Canadian Hockey Team Arrives At London Airport

LONDON, (CP)—Eighteen Canadian hockey players breezed into London airport Monday, bound for Germany on what they call their "mission against Moscow."

"And that is our mission," said playing coach Grant Knobby Warwick as the Penticon Vs scooped off their plane from Canada on a one-hour stop in London. The team is en route to Duesseldorf for the world hockey championships starting Feb. 25.

Warwick, once with New York Rangers of the National Hockey League, obviously had his mind on Canada's March 6 clash against Russia, probably the key game of the tournament. Russia defeated Toronto East York 7-3 last year to win the title.

Warwick said his charges were in good shape—but "tired."

Dispute On Sunday Sport

HORNEPAYNE, Ont. (CP)—A dispute over Sunday commercial sport shaped up Monday in this tiny northern Ontario community, following cancellation of a hockey game Sunday.

Capreol Juveniles travelled 300 miles for the two-game, weekend series and trimmed Hornepayne Panthers 8-5 Saturday night. The Sunday game was cancelled as the teams were warming up.

"What kind of a dirty deal is this?" asked Capreol coach Elie Martel, a high school student.

The game was stopped by town constable Don Hargety on complaint of a citizen, or citizens, he refused to name. The citizen threatened prosecution under the Lord's Day Act.

Mayor Bill Woodhouse took to the ice to calm the boisterous crowd. The law had to be obeyed, he said. Otherwise, it meant a \$50 fine.

Angry citizens immediately started a petition designed to bring a plebiscite on the question. A protest meeting was planned for this week. The petition would need signatures of 10 per cent of voters before a plebiscite could be authorized. Council is expected to deal with the question at its next meeting March 8.

Ramblers Whip Moncton 4-2

MONCTON (CP)—Amherst Ramblers who finished the regular Atlantic Coast Senior Hockey League season in last place, whipped Moncton Hawks 4-2 here Monday night to take a 1-0 lead in the best-of-nine semi-finals.

Ramblers needed seven minutes of overtime to win.

Edgar Kennedy broke away at the 7:01 mark of the overtime and drew out Moncton goalie Nick Pidsodny for the winner.

Bob Reid shot the clincher into an empty cage at 8:50 after Hawks had yanked Pidsodny.

Amherst took the lead just seven seconds after the start of the game. Winger Hank Therrien connected from 40 feet out. The second period was scoreless. Bob Bowness squared the count at 1:41 of the third, but Amherst led again after Don Rogers scored at 3:04. Bert Hirschfeld made K 2-2 at 4:18.

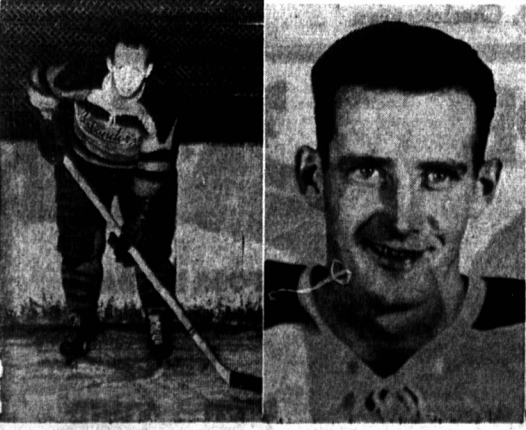
O'Rourke Rink Wins Round

Islanders Take One Game Lead In Series With Smashing 7-0 Over Caps Last Night

Shirley Gets 7th Shut-Out; Whitlock Has Five Points

The league champion Charlottetown Islanders gave the local Wacky Valentines gift as they washed the Fredericton Capitals 7-0 at the Forum and took a one game lead in the best-of-nine finals in Series A of the Atlantic Coast Senior Hockey League semi-finals. The Islanders scored a pair of goals in the opening frame, banged in two more in the sandwich session and collected a trio in the finale.

Jim Shirley was the hero of the encounter, blocking all 24 shots which were directed his way off the sticks of the fast-skating Capitals. It was the seventh shut-out that Jim has registered while playing with the Islanders this season.

The big forward trio for coach Brklacich was the Whitlock line which figured in on six of the seven Islanders goals. Buck picked up two goals and three assists to lead the parade. Lorne Hennessey had a pair of goals and Bob Gray had one goal and two assists. Coach Steve Brklacich was a tower of strength for his team as he played an airtight game of defence and was attributed with the set-up job on four of his teams seven goals. Hughie Campbell and Don Carver were the other Islanders marksmen.

Orin Carver started the game off with a bang as he smashed defenceman John Mosgrove hard at the Fredericton line just 45 seconds after referee George O'Donoghue had dropped the first puck of the series. The first period was what one could call a "meet your man" session with the players getting the general idea of the tactics of the man he was guarding.

