three others are
 to be constructed. Nearly all the grain
 they can hold could be shipped from the
 maritime province ports, but of course
 the government will have to give a favorable
 rate over the Intercolonial.

The London Daily Graphic makes
 prominent an announcement which it
 claims represents the views of the British
 Government as to the Anglo-French
 complications in the vicinity of the
 disputed Niger territory. It says:
 "Great Britain will carefully avoid
 imitating the French policy of effective
 occupation in the disputed territory of the
 Lagos Hinterland. Although a small
 French force has occupied Kishi, a dispu-
 ted town, no attempt will be made to dis-
 lodge them, pending the discussion as to
 the boundaries now in progress in
 Paris.
 "The British force is being collected in
 the North of Lagos only to be ready for the
 occupation and organization of the Borgu
 district, which, it is expected will be in-
 cluded in the British sphere as a result of the
 Paris conference.

CAIRO, November 30.—The Khedive
 has been safely delivered of a daughter.
 The Khedive, prior to her espousal by the
 Khedive on February 19, 1895, was a
 favorite slave in the harem, and known as
 Lady Ikbul Hanoum. She is about 26
 years old, and, therefore, about four years
 older than the Khedive. This daughter is
 the second she has borne. Almost
 immediately after the birth of the first
 Abbas Hilmi signed a marriage contract
 with her in the presence of the Egyptian
 Minister, that act constituting a marriage
 to a slave, and there being no public cer-
 mony it was expected, even in native circles
 that he would follow the European custom
 of espousing her; but, there were complica-
 ted questions of Egyptian law involved.

FALSE TEETH THAT GROW.—It is said
 that a Moscow dentist has solved the prob-
 lem of supplying the human mouth with
 false teeth which will grow into the gum
 as firmly as natural ones. Dr. Zamesky
 has performed several successful opera-
 tions on dogs as well as human beings.
 The teeth are made of gutta percha, por-
 celain, or metal, as the case may be. A
 the root of the false tooth holes are made
 holes are also made upward into the jaw.
 The tooth is then placed in the cavity. In
 a short time a soft granular growth finds
 its way from the patient's jaw into the
 holes in the tooth. This growth gradually
 hardens and holds the tooth in position.
 It is stated that it does not matter whether
 the cavity in which the tooth is to be placed
 is one from which a natural tooth has
 been drawn recently, or whether it has
 been healed for some years.
