## Lions Plan Centennial Dress Carnival, Jan. 20

A centennial winter dress carnival will be held at the Charlottetown Forum, Jan. 20 under the sponsorship of the Charlottetown Lions Club, it was announced by club officials over the weekend.

The carnival, which will feature competitions in six different costume categories for boys and girls between the ages of six to 14 years, will also include a varied program of entertainment for young and old alike, topped off with a free skate for all.

A host of valuable prizes are being lined up for the first, second and third place winners of the various fancy dress competitions which will include such categories as entomological, western, fairyland, best couple, foreign and most original costume design.

The choosing of a king and queen of the carnival will be made during the next few weeks, including the distribution of entrance forms for those wishing to take part, and it is also hoped that window displays and ticket sales will be carried out in convenient points in the city to publicize the big event.

All in all, the Lions are going all out to make this a winter centennial event that will provide entertainment for the children and adults of the community.

## LOCAL BREEDERS Go't Will Consider Aid To Highland College

Following a request by the P.E.I. Tourist Association, Premier Walter R. Shaw said Saturday the provincial government will give consideration to providing financial aid for the construction of the Highland College at North Rustico.

Premier Shaw said the matter has been handed over to Dr. George Dewar, minister of education, for study and will come up again at a later meeting of the cabinet.

Whether or not the idea will receive full support of the government, however, is another matter. Premier Shaw pointed out that his government men and women in the tourist industry, including the elements securing the advantage of that huge expenditure should possibly be interested in supporting the college. "There is no doubt that the college should be supported financially, culture and training to our summer festivities."

## COAL SUPPLY SHORT HERE?

Premier Walter R. Shaw said Saturday that he would check reports that there may be a shortage of coal in Charlottetown. The Premier, however, was not available for comment last night.

He said earlier that he would check with dealers on Saturday and early this week to see about any shortage and what could be done about it.

A number of coal suppliers said Saturday there was no immediate overall shortage although two said they were in short supply. One reported that the biggest problem was in making the deliveries.
