

# Leaf-Backs With Offense Treat Leafs

MONTREAL (CP) — Hamilton Tiger-Cats came into their Friday night contest for Montreal Alouettes with a lot of momentum for the first time in four years.

The teams met at 2 p.m. AST today in the first of the two-game, total-point series. The game will be played in Hamilton on Saturday.

Coach Jim Trinterud of the T-Cats said Alouettes' win Wednesday over Ottawa Rough Riders in the semi-final was the Montreal club's most impressive performance of the season.

"The T-Cats had their full complement of players," Coach Trinterud said. "We're not so fortunate."

Something approaching consolation struck the phlegmatic Peabody Friday when he learned that Montreal Alouettes had a 14-10 point-margin in their first game of the season.

Cookie Gilchrist is almost a certainty for more of a defensive role as right-side line-backer with Curcio working at halfback or almost anywhere as fullback or middle back.
