Children's Dental Program Urged To Begin At Once The professional training of dental auxiliaries should be increased to provide an annual grant of \$2,000 to each Canadian dental student who has satisfactory performance in his final two years at a Canadian dental school. But all the measures designed to create more dentists won't produce a rough professional manpower to handle the proposed program, says the commission. A large-scale program to train dental auxiliaries - such as in Britain and New Zealand - must begin next year if they were to be trained in time for the start of the children's program in 1968. The commission estimated at least 300 auxiliaries should be available by January, 1968, if the program is to begin then. They would be trained under the supervision of a dental school faculty and be paid an adequate salary in order to attract a sufficient number of applicants. Ottawa (CP) - Despite acute shortage of dentists, the royal commission on health services says it's imperative that a national dental program for children begin immediately. "We believe this program to be so important that it cannot await federal government and provincial government decisions on a comprehensive health program as a whole. This program must have one of the highest priorities among all our proposals and should be financed wholly by the two levels of government without cost to the children. Since it would be impossible for the present supply of dentists to handle the program, the commission, in its report to the government, recommends the training of 'dental auxiliaries' - persons who study dentistry for two years and then work under the direct supervision of a dentist. BEGIN PROGRAM IN 1968 The commission suggests the program begin in 1968, when children aged five and six would be eligible for all dental services. In the second year, all children aged four to seven inclusive would be covered, and in the third year all children between three and eight would be eligible. In the following years the qualifying age group would be extended by one year until, by 1980, all children up to the age of 18 would be covered. "Financial resources must be made available to attract dental personnel into this program on a large scale," the commission says. It also says 5,100 Canadians are trained as dentists and the commission says additional facilities are so limited that even this ratio cannot be maintained without a substantial expansion of dental schools. It recommends that Ottawa establish a health facilities development fund and that funds be allocated to provide one-half the cost of expanding dental schools at Dalhousie University, Halifax; the University of Manitoba, Winnipeg; McGill University, Montreal; the University of Alberta, Edmonton; and the University of Montreal. \$2,000 STUDENT GRANT The professional training of dental auxiliaries should be increased to provide an annual grant of \$2,000 to each Canadian dental student who has satisfactory performance in his final two years at a Canadian dental school. If an immediate start was made on adding psychiatric hospitals at the rate of 1,900 beds a year, all patients could be transferred by 1972. The federal government should pay half the cost of these new psychiatric units and ensure that no grants go toward mental hospitals larger than 300 beds. Out-patient departments should be established in psychiatric units, along with rehabilitation services. The commission also recommended similar approaches to the elimination of big, impersonal institutions, more constructive treatment of mentally ill patients, and a permanent establishment of community mental health centers in many mentally retarded persons can remain home. Because of the "extreme importance" of early diagnosis, all children should be examined for mental illness shortly after birth. Professional training grants of \$2,000 a year should be made to medical graduates who go into psychiatry fields. Out-patient departments should get special grants to help them conduct special courses in psychiatry for general practitioners. While the total catch was 114,453.000 pounds from 117,368,000 pounds in the corresponding period of 1963, the bureau of statistics announced. 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No Distinction Is Urged In Mentally, Physically Ill OTTAWA (CP) - The royal commission on health services has called for an immediate end to the distinction that some still make in attitudes toward those who are mentally ill and those who are physically ill. "There was an encouraging trend toward mental health care, but very change is making positive action possible and the outlook for treatment is hopeful if not actually optimistic." All cases of mental illness should be treated should go to special wings of general hospitals or special psychiatric hospitals with no more than 300 beds, the commission said in its report tabled in the Commons. "We believe that adequate treatment of mentally ill patients can only be properly achieved in large, isolated, segregated, undifferentiated mental 'asylums'."

Fluoridation Recommended By Commission OTTAWA (CP) - Fluoridation of public water supplies in Canada to prevent tooth decay was recommended today by the royal commission on health services. The commission's proposal in this connection for fluoridation, including the Northwest Territories and armed services establishments, where community water systems are non-existent, public health authorities should adopt other methods of fluoridation. "The evidence, now garnered over 30 years, shows that the technique of fluoridation properly controlled is effective, inexpensive and safe," the commission said. The federal government should provide for fluoridation of water supplies in jurisdictions under its jurisdiction, including the Northwest Territories and armed services establishments, where community water systems are non-existent, public health authorities should adopt other methods of fluoridation.

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
