Duke Of Edinburgh Launches Club For Canadians In London

A smiling Duke of Edinburgh gave the newly-formed Canadian Universities Club in London a royal send-off when as guest of honor at the club's inaugural dinner and dance at the Dorchester Hotel he said:

"If this gathering is anything to judge by, I feel sure it will fulfill the highest expectations of its illegal organizers."

The Duke spoke of "illegal organizers" in a humorous reference to the opening remarks of David M. Legate, president, who confessed that the club's officers had elected themselves.

"We are a wholly illegal body," said Mr. Legate, a graduate of McGill University. "We elected ourselves without any warrant whatsoever in order to ensure that we had seats at the head table tonight."

Commented the Duke: "Whether the club is legally constituted or not, I believe it is a useful organization and I wish it the greatest possible success."

GREATEST KINDNESS

"Everywhere I went in Canada during my recent tour people showed me the greatest kindness and hospitality. It is my sincere hope that the Canadians who make up the membership of this new organization will receive that kind of hospitality here in England."

In reflective mood he continued: "It occurs to me there is one practical advantage in being born in this Commonwealth of ours—we can move about from one country to another with a minimum of trouble."

"Your president, Mr. Legate, is a good example of this. I understand his father was born in Ireland. He himself was brought up in Australia. He went to University in Canada and now he is in England."

"Personally I think it has done him a lot of good."

With his easy, debonair manners, the Duke enabled Mr. Legate to carry out his intention of "taking the starch" out of the inaugural gathering.

He sat smiling and chatting in the centre of a glittering head table, more like the captain of a college cricket team than a royal visitor, and set the mood of the evening for the large and distinguished company comprising the club's membership and its guests.

"Don't you get bored meeting so many thousands of people?" the Duke was asked by Mrs. Legate, wife of the president, who sat on his right.

"No," he replied. "You see I regard them as a cross section of life and as such they are all extremely interesting."

Between courses the Duke thrust one hand into the pocket of his dinner jacket (tuxedo) and waved with the other to people he recognized. Near him were Field Marshal the Earl Alexander of Tunis and Major General the Earl of Athlone and Princess Alice, Countess of Athlone; the Canadian High

Commissioner and Mrs. Norman Robertson.

As he was leaving the table the Duke stopped to chat with Earl Alexander.

"What does one do with daughters?" asked the Earl inclining his head towards Lady Rose. Then he added: "Leave them alone, I suppose."

The Duke laughed. Earlier in the evening, Mr. Legate read a goodwill message from Queen Elizabeth, following the toast of "The Queen," and welcomed the representatives of 15 Canadian universities to club membership.

"Tonight," he said, "we inaugurate the Canadian Universities Club—the first of its kind in the United Kingdom. Hundreds of people have written in asking what our plans are, and the truth is we just don't know. We have been too busy electing ourselves."

"We hope, nevertheless, that the future holds bright prospects for us and that this club will not only serve Canadians living in Britain but will encourage young Britishers to embark on courses of study at Canadian universities."

Also at the head table were Tom B. Hop, honorary secretary, Canadian Universities Club; Frank Cahoon, vice-president; Dr. John Collier, honorary treasurer; Li-toung to the Duke of Edinburgh.

Oldest among the Canadian University students present were Mrs. G. J. Allen, who graduated from the University of Toronto in 1892, and Mrs. E. L. Sullivan, who graduated from Dalhousie in 1896.

Other representatives of the University of Dalhousie included the Earl of Dalhousie, M.C., a descendant of Lord Dalhousie who founded the university in 1820; Professor John Cameron, one of its most distinguished lecturers; Dr. A. P. Mazonet, president of the Medical Hypnosis Association in Britain and his brother, Dr. H. Mazonet.

All-German Elections Likely Next Moscow Aim

The Soviet press leaves little doubt that Moscow's next move in its war against the Western European union will be an offer to negotiate means of conducting free all-German elections.

A similar move can be expected on the Asian front, with a bid to negotiate means of unifying North and South Korea.

Both moves, which will have a surface look of reasonableness, will in reality have the aim of upsetting the Western time table. Negotiations, no matter how reasonable the original offer might look, can be drawn out for as long as the Russians can persuade their opponents to keep talking.

OFFER TO TALK

The move with regard to Germany can be expected to be as dramatic as the Communist can make it, complete with fanfare and beating of drums. Hints in the Soviet press indicate the move will be made in this way:

The Moscow-controlled East German regime again will offer to talk with West German representatives on the future of all Germany. At the same time, propaganda will be started for yet another four-power meeting looking toward "peaceful solution of the German problem by means of preparation and conduct of all-German democratic elections," to use the Communists' words.

Paraphrasing the word "democratic" when employed by the Communists has little in common with the Western definition of the word. The East German regime then will be told to suggest that in all reasonableness it would not expect the West Germans to consent to an election under strictly East German procedures. On the other hand, the Communists will probably say, the West Germans can not expect the East regime to consent to an

election strictly under Western procedures. Thus, first of all, the question of how the elections are to be conducted must be negotiated. This in itself can be an endless affair.

Similarly on the Far Eastern front the negotiations could be endless. But Moscow can score a propaganda victory in the role of prime mover for peace.

Suggest Standard Set of Questions On Canadian Automobile Accidents

OTTAWA, (CP)—A standard set of questions to provide uniform statistics on automobile accidents across Canada were recommended Friday night by a Dominion-provincial conference on motor vehicle statistics. They are designed for use in highway safety programs.

The standard question procedure will be recommended to the federal and provincial governments and if approved could become effective in all provinces. At present the type of questions asked drivers involved in accidents vary from province to province.

The standard set of questions would elicit not only factual information on how the accident occurred but would provide information about the driver's experience, who taught him to drive and how many hours he had driven without rest prior to the accident.

Hon. Gordon E. Taylor, Alberta minister of highways and vice-chairman of the conference, told its closing session late Friday that "we must know the how, when, where and who of traffic accident occurrence if we are going to be able to do anything effective to reduce the steadily mounting toll of traffic fatalities and injuries and the appalling destruction of millions of dollars worth of property on our roads."

He told the delegates that 3,000 persons are killed and almost 80,000 injured in Canadian traffic accidents every year. Uniform, detailed statistics were necessary to "stop this massacre."

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Ford-Union Talks To Resume

WINDSOR, Ont. (CP)—Charles McDonald, president of Local 200, United Automobile Workers (UAW), said Sunday, he will meet with representatives of the Ford Motor Company of Canada to try to settle a nine-week-old strike.

He made the announcement after a 90-minute meeting of the National Ford Council of Canada, which represents locals at the three Ford plants in Ontario, all of which are on strike.

His announcement was in reply to a request from Ontario Labor Minister Daley that the two parties resume negotiations. The company had previously said it is willing to meet with the Union.
