SENATOR FERGUSON'S GREAT SPEECH.

We feel sure that the speech of Hon. Senator Ferguson regarding Public Works and Winter Communication in respect to Prince Edward Island will be carefully read by every thoughtful person—glib and tory—who has at heart the material interests of this Province. Affecting to some extent the other Provinces of Canada, the subject is for us of the highest importance. We should therefore be familiar with it in all its phases and bearings, and be ready at the first and every opportunity to act unitedly and effectively concerning it.

SENATOR FERGUSON'S SPEECH

Public Works & Winter Communication.

Hon. Mr. Ferguson, (P. E. I.) moved: That a humble address be presented to His Excellency the Governor-General, praying that His Excellency will cause to be laid before this House, a statement giving in detail the days, during the months of January, February, March and April last, on which the steamer Stanley crossed between Prince Edward Island and the mainland, such statement to show separately the days on which the said steamer made single and return trips, and also, the ports of departure from either side.

Also, for a statement covering the same period, giving in detail the days on which the Government ice-boats crossed between Cape Traverse and Cape Tormentine, such statement to show separately the days on which single and return trips were made.

Also, for a statement giving in detail the days during the same period on which no mails were conveyed from the mainland to Prince Edward Island, and from Prince Edward Island to the mainland.

That a humble address be presented to His Excellency the Governor-General, praying that His Excellency will cause to be laid before this House, copies of all correspondence between the Government of Canada and the Government of Prince Edward Island, from the first day of January, 1894, to the present time, in reference to the financial claims of the said province against the Dominion, in the matter of public works and winter communication in accordance with the terms of Confederation.

And also, regarding the proposed tunnel under the Straits of Northumberland.

He said: These two motions which I have on the Order paper, I think with the consent of the House, might be discussed together. They are very relevant to each other and as done in the case of the Manitoba and Northwest school question they might be discussed together, and with the consent of the House, will take that course. The subjects embraced in these motions have been presented to this House in former years, at very great length and with great ability, by Hon. Senator Howland, now Lieutenant-Governor of Prince Edward Island, and by other gentlemen representing that province in this honorable House. My apology for not presenting myself upon the subject of the House at this time is, that there remains a great deal to be done on this question yet, that new light has been thrown upon it since former discussions have taken place, and that I have had some opportunities of being conversant with certain phases, at least, of the question that I am proposing to submit to the House.

said railway there shall be raised by loan and appropriated a sum not exceeding three millions pounds sterling, bearing interest at a rate not exceeding four per cent. per annum upon a guarantee of the parent company had interest of such loan by the commissioners of Her Majesty's treasury under the provisions of the Canada Railway Loan Act, 1867.

That there should be an imperial guarantee for the loan of three millions of pounds sterling for the construction of the Intercolonial Railway, and section 32 of the same Act says: The Government of Canada is hereby empowered to raise by loan for the completion of the railway a further sum not exceeding one million pounds sterling (without guarantee by the commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury) and the Consolidated Revenue Fund of Canada shall be, and the same is hereby charged with the money so raised and interest immediately after the charges made thereon in pursuance of the five next preceding sections of this Act.

Therefore \$20,000,000, or £5,000,000 of sterling, was the amount that was authorized by the Parliament of Canada to be expended on the Intercolonial Railway at the time Prince Edward Island went into Confederation with Canada. At that time the sum of about \$15,500,000 had been expended on the Intercolonial Railway and there remained about \$4,500,000, which latter sum was the amount which the Parliament of Canada was authorized to expend for the construction of that work, and which was referred to in the terms of union, \$22,171,318.18. The first item that had been taken into consideration and then came the \$4,552,148.57, the amount unexpended and which was authorized by Parliament for the construction of the Intercolonial Railway.

If any doubt is still entertained on that point I may refer to the report of Mr. Brydges, the Superintendent of the Intercolonial, dated 24th December, 1874, a year and a half after Prince Edward Island entered into Confederation, in which he says:

I think this will give you all the information that you require upon the subject of the works upon the Intercolonial Railway, and I think you may be satisfied that the amounts which I have estimated for the completion of the work will not be exceeded and that the sum of \$21,250,000 will be the ultimate cost of the whole of the railway between Riviere du Loup and Truro.

This was a year and a half afterwards, but at the time Prince Edward Island went into Confederation there was no estimate before the House, except \$20,000,000 and that was to be the full amount authorized for the Intercolonial Railway. Sir John Macdonald in the terms of union with Prince Edward Island spoke of the amount authorized by Parliament, and we are limited to the consideration of those amounts. Now we come to the Canadian Pacific Railway and we find that by an Act passed in 1872, 35 Vic. cap. 71, sec. 4, the following provision was enacted:

The subsidy, or aid in money, to be granted to the said company shall be such sum not exceeding thirty million dollars on the whole as may be agreed on between the Government and the company, such subsidy to be granted from time to time by instalments as any portion of the cost of the railway may be required to pay the said subsidy.

Here we have it clearly provided by statute that the Government of the Province of Prince Edward Island entered into Confederation, that the sum authorized by law, always keeping to the words of the terms of union, for the construction of the Canadian Pacific Railway and which was included in the terms of union with Prince Edward Island, was \$30,000,000.

LABOR RIOTS AT CHICAGO.

Trains Stopped—Cars Overturned and Fired.

THE MOB AND THE SOLDIERY.

Incendiary Fire—Four Large Buildings Burned.

CHICAGO, July 6.

A large gang of strikers overturned twenty cars at 29th Street, on the Rock Island and Lake Shore tracks yesterday and made several attempts to burn them.

The fire department quenched the flames before they had gained much headway.

A mob numbering 1,000 is now on its way north towards the centre of the city, driving all the tower and signal men out of the towers on all roads leading to Park Street depot and the Fort Wayne Road, which parallels them. The men are going out without exception. A special train from Blue Island, carrying two companies of the Fifteenth Regiment to the scene of the trouble, between 43rd and 41st Street, on the Rock Island tracks arrived early yesterday.

The train was stopped at 43rd Street by the mob sympathizers. Two got into the cab and choked the engineer by trying a handkerchief around his neck. The other man started the engine ahead.

The engine and baggage car had been cut from the rest of the train and was moved a block away. A call for the police was responded to by sixty officers and the train was coupled together, again moved under police protection to 51st Street, where it was held until the arrival of the soldier's train, then it was started without further trouble. As soon as the soldiers were ordered out of the car a mob of several hundred came towards them, some of the crowd got under the line of the box cars standing next to the fence. Lieut. Jameson of C. Squad of soldiers quickly drove them off. The rest of the crowd was driven back along the tracks by a platoon of soldiers at the point of the bayonet. It was slow moving, but no one was hurt.

SIX large structures which formed the boundaries of the Court of Honor at the World's Fair, were destroyed by an incendiary fire last evening.

At Newmarket yesterday the Prince of Wales staker, for three and four yards, was won by Kingless, Bullington second, Ladies third.

The Mud Hook regatta yesterday was won by the Prince of Wales' yacht Britannia; Vigilant second. The Valkyrie and Satanis collided, and the Valkyrie sank. Lord Dunraven and his crew had a narrow escape.
