## PRESIDENT DISCUSSES ENROLLMENT AND FUNDING

accessible to help solve some regional problems.

The overall enrolment among universities in the Atlantic Provinces is down by less than one per cent, says Dr. Peter Meincke, chairman of the association of Atlantic Universities.

The preliminary enrolment report of the various institutions is "not too bad considering what is happening generally," he told a news conference following a two-day meeting of the association in Sydney, N.S. recently.

However, he said, the association is concerned over the projected decline in the number of 18-24-year-olds attending universities in the next decade.

"That group is holding now but in the next ten years it is expected to take a drastic drop," he said.

Dr. Meincke, president of the University of Prince Edward Island, said he does not anticipate the closure of any institutions as a result of the projected change in enrolment. He said universities will then have an opportunity to turn to areas that have been neglected such as continuing education and life-long learning.

He said the intellectual resources of universities could also be made more

Dr. Meincke said the association discussed the reduction in the federal government's travel subsidy for athletics.

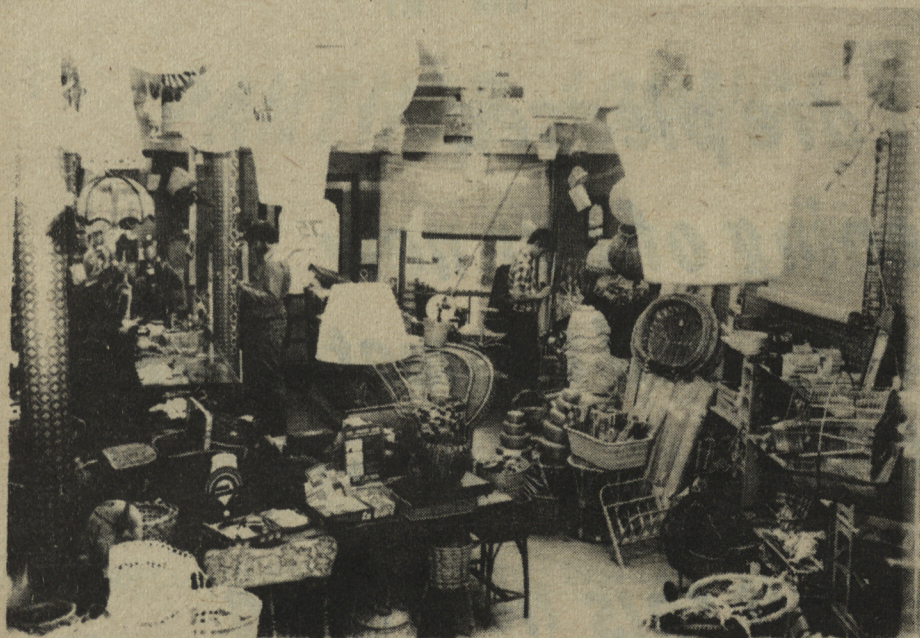
The federal government gave Canadian universities \$450,000 for athletic travel last year but the amount was reduced to \$190,000 this year. However, \$100,000 was added to the allotment following a meeting between university and government officials.

Because of the reduction, he said, Atlantic universities had to do some "scrambling around to try to rescue the operation."
