DOESN'T WANT PEACE.

Confirmation of the Appointment of Lu Chuan Lin.

SHANGHAI, November, 6.—The statement cabled to the New York Sun a few days ago that Lu Chuan Lin, who is strongly anti-foreign, has been appointed a president of the board of the censors and president of the board of rites has been confirmed. Leading Chinese consider his rapid promotion as most unfavorable to a speedy settlement of the present troubles and declare that he is worse than Prince Tuan or Kang Yi, the president of the board of war, who is said to have committed suicide. Li Hung Chang to-day telegraphed to Sheng, director of the railways and telegraph, that England and Japan insist upon the reformation of the government but the other powers only emphasize their demand for the speedy punishment of those officials who aided or abetted the massacre of foreigners.

INSURE AGAINST STRIKES.

Number of Austrian Manufacturers Form Mutual Protection Association.

Washington, Nov 6.—A number of Austrian manufacturers have formed an association for insurance against strikes, according to United States Consul Hossfeld, at Trieste. It is the object of the Association to indemnify its members for all losses sustained by them from unjust strikes which may break out in their respective establishments. Each member is to pay a weekly premium equal to from 3 to 4 per cent. of the amount of the pay roll. When a strike occurs, a committee will be appointed to investigate all the circumstances and if the cause of the strikes be found just no indemnity shall be paid.

A similar insurance association, although on a smaller scale is said to have been organized in Germany. "Both the Austrian and German associations, it appears," says Consul Hossfeld, "recognize in principle the justness of strikes, which is, in Germany at least, an important concession to labor."

Fleeing Mercenaries.

VIENNA, Nov. 6.—A number of volunteers who served with the Boers have landed at Trieste. They cheered for President Kruger and the Transvaal, and sang the Boer national hymn. The officers received £26 and the privates £6 from the Transvaal government.

WILL NOT GET FREEDOM OF DUBLIN.

Dublin, Nov 6.—Amidst considerable excitement the Lord Mayor at a meeting of the corporation yesterday ruled out of order a resolution to confer the freedom of the city on former President Kruger, of the South African Republic.

Allowance of Ammunition.

YESTERDAY'S ELECTIONS

Laurier Government Wins

SIR CHARLES IS IN GOOD SPIRITS—HE GOES TO BRITISH COLUMBIA.

HALIFAX, N. S., Nov. 8.—After a magnificent fight the Conservative party in the Dominion, and the Old Liberals who agreed with them in attacking the corrupt Laurier-Tarte administration suffered a temporary check yesterday in Quebec. In the Maritime provinces and the great province of Ontario and west of Lake Superior, the opponents of the Government were endorsed. The race and national appeal of Tarte and Laurier was not without its effect in Quebec and in some of the Maritime constituencies. Conservatives have no cause to be ashamed.

Halifax County elects one Conservative and possibly two. R. L. Borden easily heads the poll and with one place to hear from Kenney leads Roche by 12. Some of the returns are not official and are therefore not absolutely accurate. Gay's River, a section which has not reported, gave a liberal majority last election. As many districts of the county have done better for Conservatives this election than perhaps ever before, it is not impossible that Gay's River will be found to be all right.

Both Tupper and Bell are elected in Pictou County.

HALIFAX, Nov. 8.—Sir Charles Tupper arrived in this city this morning from Cape Breton.

A gentleman who called upon him at 11 o'clock last night found him the most joyful man in a company of half a dozen. He was by no means cast down. He had done his best for the party and for his country, and naturally he enjoyed the happiness of conscious well-doing, if not the pleasure of success. He is in splendid health.

Sir Charles left this morning en route for British Columbia, where he intends to assist the Conservative candidates in Yale, Cariboo and Burrard.

With reference to the county of Cape Breton, Sir Charles said: "I am rather relieved than otherwise at the result in that county. It ought not to surprise any one when it is remembered that since my election in 1896, when I had a majority over 800, Dr. Kendall, my opponent, was elected two years ago in the same county to the local house by more than one thousand majority. I have been unable to give any personal attention to the county with the exception of the opening three or four days in it owing to my duties in other parts of the Dominion, and I should have adopted the course I did had I been quite sure it would have resulted in my defeat as I was bound to consider the interests of the party at large rather than my personal interests. We have not sufficient data to speak on the general result, but I shall await definite information with the consciousness that I have, since the defeat of my government and my election by the Liberal-Conservative party as its leader, done all that lay in my power to ensure its success."

HALIFAX, Nov 8.—The Chronicle (Liberal) gives the results 135 liberals; 74 Conservatives. The Herald (Cons) makes it 120 Liberals, 76 Conservatives, 9 independents. Among Conservatives defeated are Tupper, Foster, Hugh John McDonald, Montague, Davin, Rergeron, Caron, Quinn and Powell.

Cronje's Sword for Kruger.

PARIS, Nov. 6.—The Parisian pro-Boer committee have decided that the sword of honor for General Cronje, obtained by public subscription at the time of the Boer General's surrender, shall be handed to Mr. Kruger upon his arrival in Paris by M. Henri Rochefort.

As a certain reverend gentleman remarked "boast, bluff, boodle, booze" were the stock-in-trade of the Government during the election contest. And the government was successful!

GERMANS AND BRITISH.

Anecdote Illustrating the Difference in Mental Attitude.

There is an anecdote told of two men, a German and an Englishman, who were discussing military matters somewhat energetically. The German clinched his argument by saying: "I tell you if a war were to break out all Germany would fight like one man." To which the Englishman replied: "And I tell you, if a war were to break out every Briton would fight like all England." This anecdote may be taken to illustrate the difference in mental attitude between England and her chief commercial rival. Englishmen learn with difficulty to combine amongst themselves to a common end, or to exchange information for the common good. Their respect for individuality is carried to extremes. More weight is attached to opinions than to the ascertainment of facts. But earnest and capable reformers are struggling to secure a scientific basis for the education and training of the people.—H. J. Skelton, in the Engineering Magazine for October.
