A MONSTROUS TROUT.—One of the biggest catches on record is that made recently by Mr. J. L. Welch of Quebec. One fine morning Mr. Welch was casting with a small trout fly and an eight ounce rod in the waters of Lake St. Charles. Suddenly he saw his fly disappear, and then came a hurs-powur tug that resulted in a struggle between man and fish for an hour and a half. At last the fish gave up, and when the casting net had received it Mr. Welch found himself struggling with an immense grey trout. On weighing it he found its avoirdupois to be 17 lbs., while its length was 35 inches and its girth 20 inches. This is believed to be the largest specimen ever killed by a fly. Its capture was certainly a triumph of skill and a carnival of sport, such that the warm-blooded follower of Isaac Walton feels his circulation going faster as he thinks of it.—Empire.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT. House of Commons.

OTTAWA, June 25.
In the House yesterday Joncas, the member for Gaspe, repudiated the statement in the press that he had turned a supporter of Laurier. He said that he had been a Conservative for twenty years and would remain so.
The whole day was spent in committee on resolutions to subsidize the construction of the Hudson Bay Railway, which was agreed to unanimously.
Hugh John Macdonald made an excellent speech, and after sitting down, Hon. David Mills crossed the floor and congratulated him, as also did many other members.
Chief Engineer Perley's evidence before the Tarte-McGreedy committee is putting an entirely new light upon the case. The bottom has completely dropped out of the charges against Mr. Perley.
The House adjourned to-day until Tuesday next, Monday being a church holiday. The House will sit all next week, including Dominion Day and Saturday. The heat is intense.

Heavy Rains—Town Destroyed.

NEW YORK, June 26.
There have been heavy rains in Nebraska. Many railroad washouts are reported, and some bridges have been carried away. The town of Merville is completely destroyed. Only one house has been left standing.

Parnell Married.

LONDON, June 25.
Parnell and Mrs. O'Shea were married privately by the Registrar yesterday morning. There was no religious ceremony, the clergymen refusing to officiate.

LONDON, June 26.
Heavy thunder storms are reported yesterday throughout England and Ireland. Much damage was done by floods. Several houses were burned and shattered by lightning.

The only reports of fish taken to-day are the following: A fair catch of cod at Paspebiac, Que., and Liverpool; a fair catch of herring at North Sydney, and a good haul of mackerel this morning in the nets at Liverpool. The average catch by the Lunenburg bankers up to date is reported at 500 quintals each.
