

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

CANADIAN.

OTTAWA, Dec. 28.

The Quebec Board of Trade will entertain Sir Hector Langevin on Saturday next at a dinner.

The Minister of Justice has refused to commute the sentence of death against the murderer Moreau, at Rimouski. The execution will take place on the 13th of January.

The borings for the new bridge across the St. Lawrence, for the Atlantic and North Western Railway are proceeding satisfactorily. The largest stretch is 3,000, and the shortest, 2,800 feet.

UNITED STATES.

LAWRENCEVILLE, Dec. 28.

On the evening of December 26th a stranger pretending to be deaf and dumb, stopped at Mrs. Benjamin Munro's, of East Dalhousie, and took his revolver and shot her eldest son George, aged nineteen, through the head and then shot his sister Mary, aged twelve, through her breast. Neither is expected to live.

NEW YORK, Dec. 28.

A very destructive fire occurred on South Street last night. The Griswold Building, occupied chiefly by Frank G. and John N. A. Griswold, importers of teas and East India produce, was burned, and the adjoining buildings damaged. Some estimates place the loss as high as \$3,000,000, as the warehouse was stocked with East India shawls, silks, and expensive wines. An immense quantity of tobacco was also burned. Full insurances on buildings and contents.

NEW YORK, Dec. 28.

At the walking match yesterday the wife of A. M. Walde took him off the track, and late in the evening Hart and Fitzgerald left by a preconcerted agreement, but were taken back by their trainers. The *Sun* says there is said to be an understanding between Hart and Fitzgerald to "throw" the race, so far as they are concerned.

ST. LOUIS, Dec. 28.

T. P. O'Connor, Irish Agitator, received quite an ovation at the Merchants Exchange, where he delivered a lecture last night. He was escorted to the Hall by two companies of military and several Irish societies, and was introduced to the audience by Governor Crethenden. William Lewing, Mayor of the city, also made a brief address.

NEW YORK, Dec. 28.

The *Heald* prints a list of nearly a thousand names of those lost at the Vienna theatre fire. No Americans appear among them.

EUROPEAN.

ST. PETERSBURG, Dec. 28.

The first part of the stipulated money indemnity, for the cession of Kulджа, was paid to Russia by the Chinese Government four days ago. Several Court officials have been ordered to proceed to Moscow to make careful examination of all costumes and accessories which Russian tradition requires to be used at Imperial coronations. This warrants the supposition that the coronation ceremony is to take place earlier than was expected, probably before the confinement of the Empress.

LONDON, Dec. 28.

The South Arklow light ship, coast of Ireland, has been run down by a four-masted vessel, believed to be American. The men belonging to the light ship are supposed to have been saved. Three steamers left Queenstown in chase of the colliding vessel.

WARSAW, Dec. 28.

The damage done to property during the recent riot is enormous. A portion of the city is virtually destroyed.

LONDON, Dec. 28.

A circular of the Ladies' League summoning all branches of that organization to meet on Sunday is issued for the purpose of testing the legality of the ladies meeting.

DUBLIN, Dec. 28.

A meeting of the Irish Home Manufacture Association adopted a resolution to communicate with Gray, Dawson and other members of the late Industrial Exhibition committee, with the view of having an exhibition of Irish manufactures in 1882.

ST. PETERSBURG, Dec. 28.

Defalcations amounting to a million roubles have been discovered in the custom house at Tagnrog, and all the officers there-in have been arrested.

MEXICO, Dec. 28.

President Gonzales has invited Senor Matias Romero, formerly Mexican Minister at Washington, to accept the appointment as special envoy to negotiate the Reciprocity Treaty of Commerce with the United States. Romero will probably accept.

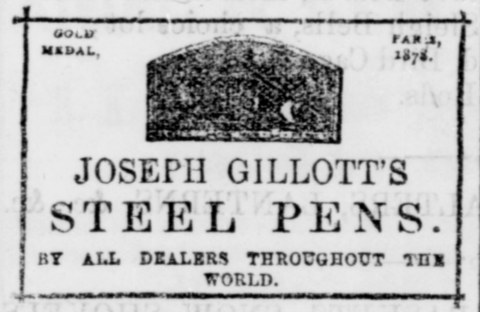
