LAMB SHIPMENTS.—Mr. J. O'Brien shipped 196 lambs from Summerside to St. John on Friday last, and on the following day Mr. McLean, of North Wiltshire shipped 200 more to the same place.

FROM BOSTON.—The Steamer Worcester, Captain Nickerson arrived from Boston about half past eleven yesterday forenoon with a general cargo and Mrs. Abbott, Mr. P. Groehan and Mr and Mrs Hiltz as passengers.

A NEW ORDER.—A circle of the Order of Canadian Home Circles, was organized in Moncton a few evenings ago, with Mr. C. W. Bradley as leader. The order is similar to the Foresters, but ladies are eligible which is not the case in the Foresters.

A MONUMENT FOR RIEL.—It is understood that a monument has been procured for the grave of Louis Riel, the executed leader of the late rebellion in the Northwest, which will be forwarded in a few days. It bears the inscription, "Riel, 16th November, 1885."

YACHT RACE.—The match race between the yachts Gitana and Harp was started this forenoon, but when passing Connelly's Wharf and about half over the course the boats fouled and the crew of the Gitana brought her ashore when they protested against proceeding further with the race.

TO REDUCE THE RATE.—A movement to obtain one cent postage rate for letters has been started in the United States. It will probably be remembered that one cent postage was a plank in the Republican platform of 1888, and it is said that the Postmaster-General, Mr. Wannamaker, will recommend the reduction in his next report and bring it before Congress in December.

CIVIC.—At a special meeting of the City Council held at noon to-day, Mr. Duncan McLean was appointed City Clerk, pro tem, in the place of Mr. A. H. McPherson, who tendered his resignation because of ill-health. A resolution providing that Mr. H. McL. Davison, be appointed to the position was carried by the casting vote of the Mayor. Councillors Byrnes, Hughes, Crabbe, Eden, and McCarron, supported Mr. McLean's application. Councillors Morris, Davison, Douse, Large and Taylor, were favorable to the appointment of Mr. Davison.

KANGAROOS TO BE IMPORTED.—We are assured, on what seems good authority, that the project of importing kangaroos into this country is seriously entertained by several enthusiastic and wealthy sportsmen of the west. The animals have been successfully acclimated in England and France, and we are assured that there is no reason why they should not thrive here. The practical extinction of the buffalo has left the plains without any big game of importance, and experienced sportsmen declare that hunting the kangaroo, as practised in Australia, is found in excitement and interest only to killing the buffalo.—Helen Independent.

TROTTING AT RUSTICO.—The races on the Rustico Driving Park on Saturday, were fairly well attended. Match race between Rustico Dean and Yellow Bird came off first. Yellow Bird took first third and sixth heat and the race. In the second heat Yellow Bird's sulky upset just after the word "go" was given, and Dean went on the track alone. There were five starters in the three minute class, viz: McMillan's Rustico Chief, Stead's Dean horse, Ed. Harvey's Mad H., third, and Stewart's horse fourth. In the second heat Stead's horse captured first place; Chief, second; and H., third; at Stewart's horse, fourth. The third heat was won by Chief with Stead's horse second, Stewart's third, and Maud H. fourth. Chief took the fourth heat with Dean second, Maud H. third and Stewart's horse fourth. The track was not in very good condition.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. Railway and Steamship Matters.

OTTAWA, Oct. 19. Bryce Douglas, agent of the Huntington syndicate, has just returned from the Pacific Coast and expresses entire satisfaction in the efficiency of the transcontinental railway and its terminal facilities at Vancouver. He will now press upon the Government the offer of his company in connection with the Atlantic fast mail service. It is understood that the company will guarantee a service from Plymouth to Halifax in five days and to Quebec in five and a half days. The other offers before the Government are from German and French companies.

Another North-East Gale.

NORTH SYDNEY, C. B., Oct. 18. Another heavy north-east gale is prevailing along the Eastern coast of Cape Breton, accompanied by rain and fog. The Government steamer Napoleon III. went ashore this morning about 8 o'clock, at the entrance to Little Glace Bay. She is in the breakers. The seas are running high, and the probabilities are that she will break up before the storm abates. The American schooner Velocepede, Captain Goodwin, bound for Gloucester with a cargo of fish, went ashore at Green Harbor, and is a total loss. The schooner Charles Tupper is a total wreck at Glace Bay. Crew saved.

News From Halifax.

HALIFAX, Oct. 19. Senator Archibald, of Cape Breton, is dead. He was called to the Senate of Canada by royal proclamation in 1867. There has been a great rush at the Mines Office lately in the taking up of gold areas. There are now eight warships in port. The fleet will probably sail for Bermuda on November 15th. The Buzzard arrived this morning with jibboom and foremast carried away. She also lost the torpedo boat that she was towing from North Sydney to this port. It is thought that the boat sank. The Buzzard reports a violent storm. She had to lay to for twenty-four hours.

To Make New Proposals.

TORONTO, Oct. 19. The Globe's London cable says there is good authority for stating that Lord Salisbury is about to make fresh proposals to France respecting the Newfoundland question on the basis of free access by French fishermen to the Newfoundland bait supply in return for the abrogation of the French bounties. It is possible that the repeal of the bait law will also form the basis of a mission to Washington.

Of a Superior Quality.

OTTAWA, Oct. 19. The Admiral of the North Pacific Squadron, who was commissioned by the War Office to examine the quality of the anthracite coal at Dunmore, Rocky Mountains, has reported that tests showed it to be much superior to the Welsh smokeless coal now used by the navy. This will doubtless lead to large orders from the Pacific war vessels.

WOODSTOCK, Ont., Oct. 19. Birchall is busily engaged upon his biographic work, and is in treaty with a New York man for the same, which the doomed man values at \$2,000. Whatever he gets will go to his widow.

Coal Miners Strike.

BRUSSELS, Oct. 19. Three thousand miners have gone on strike in Charleroi district and demand an increase in wages. It is expected that the movement will extend, and that there will be a general strike of coal miners.

Lord Aberdeen Expected.

OTTAWA, Oct. 19. Lord Aberdeen is expected to return here from the Pacific coast on Thursday.

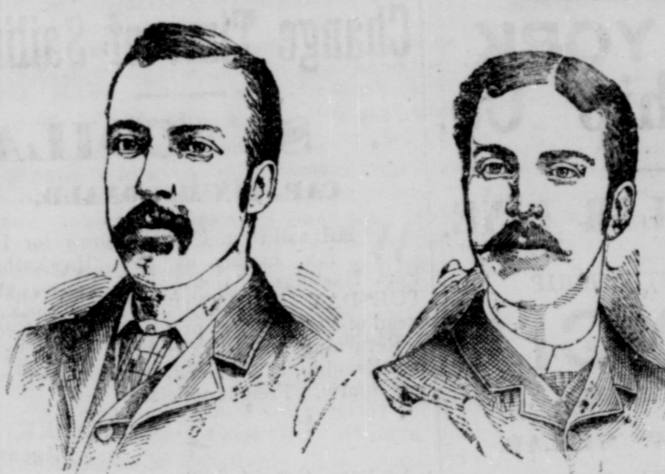