ISLANDERS STRIKE EARLY
The Islanders struck early in the frame with two goals which came within 59 seconds of each other. Buck Whitlock took a short pass from coach Brklacich at centre on this line's first opportunity of the night. Buck carried the puck inside the Capitals blue line and slid a pass to winger Lorne Hennessey who was cruising on the left side of the net. Lorne lifted the puck up over Plumber Craig's right pads as the cageman attempted to cover the shot on the short side. Before this line left the ice it had the Islanders leading by a two goal margin, with the McIntosh-coached club having a lot of difficulty in getting their plays working. Hughie Campbell and Bob Gray parked on opposite sides of the Caps' blue line and engaged in a nice passing play until Buck found an opportune moment to pass the rubber to big rightwinger Bob Gray who had skated in the clear in front of the Caps' goalie. Bob took the pass and made the red light blink for the second time within the minute.

Shortly after this the penalties started to come thick and the pace of the game was slowed up considerably. Orin Carver and Copper Leyte shone on sentence-killing duties for the Islanders while Bill McDonagh and Bob Leger did likewise for the Caps. All three lines were working nice for the Islanders while the Caps still had some trouble getting organized with the Islanders two defensive units of Brklacich and Campbell, O'Connor and Hinchberger setting an almost stone-wall fortress in front of Shirley.

CAPS' PLAYERS CLICK
Whatever coach McIntosh said to his men between periods, certainly had the desired effect, because the Caps came out with their plays clicking perfectly in the middle session. Bill McDonagh hit the ice with only 17 seconds gone in the period. The

Islanders struck back hard, again while the Whitlock trio was making its mark on the ice. The session, and near the four minute mark, Brklacich carried the puck up centre, passed to Gray just inside the line and passed to Hennessey who again stood in the clear in front of Craig. The pace quickened over the fast sheet of ice and the hockey witnessed for the first five minutes of this frame was better than anything seen here this season. Craig came up with a nice save off Wimpy Jones at 4:15. It was Shirley's turn two minutes later off the stick of Lucien Gilbert.

Buck Whitlock grabbed a stray Heon pass at centre shortly after the eight minute mark and skated into the Fredericton zone in the clear with Pat Powers trailing. He picked the far corner of the net on a 30 foot angle shot from left wing. The pace got hot again at the mid-way and it was play-off hockey all the way with Bill McDonagh in on Shirley again at the 12 minute mark. The Caps swarmed all over the Islanders net at the 14 minute mark but found it impossible to beat the capable Islanders goalie. Leger and Heon were right in on Shirley before the Islanders again caught fire with Hennessey and O'Connor hitting the goal-post near the end of the period.

Again in the final period, Shirley was the key man to the Islanders success as he turned aside shot after shot of the on-rushing Capitals. Jones scored the first marker of the period after the half-way mark on an in-the-clear pass from Brklacich and Ray Leger. Campbell made it 6-0 on a shot from the centre ice red-line three minutes later, that Craig fumbled on and dropped in the net. Whitlock closed the scoring on a relay slap-shot, from Bob Gray in the corner, at about 20 feet in front of Craig.

Sir,—June was almost over in 1913 when the judges and referee voted a unanimous decision to Gilbert Gallant of Chelsea, Mass., over the durable D. A. N. "Balding" Nelson in a 12-round bout at the Boston Arena.

This same Gilbert Gallant was born in Bloomfield, P.E.I., and left the province around the turn of the century.

The Island also had other good men in the lightweight division of boxing who made a name for themselves in the squared circle. In 1910, Jack Ahern of Tignish, chucked up an impressive record while fighting around the Boston area. Mr. Ahern later taught the late Jimmie McInnis all he knew about the many art of self defence.

Then there were the Donovan brothers, Jack and Pres. Jack was probably the better of the two although neither held a professional title.

Probably the best amateur boxer ever to be produced in this province is Steve MacDonald, "The Fighting Druggist." For the past four years, Steve has competed in the Maritime Amateur Boxing Tournaments in Halifax and has won a title each year and last year took double honors.

Billy Pryor is another Island boy who likely would have been a Canadian champion had he taken the fight game seriously. He was runner up for the Canadian Olympic lightweight crown in 1948.

Getting back to Gilbert Gallant, he was easily the best professional lightweight to ever leave the Island. The late Doc Allan of the Boston press once said of Gilbert: "He is the hardest hitting little man in the world. He has the neck, arms and shoulders of a middleweight, and hits with the authority of a heavyweight."

Gilbert must also be remembered for his four great matches with New York's Leach Cross. He gave Cross more trouble than any fighter he ever met. Out of the four matches, Gilbert beat Cross decisively in two and drew in the others.
