Child Training

will be years before he will brush his teeth without urging, but it should be possible before long to have him head for his toothbrush at the first reminder. Of course, the best way to develop the tooth-brushing habit is by example. If the whole family automatically makes for their toothbrushes as soon as they get up from a meal, Junior is going to tag along without being told.

The reason it is so important to brush your teeth immediately after eating is that tooth decay is caused by acids produced by bacteria feeding on sweet food particles in the mouth. Brush them away, and you've brushed out the possibility of decay.

Decay is increased by sweet foods—such as cake, jam, pies and candy. Encourage your child to eat the foods for health: milk, fruits, vegetables, meat, fish, eggs, cheese, and whole-grain cereals. Limit his candy-eating to after meals, just before tooth-brushing.

YOUR CHILD CAN:

- *Take pride in shining, white teeth.
- *Get the habit of brushing them within ten minutes of eating.
- *Form the habit of eating protective foods: milk, peanut butter, brown bread, cheese or nuts—instead of tooth-destroying foods: soft drinks, candy, gum and cake.
