

S.D.U. Host College To Maritime Debating League

While most of the students at St. Dunstan's University were at home enjoying the Thanksgiving weekend, the college had the unique and delightful good fortune to welcome to the campus delegates from nine major universities to the annual conference of the Maritime Intercollegiate Debating League. Each year representatives from the ten camps meet at different colleges in rotation to discuss debating problems and suggestions towards improving the league. This year was the first occasion since the formation of the league that St. Dunstan's was the host college.

The conference, which lasted for only one session was perhaps the shortest and most successful on record. Yet despite its brevity many important items were discussed, and much was accomplished. The most of the credit for success must go to the delegates themselves who went about the business at hand in a manner that would put many of our legislative members to shame. The result was that nine items on

the agenda were leaned up in less than three and one-half hours. Discussion arose during the conference as to the possibility of having a model parliament within the M. I. D. L. This year but when the motion put to a vote carried by a slim 5-to-4 majority, it was decided to forego any action until some college would take it upon itself to study the entire issue and report to next year's meeting scheduled for St. Francis Xavier University in Antigonish. Another motion of importance locally was the proposal that lady debaters be barred from the M. I. D. L. but this met with defeat when put to a vote.

Several sections from recommendations of the Canadian University Debating Association, were adopted as part of the M. I. D. L. constitution. The association had made a study of the four debating league constitutions across Canada with a view towards standardizing debating rules.

The executive of the St. Dunstan's unit of the Maritime Intercollegiate

Debating League, by way of rotation, becomes the executive for the Maritimes. This year's executive is: President, Ian Gillies, Halifax; Vice-president, Donald MacDougall, Bloomfield; secretary-treasurer, Leo Peddle, Corner Brook, Newfoundland; Committee members; Michael Quigley, Quebec City; and Mary Elaine Trainor, Charlottetown.

Universities represented at the conference were: St. Thomas, U. N. B. Law, Mount Allison, Acadia, St. Francis Xavier, Dalhousie, Kings, St. Mary's and St. Dunstan's. Two lady delegates were among the 18 members present. The University of New Brunswick was the only college which did not send delegates.

2 Tankers At Railway Wharf

The Imperial Oil tanker, "Imperial Sarnia" was tied up at the local wharf at 5 p.m. yesterday with a load of fuel for the new plant at the eastern side of the City. Under command of Capt. N. B. Bags, the tanker will discharge 14,500 gallons of regular gasoline and 4,814 barrels of high test before leaving for Campbellton, B.B., this morning.

The M.V. Curling from Grandstone, Magdalen Islands, skippered by Capt. Gerald Williams docked on Sunday. She also is on a call for the Imperial Oil Company. She will take on a load of steel at the local wharf and deliver it to her home port later in the week.

The third vessel is the "Glenwood" out of Saint John's, New Brunswick. The Glenwood will take on a cargo of potatoes before leaving shortly.

LAKELAND, Fla. (AP) — Florida citrus growers began a campaign Monday to get Canada to lift its ban on Florida oranges which have been colored.

About nine-tenths of all Florida oranges moving into Canada before the ban became effective last week were color-added.

The Florida citrus commission meets today to discuss whether to send Dr. L. G. McDowell, its director of research, to Canada to confer on the problem there. U. S. Embassy spokesmen in Ottawa said they will discuss the ban with Canadian officials today.
