ONLY HYPOCRISY SAYS TOLSTOI.

Disarmament Conference Not Aiming at Peace.

ARMIES CANNOT BE LESSENEED

The Count Writes a Letter, in Which He Belittles the Czar's Idea.

The Daily Chronicle prints a letter from Count Tolstoi, which was written in reply to certain prominent Swedes, asked him whether he thought it advisable to submit to the conference called by the Czar the question of substituting some kind of public labour for conscription; the case of persons who conscientiously object to military service.
 In it Count Tolstoi says that, while he is convinced that the refusal of individuals to serve in the army is the best way of obtaining general disarmament, he regards a discussion of the question by the conference as impossible, first, because the conference will be a hypocritical institution, not really aiming at the establishment of peace and the lessening of militarism, but seeking to hoodwink the people by hiding the only true means of salvation; and, secondly, because such a lessening of armies as the result of the refusal of individuals to serve in them would undermine the fundamental force of every Government.

GOVERNMENTS CANNOT LESSEN ARMIES.
 Governments, he adds, cannot of their own will either lessen their armies or arrest their armaments in the present state of the world, especially when all are doing their utmost to acquire new possessions. As long as Governments continue to acquire territory, such as the Philippines and Port Arthur, or to keep what they have acquired, such as Poland, Alsace, Lorraine and Egypt, just so long will armies grow larger and larger, and as long as governments continue to govern their subjects through force, they will never tolerate refusals to serve as soldiers.

STATE OF TERRIBLE MORAL IGNORANCE.
 Continuing, Count Tolstoi says: "There was recently published an account of an American regiment which refused to march against Hilo. This is cited as something remarkable. What is remarkable is that all these regiments of Russian, German, French, Italian, or American warriors instead of doing the same thing, have, at the caprice of men who were entirely strangers to them, marched out to kill the subjects of another nation who had done them no harm. Indeed, if the people of our days go to war or even enter military service, giving themselves over to slavery to men whom they do not esteem, it is only because such persons are living in a state of terrible moral ignorance. Had such true enlightenment as I have referred to spread among the peoples, the news of the proposed conference would not have met with the sympathetic echoes of ill-defined hopes, but rather would have encountered contempt and derision, if not indignation."
