ANOTHER LANDMARK GONE.—The death is announced at Hazel Grove, Old Town Road, of John Bertram, Esq., at the age of 77 years. The deceased was born in Charlottetown in the year 1818, and was the third son of the late Sergeant-Major Bertram, of the Royal Artillery, which regiment was sent out from the north of Ireland to Charlottetown in 1812. At the age of 22 the deceased married Miss Campbell, daughter of the late Alexander Campbell, Esq., of New Glasgow Road, who still survives him. They had nine sons and four daughters, all of whom, but two, are living, besides thirty-seven grandchildren. The very large concourse of mourning friends who followed the remains to their last earthly resting place at Brookfield Cemetery, on Tuesday last, attest to the great esteem in which the deceased was held.

THE EGG TRADE.

Additional Reports From England.

TORONTO, Oct. 21. A special cable to the Globe says: "The first test consignment of Canadian eggs reached the London market yesterday in excellent condition. They will bear comparison with many of the Normandy eggs, and the packing was satisfactory. Several cases found buyers at ten shillings per long hundred. The top price for the best eggs on the market was eleven shillings. If any thing is to be done with this trade this consignment should be followed up at once, as prices will be high from now till after Christmas."

Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, Oct. 21. The master of the American schooner George Wilfred, ashore at Lockeport, N. S., has received special permission to sell her cargo of fish, although the schooner has no license. Entries for the Jamaica Exhibition have been received from fifty cities and towns of Canada, every province being represented. The Minister of Marine has a report from Glace Bay that the Government steamer Napoleon III, now ashore there, will be got off without serious damage. The exports from Ottawa to the United States for the last quarter aggregate two million dollars.

Mr. Laurier will shortly start on a lecturing tour of the Maritime Provinces. Several papers are advocating that the next redistribution of electoral districts be made by legal experts. It is suggested in amendment that it be relegated to Medical or Ecclesiastical authorities.

An Explosion.

CAMPBELTON, N. B., Oct. 21. An unaccountable explosion of three bbls. of black varnish and two kegs of powder occurred in the I. C. R. freight shed at this place yesterday. J. H. Mowatt was blown through the doorway and badly injured, but it is thought he will recover. Five others were less seriously injured. The freight shed and adjoining buildings were partly damaged, and there was considerable loss to goods. The fire was prevented from doing further damage by the efforts of the I. C. R. employes and citizens.

The Cry of the Hungry.

DUBLIN, Oct. 21. A crowd of farm laborers at Schull besieged the Board of Guardians to-day, demanding work or bread, on account of the failure of the potato crop. The Board replied that the law does not permit outer relief.

Another Distillery.

HALIFAX, Oct. 21. Applications have been made for letters patent to incorporate a company to be known as the Halifax Distillery Co. The applicants are C. B. McDougald and others. The capital is to be \$400,000.

Boat Race Postponed.

HALIFAX, Oct. 21. A steady north easterly wind to-day made a choppy sea on the basin, which rendered the Boat Race between St. John and Halifax four oared boats impossible. A postponement was ordered until to-morrow.

A Low Record.

INDANAPOLIS, IND., Oct. 21. A Sentinel special from Cambridge City, Ind., says the Stallion Nelson to-day lowered his record making the mile in 2.10 1/2.

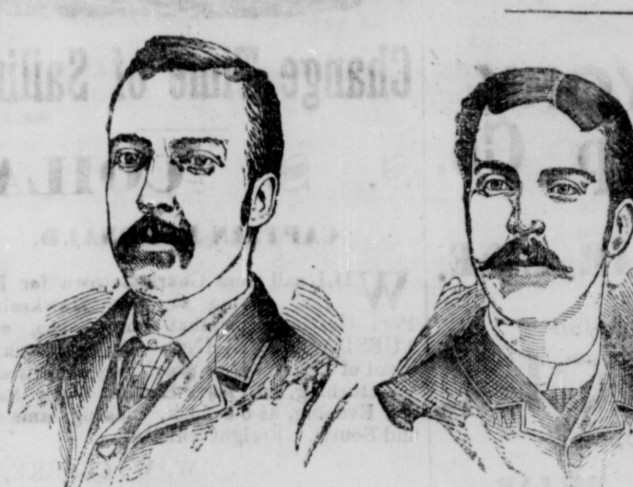
