## Local Man Recalls Cruise To Labrador

I sailed to Fox Bay with a nice breeze from the south. As I sailed along that shore, every rock, cove and landmark reminded me of some episode of my younger days, which made me very lonely and sad.

On arriving at Fox Bay I anchored off the river and the guard, Mr. Young, came on board. He too was dubious of me at first, although Mr. Ricux had told him by phone of my coming, but after I told him the story and that I was born only a hundred yards from where I was anchored he took me on shore and gave me the key to the harbour.

I spent three weeks here, helped him catch salmon and lobsters and can them. He also lent me a gun to hunt deer. He took one direction and I another. I got a deer but he got none. It was three days before I left there.

Dr. George Prefontaine came in on his trip around the Islands and had me sail around the harbour while he took pictures of my boat. They were very fine gentlemen.

While at Fox Bay I visited our old homestead, but all the buildings had been burnt; only part of the foundation of ours remained. I knelt on that and prayed for a happy reunion of the family in that land where there is no more parting or tears.

I then visited Stacy's Cove (our near neighbor when we dwelt there). My, how sad and desolate it all is! All life seemed to have vanished on our leaving the islands.

On August 8th I once more visited our old home and there wept at the desolation and sad memories of members of the families who had passed on, and of our happy days here.

### Leaves Anticosti For North Shore

I left Fox Bay on Aug. 23rd at 5 a.m., clearing light N. wind, 15-20 miles; ran N. E. for Kegaska, 68 miles; ran 20 miles, wind veering N. E. with heavy head lop spray flying, motor backfiring. On turning to close water valve of muffler (to blow water out of take water in base of motor) my foot slipped and the two flywheel handle buttons caught me on the right ankle fracturing the bone and cutting an arc through my rubber bootie and my underclothes, knocking my foot dead. Could not get boot off to ascertain damage done; and knowing

that an easterly storm was coming on I could not make Kegaska, and no harbour at Natsakwan 23 miles west. I shaped a course for Aganise River, 15 miles west of Aquanish, distance 42 miles, and ran before the storm.

This seemed the longest 42 miles I ever covered, but I made it true and stopped off the River at 1:30 p.m. and signaled for a pilot. Black rocks were peeping out of the water all around a boat came out and piloted me in. Moored my boat and led me to a nursing station. The pain of my foot became intense when I stood on it.

Half an hour after my arrival the storm struck; a gale, east wind with heavy sea, and worse still, dense fog. I had just made it. Another of my marvellous escapes and another proof that God guides us with his eyes. I was here for five days with my foot in ice to reduce swelling. I knew these people here of old, but I was obliged to ship on my French tongue to converse with them. A couple of old-time master mariners came often to talk with me about the old times, and I enjoyed this very much. These people were very kind to me.

It will be recalled that I shot a deer on Anticosti, and the day before I left I made a large pot of stew from it. I don't pretend to be a cook but this stew was delicious. Among the men who

ed my boat in the River and helped me to the nurse was a man with a large family, and a hard drag to feed them. I gave him the pot of stew and told him if his children liked it they were welcome. He thanked me profusely and took the pot home. Two days later he returned with the pot empty and clean, declaring that they had never tasted anything better.

After I could move around with the aid of crutches I left Aquanish. Alone again and by short stages arrived at Kegaska on Saturday p.m., and attended church service on Sunday. Here the Minister told me that war was declared; "Well," I said, "I expected that because I just came through part of it."

Three days later I reached Harrington after covering 875 nautical miles alone.

The description of Mr. Osborne's boat follows: 31 ft. beam, 8 ft. 9 in. depth, 4 feet. Awi rigged, 12 h.p. Haubolt motor, 2 cylinders.
