A GOLDEN WEDDING.—There was a very pleasant family reunion at the residence of Hon. W. W. Wood, on Wednesday evening last—the anniversary of that gentleman's marriage fifty years ago. Mr. and Mrs. Wood were both in good health and the happiest spirits. Many esteemed old friends were present to congratulate them on the success of their long career—as we do now.

DOINGS OF THE FISHING FLEET.—The shore fleet have not done much the past week, owing to a scarcity of bait. There have been five arrivals from LaHave Bank, bringing 110,000 pounds of codfish, and 11,000 pounds of halibut. The number of vessels in the herring business comprises, 63, 31 of which have sailed for Fortune Bay Newfoundland, and 32 for New Brunswick and Nova Scotia. These vessels are among the staunchest of the fleet. Reports from Newfoundland show a scarcity of herring in that section, and many of the vessels are expected to go to Fortune Bay to finish their cargoes.—Cape Ann Advertiser.

GEN. DUNN, who has been lately appointed Judge-Advocate-General, and of whom the New York Tribune speaks in the following paragraph, is brother of Col. D. M. Dunn, our esteemed United States Consul. "The late Judge-Advocate-General is appropriately succeeded by the gentleman who has been for six or eight years past his admirable assistant. Gen. William McKee Dunn was at the outbreak of the war an influential Congressman from Indiana, and one of the hardest working and most judicious members of the Military Committee. His familiarity with military legislation specially fitted him for the class of work which he undertook in the office of Judge-Advocate-General. His temper of mind is eminently judicial, and the army is fortunate in having so competent and able a man ready for the place which Judge Holt's retiring left vacant.

SOMETHING THAT IS NEEDED.—The Charlottetown correspondent of the Toronto Globe writes:—

"While there are hardships and perils which must always be inseparable from the sea-boat journey between the Capes, and to which the brave captains and their crews, and their passengers, are inevitably subjected, there are always disadvantages for which there is a remedy. When the passengers and mails are brought to the landing place on either shore, the boat, though turned bottom upward, is often covered or filled with snow, involving inconvenience and delay. This difficulty could be overcome by the construction of a small boat-house or shed at each landing place. It is not much to expect the not-so-well-paid contractors to provide such structures. The Dominion Government might, with but a very small outlay, add to the convenience and comfort of its servants, and of at least a portion of the public, and to the more speedy conveyance of the mails, by authorizing its mail carriers at the Capes to provide the needed shelter at both shores."

THE FISHING BUSINESS.—Loss of Life and Property.—The year now closing has been a sad one in loss of life and property in the fishing business in comparison with last year. By reference to our files we find that 16 vessels have been lost and 123 men, against 10 vessels and 68 lives in 1874. In 1873 31 vessels and 174 men left port never to return. The heaviest losses this year have been in the Grand and Western Bank fisheries—10 vessels and 92 men. In the Georges fishery, 5 vessels and 27 lives have been sacrificed, and one vessel in the Southern mackerel fishery. Four men have been lost from the shore fishing fleet. Of the 16 vessels lost this year, the entire crew of 8 of them have been saved. The Newfoundland herring fishery has been prosecuted with the loss of but a single life. The total tonnage of the 16 vessels lost was 1050.91. Their value \$88,500, insurance, \$173,125, insurance on outfit \$8000.—Cape Ann Advertiser.

He is quite an acquisition. His Stump Speech contained some good hits which were appreciated. Mr. P. S. Macgowan's reading was one of his happiest and best efforts. Messrs. B. Brenner and A. D. White distinguished themselves in the character songs "The Regular Army O" and "Mulligan Guard." We have seldom heard Messrs. Earle and Vinnicombe perform to such advantage as in the instrumental duet. Mr. Earle's solo was splendid. The reading by Mr. George Peake and the song by Mr. F. H. Beer were both good after their kind. Mr. E. H. Brenner as a Dutchman—stout, vulgar, good-humored and witty—was loudly applauded. The entertainment as a whole, was a first-class amateur performance.
