Raising P.W.C. to Degree Status Seen As Feasible

In a brief presented to the provincial government last April and made available to the public yesterday, a citizens committee declared "It is entirely feasible from educational, administrative and financial viewpoints to proceed immediately with the proposal to elevate Prince of Wales College to the level of a degree granting institution."

The committee considers that such a step "would not constitute a major additional drain on provincial resources."

It is suggested that, initially, degrees be limited to those in arts, science and education plus the granting of diplomas in agricultural sciences, fisheries and secretarial science.

The committee suggested that PWC as a university be a "non-sectarian, publicly owned institution open to students of all religions and ethnic groups."

The committee estimated that PWC as a university would cost approximately \$500,000 to operate in the first year. The committee felt this amount would be derived from approximately 600 students at \$30 annual fee.
