Will & Testament Of Archbishop McNally

Following are the provisions contained in the last will and testament of the Most Rev. John Thomas McNally, Archbishop of Halifax. A native of Hope River, P.E.I., the late Archbishop McNally's will is dated Sept. 2, 1950.

"I hereby revoke all Wills and Testamentary Writings made by me prior to this date, September the second, nineteen hundred and fifty.

"I nominate, constitute and appoint as Executors of my will the Right Reverend Monsignor William J. Burns, Vicar-General of the Archdiocese of Halifax, and the Reverend Francis L. Carroll, Chancellor of the same.

"Having no money to bequeath to anybody, as the Halifax Archdiocesan menso has provided for my maintenance, I ask of the Archdiocese, in its charity, to pay any debts of mine justly proven, though I am not aware of any; to pay also my funeral expenses, as simple as possible, with my grave in Halifax; and finally to have erected over that grave a modest monument asking prayers for my soul.

"All the episcopal and pontifical robes, rings, pectoral crosses and chains, mitres, croziers etc., which I have used in Halifax Archdiocese are the property of that Archdiocese, and I hope and desire that they will remain such, and never be disposed of by sale or gift to anybody else.

"Finally may I express the hope that the Archdiocese of Halifax and my friends everywhere will, in their charity, have prayer, and especially the Divine Sacrifice of the Mass, offered frequently for my soul.

At Bishop's Palace His Excellency, Most Reverend James Boyle, D.D., received a large number of guests of all denominations during the afternoon. The visitors were received and introduced by Rev. P. F. MacDonald, Chancellor of the Diocese. His Excellency was accompanied in the reception line by Right Reverend Monsignor Patrick McMahon, D.D., Rev. James Smith, Rev. Frank Corcoran, Rev. Frank Bolger and Rev. Justin MacDonald.
