SIR WILFRID UNPARLIAMENTARY

In Reply to Sir Chas. H. Tupper

REGARDING LATTER'S CHARGES AGAINST MAJOR WALSH

Resolutions Moved to Make Heads of Departments Responsible.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

OTTAWA, June 1.—On the motion to go into supply, Sir Charles Tupper moved the following resolution, merely remarking that he thought it would be found acceptable to the whole House and that the Government could not object to it:

The resolution was in effect that Ministers of the Crown having entire control over public departments are bound to assume the responsibility for every official act and not place the blame on the shoulders of subordinates.

Sir Wilfred Laurier accepted the resolution, stating that the Government had no intention of disclaiming responsibility for its officers.

The Premier stated that Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper's reflections on Major Walsh were conceived in wanton malice, and he had been forced to dismiss several officers with whom they could not get along, and he was prepared to accept the resolution with all his heart.

Sir Hibbert Tupper called the attention of the Speaker to the statement of the Premier that his charges against Walsh were conceived in malice.

The Speaker said Sir Wilfrid Laurier's language was most unparliamentary.

The Premier observed that he regretted Sir Charles H. Tupper's conduct was such that he could not describe it in Parliamentary language.

Sir Hibbert observed that this was an extraordinary apology to come from a man whose reputation rested chiefly on his manners. He assured the Premier that his Yukon changes were in the public interests and that he made them because the public business was injuriously affected by drunkenness and immorality. He intended to prefer them again in a more solemn form on another occasion.

Reduction in Iron Duties.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER]

OTTAWA, June 1.—The Government proposes gradually to reduce the bounties on steel ingots, puddled iron bars, and pig iron made in Canada.

These bounties today are practically \$3 per ton. From April 23rd, 1902 to June 30th 1903 the bounties are to be 90 per cent of \$3; for the following year 75 per cent; from July 1st, 1904 to June 30th 1905, 55 per cent. For the year following bounties are to be 35 per cent and from July 1st 1906 to June 30th 1907 20 per cent.

Court Strathcona in Luck

A vote being taken, the members were unanimous in favoring the annual payment of two hundred dollars. Notwithstanding the busy season the meeting was large, and every one went home satisfied that the evening was spent to advantage.
